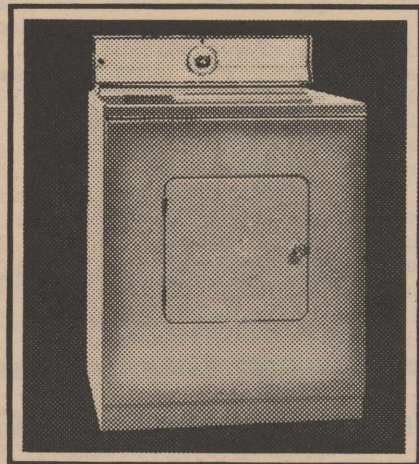

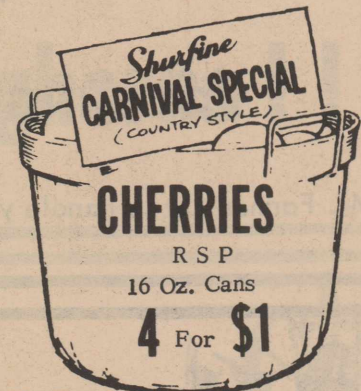

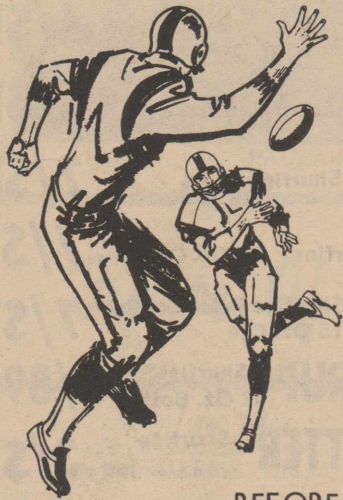

Horns Trample Swifts

Hart Longhorns scored in every quarter to trounce the hapless Nazareth Swifts 54-8 in a Homecoming game Friday night. It was also the first district game for the Horns.

In pre-game ceremonies, Pam Shive was crowned Homecoming Queen out of a field of five candidates.

The game began as the Horns kicked off to the Swifts. The Swifts took the ball on their own 28 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage, the quarterback faded back to pass and threw directly to Hart defensive halfback Gary Six.

From the Nazareth 35 the Horns began their first drive of the night. After three plays the Horns found themselves on the Nazareth seven yard line. Johnny Ethridge took the ball and proceeded to fight his way over the goal for Hart's first six points. Ethridge also kicked the extra point and the Horns led 7-0.

Again the Swifts tried to move the ball through the air and this time Danny Smith picked off the pass with the Horns taking over on the Nazareth 45. Quarterback Harold Bennett directed the plays as the Horns moved the ball down to the Swift eight yard line.

The call this time went to Landra Bruington and over the double stripes he went for the Horns second touchdown of the night. Ethridge was right on his extra point kick and the Horns led 14-0.

The Nazareth eleven could do only one good thing the rest of the first quarter and that was to pick off a Hart pass.

Early in the second quarter, Quincey Hawkins returned the favor by intercepting a Swift pass and running it back 44 yards for a touchdown. Again Ethridge added the point to make it 21-0.

The Swifts still found no running room and had to punt to the Horns. On the first play

Harold Bennett broke loose from a fleet of Nazareth tacklers and ran the ball 48 yards to paydirt. Ethridge completed his fourth conversion and the score at half stood at Hart 28 and Nazareth 0.

The Swifts took the wind in the second half and kicked to the Horns.

Again the Horns found the going great and moved the ball to the Swift four yard line, where Roy Ethridge took over to score his first touchdown of the year. Brother Johnny kicked for another point and the Horns led 35-0.

Nazareth found the going a little better after that T. D. and moved the ball down to the Hart 40 before they were stopped on downs. But the Horns found the going a little bit better as they moved the ball down to the Swift two-yard line. To top things off, Jimmy Robinson blasted in for another Hart score. Ethridge made it six for six, Hart led 42-0.

The Swifts finally got things going near the end of the third quarter. Punching their way downfield with short passes, they moved to the Hart 25. From there Neil Dobmeier threw a 20 yard strike to J. C. Pohlmeier who ran the ball the final five yards to the end zone. Dobmeier also ran the two extra points to make the score 42-8, favor of the Horns.

Early in the fourth quarter Hart again moved the ball down deep into Nazareth territory. From the 18 yard line Harold Bennett threw a touchdown pass to Donnie Black. The kick was no good, but the Horns were still leading 48-8.

The Swifts could do no more as the Horns soon got the ball back. After the Horns moved the ball to the Nazareth eight yard line, Stanley Dyer got into the act as he pushed in from the eight. The kick was no good and Hart led 54-8.

Near the end of the game the Swifts were moving again. After the horn went off to end the game, the Swifts ran two plays due to penalties against the Horns. But penalties ran out and the final score stood at 54 for the Hart Longhorns and 8 for the Nazareth Swifts.

The Horns travel to Lazbuddie for their next game, Nov. 7, the showdown game for class 2-B. The game will be played at 7:30.

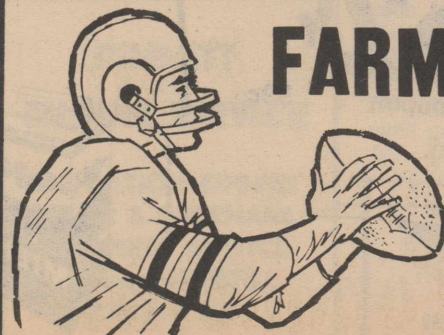

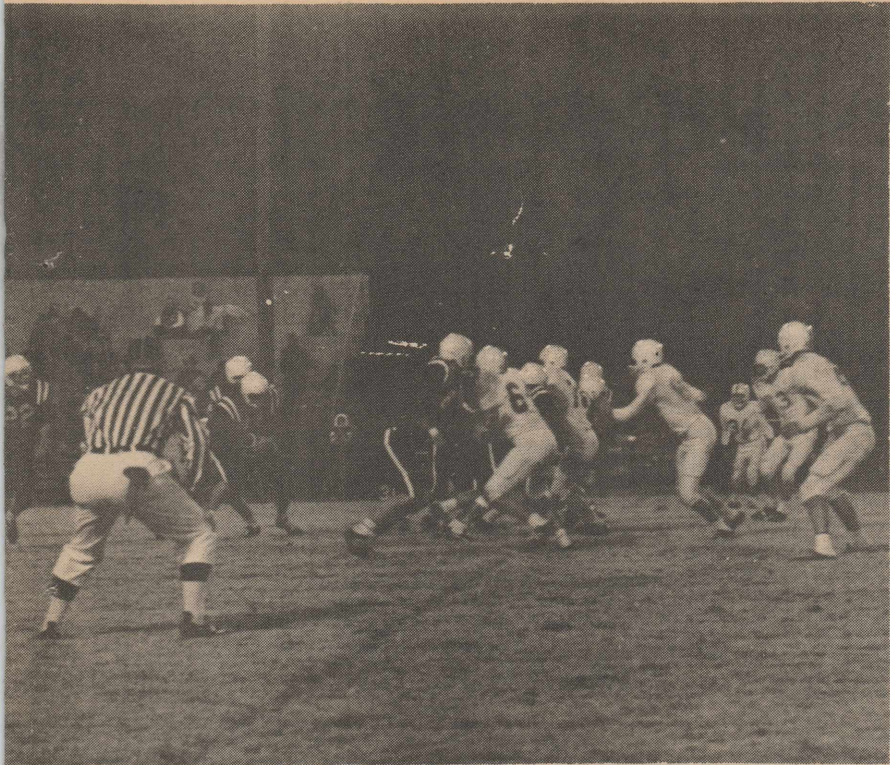
