Midland People Are New Managers of Haskell Drive-In

Operation of the Haskell Drive-In under new management and a new schedule of opening hours was announced this week by Pete Gresham, former cafe operator in Midland, and Huoy Messick of that city, who will be associated in management of the popular Haskell eating establishment in the future.

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Low-hanging clouds which have kept drouth-conscious Haskell county farmers hopeful since the first of the week, paid off Thursday morning and before noon had dumped almost two inches of moisture on pastures and farm-lands which had been prepared for planting.

It was the heaviest downpour since September, 1950, and was almost equal to the total amount of moisture which has been received since January 1 this year. Total precipitation for the year was 4.67 inches at noon today.

The fall was gauged at 1.90 inches at 11 o'clock on the Government gauge maintained by John B. Martin. Heavy clouds gave promise of additional rain.

Elsewhere in the county the moisture was reported at from one and one-half to two inches.

Today's downpour will be sufficient to insure planting of a record cotton acreage in Haskell county, in the opinion of County Agent F. W. Martin. He estimates that around 220,000 acres will be planted to the staple as a result of the rain. This will be by far the largest acreage ever planted to cotton, he declared.

The moisture, coming in three hard downpours starting at 5 a. m., also provided considerable run-off water for surface ponds and tanks, and will be of untold benefit to grasslands, stockmen said.

Brief News Taken from Old Copies of The Free Press

Soil Conservation Plans Approved For Area Farms

Supervisors of the Wichita Falls Soil Conservation District held their regular monthly meeting recently and approved the following applications for conservation assistance: W. H. Lankford, John W. Wallace, and L. F. Farmer. Conservation plans were approved on the following farms: E. C. Hardin, B. F. Hughes, Mrs. Mattie Russell, T. W. Russell, and P. V. Williams.

Terrace lines are being run on the Lebus Ranch as a part of their conservation plan, and farm roads have been constructed on W. M. Ford, Criss Moody, and the Lebus Ranch as part of their plans. Seeding of King Ranch lucerne grass is progressing with cooperators all over the district using drills. So far this year a total of 1854 acres of this grass has been seeded within the district. This includes waterways, leached for terrace outlets as well as grass seeded for pasture.

Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service are assisting the farmers in the application of these conservative practices. Farmers are also receiving conservation payment assistance from the Production and Marketing Administration.

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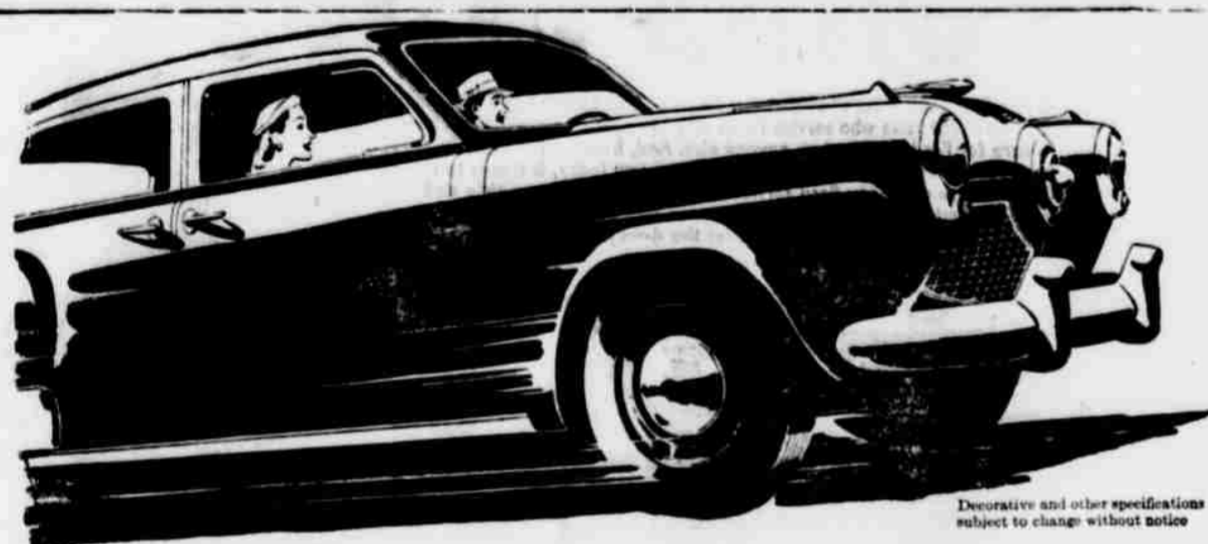
