

Clyde Bulldogs Defeat Eastland, District 9AA Runners-Up

CLYDE — Clyde's Bulldogs are District 9AA runners-up to state ranked Coleman after a 17-7 whipping of Eastland Mavericks here Friday night. The victory left Clyde 4-1 in the district and 7-2-1 for the season. Eastland finished 3-2 and 7-3.

The first quarter looked bleak as Eastland's all-state tailback Howard King powered the Mavericks 72 yards for a 7-0 lead. Then to make things worse, the Bulldogs lost a fumble at their 9-yard line and halfback Ricky Loper came out of the game with an apparent broken finger. Bulldog defense stopped Eastland at the five-yard line and the rest of the game was all Clyde. Loper's finger was only jammed out of place and he finished the ball game.

Clyde moved 81 yards behind the running of fullback Gary Barr, and a 23 yard field goal by Tommy Bailey. Barr carried 2 times for 148 yards. With 15 seconds left in the half, quarterback Jackie Fleming passed backward to Ruben Ramos who then passed 44-yds. to slot-back Jarrell Hurst in the endzone. Tommy Bailey booted the PAT and the Bulldogs took a 10-7 halftime lead to the locker room.

The third quarter was a defensive duel, but the Bulldogs rolled in the 4th stanza. Gary Barr blasted the right side for an 8-yard TD, which capped a 45-yard drive. Bailey kicked the PAT. As the clock ran out, the Bulldogs ended the game with the ball on the Maverick 8-yard line where a Bailey field goal attempt was blocked. The victory ended a 5-year shutout that the Mavericks had built. Ricky Loper carried 17 times for 51 yards during the game. Ramos completed 4 of 7 passes, all to Hurst for 91 yards.

Outstanding defenders were linebacker Barr, tackles Timmy Payne and Johnny York.

BAIRD — The Baird Bears upped their perfect district record to 7-0 by defeating the Wylie Bulldogs 28-8 Friday night in Bulldog Stadium. The Bears will play their bi-district game Friday night in Breckenridge at 7:30 p. m. against the Archer City Wildcats.

The Baird-Wylie game was up to anybody's guess at halftime Friday night. Wylie had 131 offensive yardage to only 23 for Baird. Numerous loads of hard luck was dumped on both teams as they sought to name the district winner. Baird's first touchdown came in the first quarter as Jay Reeves rumbled over from one-yard out, adding the extra point, to put Baird out front 7 points. The play resulted from a fumble recovery by Mike Tollett on the Wylie 3-yard line.

Wylie came alive in the late minutes of the 2nd quarter when Bulldog quarterback Dale Doby connected on a 10-yard pass to Clark Jean, with 1:50 left in the period. Doby passed to Kelley for two points, and the Bulldogs went ahead 8-7.

An estimated crowd of 3,000 watched the Bears come on strong in the last half of the game, and dominate the Bulldogs completely.

Bill Hatchett, Bear halfback, put the team out front by making a body-stretching catch of a Reeves pass, giving the Bears a 13-8 lead. Reeves put the leather over the goal to rest on the concession stand, and the Bears were on the march.

The Bears drove upfield to set up their 3rd touchdown. Good blocking, and an alert line gave Bill Windham the opportunity to carry the ball for the Bears, and Reeves added the 6 points and the point after, making the score 21-0. Windham was successful in racking up 81 yards in 12 carries, and Jimmy Meador added 49 yards in the last half.

Early in the 4th quarter, the dominating Bears traveled 70 yards against a Bulldog team that had lost their leading scorer Joe Bob Stricklin to a knee injury earlier in the game. Jay Reeves went around right end for 9 yards and the final TD of the night. The 160-lb. quarterback added his barefoot kick and the score stood 28-8 and a district championship for the Bears.

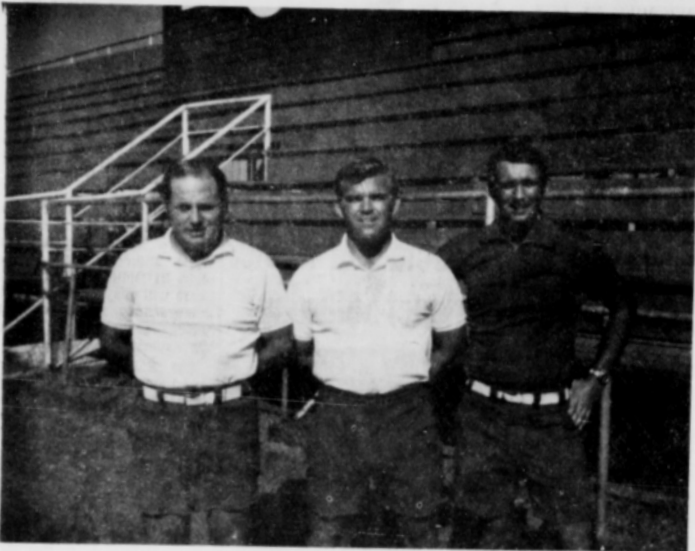
\$1.50 to Business One Party Service, \$1.00 to Residential One and Four Party Service, and 75c to Residential Two Party Service.

Mr. Womack made one final interesting comment in stating that all the proposed increased revenue would not come directly to the telephone company. For federal income tax is expected to take a 58 percent bite of it, and another 7 percent bite goes to the state in franchise taxes.

This is the first time in eight years the Baird Bears have advanced this far in district play.

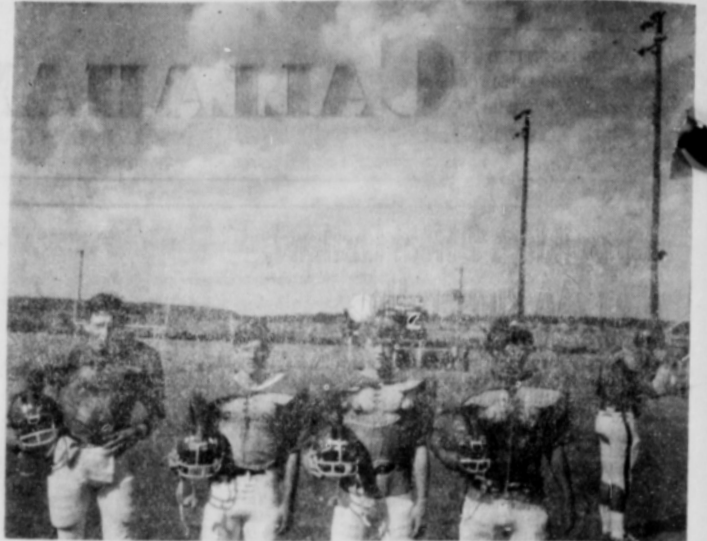

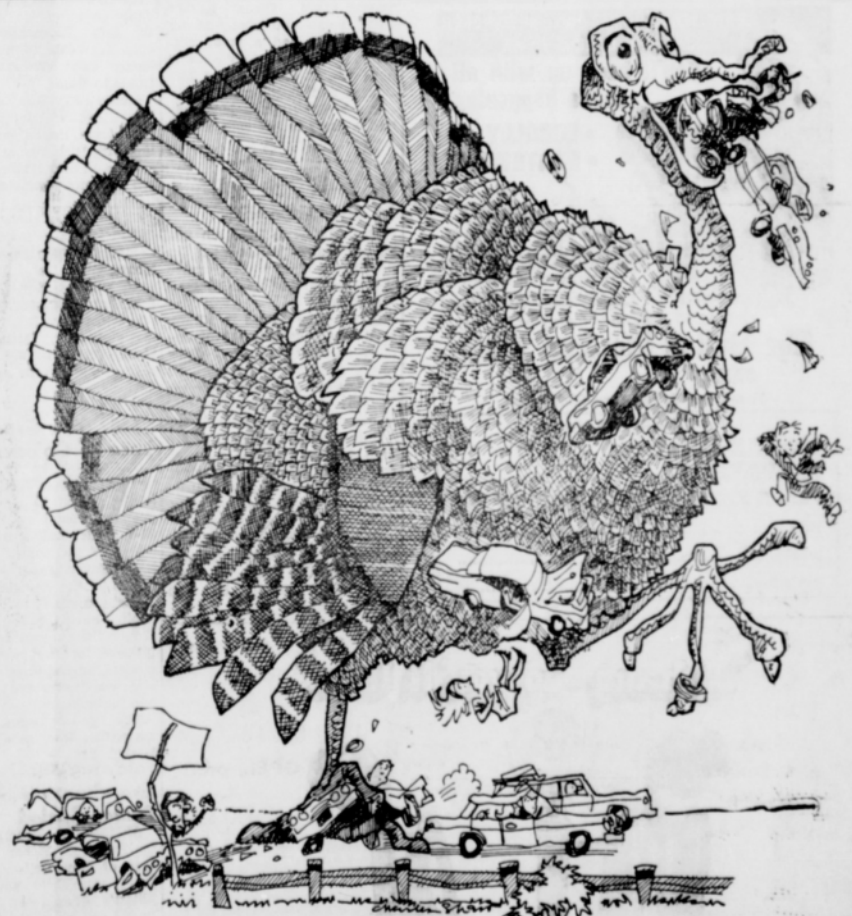

HI-LF Grazing System Increases Production on Cross Plains Ranch

BAIRD — High Intensity - Low Frequency Grazing or Short Duration Grazing is a new grazing system used by C. M. Garrett of Cross Plains. A. H. Ringhoffer, SCS at Baird, stated that in this system Garrett runs all of his cows in one pasture at a time.

The idea is to concentrate cattle in one pasture instead of grazing all pastures year long. Then as the grass is properly used, the herd is allowed to move to the next pasture in the rotation. As a result, a pasture is intensively grazed two to four weeks, depending on the size, then rested 4 to 6 months. "I grew into this system five years ago," Garrett said. "As I completed reseeding my old crop land fields, I had 10 pastures already fenced and by building 3 more ponds I could water each pasture separately," Garrett stated.

In February, 1967, Garrett signed a Great Plains Conservation Program contract to complete the Brush Control and Range Seeding Program which had been started earlier. The contract will be completed this year, stated Ringhoffer.

In addition to the 45 cow herd, Garrett runs on his 380 acre home place, another 350 acre was reseeded and seeded to K.E. Bluestem, Sideoats Gramma and Green Sprangletop. After adding another pond and fencing into 3 pastures, Garrett leases grazing for 125 to 150 steers each year from October 1 to June 1. These steers are run in one herd under a short duration grazing system also.

Ringhoffer stated one reason why the grazing system works so well is that it permits utilization of the less desirable grasses also. Under normal grazing, cattle tend to eat the more palatable plants. This not only puts a stress on the desirable plants, but it allows the undesirable ones to go untouched. Then when choice grasses start regrowth, they have to compete for moisture and sunlight with plants that have been under utilized. This is the cycle that the short duration system helped break.

Garrett says what impresses him most is that the grass continues to get better every year. When I first began operating this place some 35 years ago, 40 cows were all that could be safely run without overgrazing. Now following seeding of improved grasses and using the high intensity-low frequency grazing system, I can run 120 animal units year long without feeding anything except for 1 pound of protein supplement per head per day during the winter months.

Ringhoffer stated that the wide acceptance by ranchers to this system is that it is so flexible that it can fit almost any livestock operation ranging from normal cow-calf to steer or registered cattle operation. Information on how a short duration grazing system will fit a particular livestock operation can be obtained from the Soil Conservation Service personnel in Baird.

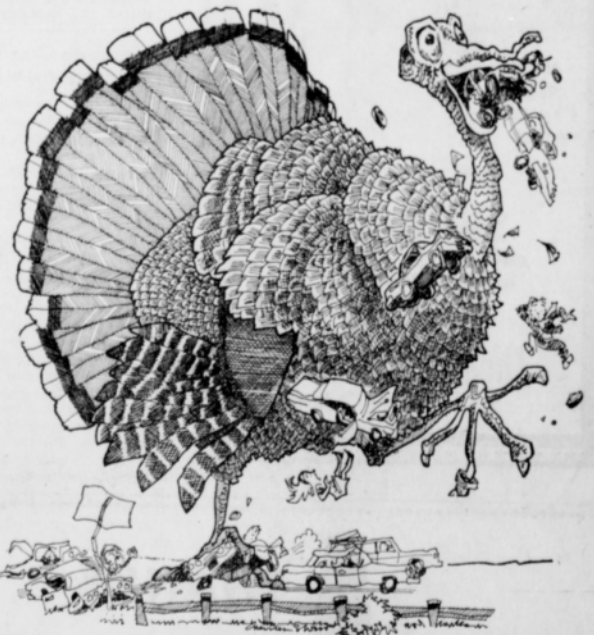
