Conservation Has Saved 5,180 Acres in This District

The Wichita-Brazos Soil Conserva tion District has completed plans with farmers and stockmen on approximately 5180 acres of land. This work is being done with the farmers and not for them as is the general belief. Also, it might be well to mention here that terracing and contour cultivation are just two of the many practices used to increase production and may or may not apply to your farm.

The first thing that is done on farm before planning is started is to make a soils map of it showing the many kinds of soils and its ability to take water.
