Thanksgiving Game to End Season for Greyhounds

SUPERINTENDENT TO ATTEND STATE MEETING IN AUSTIN

More than 5,000 teachers, including Supt. Harold Barnett of Knox City, are expected to attend the seventy-fourth annual meeting of the Texas State Teachers Association in El Paso Nov. 27-29.

Miss Ruth Hillier, president, has announced a three-day convention program that includes addresses by a number of distinguished educators.

The convention opened Wednesday morning with a special Thanksgiving Service, and will be climaxed Nov. 29 with a meeting of the 500-member House of Delegates. The closing session will include the installation of new officers for the 52,000 member organization.

Featured speakers include Dr. E. T. McSwain, of Northwestern University; Dr. John Bracken of Clayton, Mo.; Judge Harold Kessinger of Ridgewood, N. J.; and W. W. Jackson of San Antonio, member of the State Board of Education.

Nine discussion groups will thrash out professional problems, ranging from curriculum development to public relations, on the second day of the convention.

Mr. Barnett, who will represent District 7 in the House of Delegates, was to be initiated into the Red Red Rose, national education association for administrators, Wednesday night. He left for Austin Tuesday, accompanied by C. D. Landolt and Thomas Justiss, superintendents at Sherman and Paris, respectively.

The game was originally scheduled to be played at Lueders last Friday night, but was changed to the holiday date to give more people an opportunity to enjoy the contest.

The teams should be fairly evenly matched, with Knox City having a little better record and being favored to win.

Coaches Slaughter and White say the 'Hounds are in better shape than they have been in this season since the opening game, when almost the entire backfield was taken out, and that they'll be "out to win" in the Thanksgiving game.

Local fans—who have been hungry for a win all season—are expected to turn out in large numbers for the game.

The Greyhounds' schedule for next season has been announced by Supt. Harold Barnett. So far the schedule has two open dates, but school officials expect games to be played on those dates, Sept. 25 and Oct. 16.

Football practice will begin Sept. 1, and school will probably open Sept. 7, the superintendent said. The first game will be with Blanket at Blanket, Sept. 11. The schedule for the rest of the season is as follows:

GOVERNMENT TRAPPER GIVES 7-YEAR REPORT

A seven year report of kills has been made by A. B. Coppedge, Government Trapper who headquarters in Benjamin.

Listed in the report were 2,496 coyotes and 136 bobcats.

Control of these animals has saved the people of Knox County many thousands of dollars, not only in stock and poultry saved from the animals killed, but from the ravages of the offspring of this large number.

The trapper has killed more than 60 coyotes this month.

Services of the government trapper may be secured by contacting him, as his services are rendered where requested and where the greatest need arises.

Soft, slow rain Sunday and Monday went a long way toward breaking the drought in Knox County, but so far, County Agent Bill Pallmeyer says, it "just isn't enough."

Knox City received a total of 1.55 inches during the two-day rain—the most since August 22, 1951, when we had 2.35 inches.

Benjamin also received 1.55 inches, and slightly more was reported from the Truscott and Gilliland communities.

The rain fell in a slow, steady drizzle most of the time, with the only hard downpour coming early Monday night.

The rain will be of untold benefit to wheat growers, according to Pallmeyer, who estimated that about 50,000 acres in the county has been seeded to grain, and perhaps half as much again will be planted since the rain.

"For ranchers, though," he added, "it's too late to help the grass, and it fell too slow to fill stock tanks. It will help replenish the sub-soil moisture, but we need a lot more to go with it."

Although the rain clouds disappeared in front of the cold spell that hit Tuesday morning, Knox County farmers are hoping they'll be back, and that the 30-month drought in Texas has been broken.

Drillstem tests in the Strawn failed to recover any oil in the Katz & Venable No. 1 Keny & Wiltbanks, three miles west of town, and operators are drilling at about 5,500 feet, looking for the Caddo formation.

It was also reported that the A. R. Dillard No. 1 R. V. Burton, about six miles east of town, tested the Strawn and found on show, and operators are drilling ahead.

New location for Knox County is the Hunt Oil Co. No. 1 Bobby D. Burnett, about 9 1/2 miles northeast of Benjamin and 13 miles northeast of The North Knox City Palo Pinto field. The wildcat venture is scheduled for 6,500 feet.
