S. Paris Keller, West Texas rancher for more than 30 years, died Friday in a Dallas hospital following a long illness. He owned the 8,000 Keller Ranch in Haskell and Stonewall counties.

Keller was born in Hamilton county and moved to Haskell county where he first farmed, 10 miles west of O'Brien, and later entered the ranching business.

Funeral services were held at the O'Brien Baptist Church Sunday with Rev. C. A. Powell, pastor of the church, officiating, assisted by Rev. E. V. Becker, pastor of the Knox City Baptist Church.

Burial was in the Rule cemetery.

Twenty-six Agricultural workers from Knox, Haskell and Baylor counties met in Munday recently for the purpose of organizing a district Agricultural Workers Council. Purpose of the organization will be to coordinate agricultural thinking, recommendations, and work.

Membership of the Council, consisting of agricultural workers, farmers and ranchers, will meet once a month to discuss current problems. A program will be planned for each meeting, and speakers will be invited to appear before the group.

A temporary program committee consisting of Roy Saunders of Munday as chairman, Roy McClung, Baylor County Agent, Frank Martin, Haskell County Agent, and Bill Pallmeyer, Knox County Agent, was appointed by the group which consisted of farmers, ginners, PMA members, SCS workers, FHA advisors, PCA members, vocational agriculture teachers, and veterans agriculture instructors.

Munday was selected as the site for the monthly meetings, and in addition to the planned organization of the Council, irrigation possibilities was selected as a topic for the first meeting, with the chairman instructed to obtain a speaker for the program. A meal will be served at the beginning of the meeting, and those in attendance at the first meeting are to contact other farmers, ranchers and workers to increase membership.

Set up of the organization is to be patterned after the District Agricultural Workers Council now in operation in Wichita, Clay and Archer counties.

George Moffett Announces for Re-election to Senate

The Herald is authorized to place the name of Senator George Moffett, of Chillicothe, in its announcement column as a candidate for reelection to the State Senate from the twenty-third Senatorial District, composed of Archer, Baylor, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, Haskell, King, Knox, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger and Young counties.

Senator Moffett is well known over the district which he represents. He has been a leader in the State Legislature for several years, and is the author of more amendments to the State Constitution than any other member. They range from mandatory redistricting to speeding up court procedure, and permitting servicemen to vote without the payment of a poll tax. He is also author of the County Veteran's Service Officer law.

Often called "Cotton George", Senator Moffett has vigorously championed efforts to find new markets for farm and livestock products—especially cotton. He says that cotton puts more money into more peoples' pockets than any other source in the State, and that livestock men need an abundance of cottonseed products, which are sure to be available if there is a good market for the lint.

Senator Moffett has been Chairman of the Agricultural Committee in the State Senate for many years, and has also been Chairman of the Committee on State Affairs, which is considered by some to be the most important committee in the Senate. He has shown interest in matters of statewide importance, as well as those affecting his district, including oil development, the schools and war veterans. He is regarded as being an independent, middle of the road thinker, who votes his honest convictions. He voted against the Auto Inspection Law, while most members voted for it. He served as an enlisted man in World War I, and is the first native of this district to represent it in the Senate.

"The time has come," states Mr. Moffett, "when we must conduct our public affairs with the greatest possible foresight, prudence and honesty. Essential functions of government must be continued, but waste must be eliminated. I will sincerely appreciate your vote and support in the July primary election."

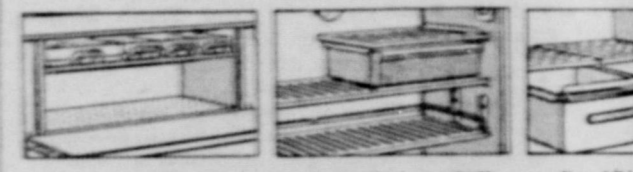

By Ozelle Stephens

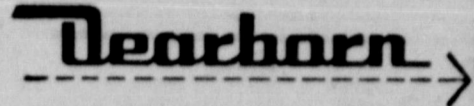
"In all thy ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct thy path." Prov. 3:6.

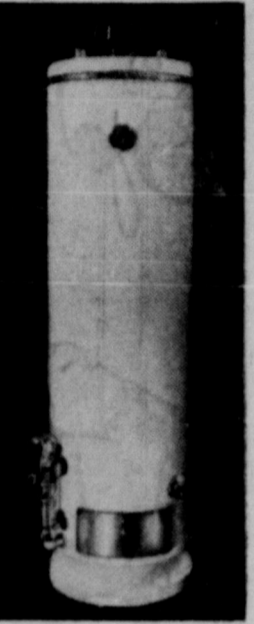
