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





Compensation to farmers for reducing their 1957-crop winter wheat acreage below their wheat 15, at 2 p. m. in the banquet room allotment, designating such acreage for inclusion in the Soil Bank's acreage reserve program, will be in the form of negotiable certificates, R. G. Shrauner, chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, has announced

in cash through regular banking channels, or they may be redeemed in grain by the producer to whom they are issued. The certificates will be issued after the County ASC Committee can determine that the acreage-reduction requirements of the program have Shrauner explained that the

amount of compensation for wheat on the farm will be determined by multiplying the base unit rate per bushel for the county by smaller of (1) the normal yield for the farm or (2) the normal yield mulated. Beta Chi will be repre for the land designated in the multiplied by the number of acres determined as the acreage for compensation. The base unit rate per bushel varies by counties.
