

## Eagles hoping to soar under James

MAPLE — Danny James never got the Xs and Os out of his system.

So when the Three Way Independent School District offered him the chance to be both the school principal and high school football coach this year, he decided to tackle it.

James quit coaching two years ago when he was named the principal at Whitharral, where he was the head football coach the three previous years.

He knew he'd miss the Friday night lights. But he was surprised by what he missed the most.

Sitting in his office and watching the coaches and players head out to practice every day left him with an empty feeling.

"I missed the association with the kids," James said. "I never really thought I enjoyed the practices. But I probably missed them more. I missed working with a group of kids toward a goal, and seeing if we could accomplish it."

Although he wouldn't admit it, the "country boy" from Puducah looked more at ease in shorts, T-shirt and a straw hat than he did a half-hour earlier

behind a desk, wearing a shirt and tie.

"I'm not a dictator as an administrator," said James, in a soft voice with just a hint of West Texas drawl. "I feel like it's a team effort. As a coach, I don't feel any different."

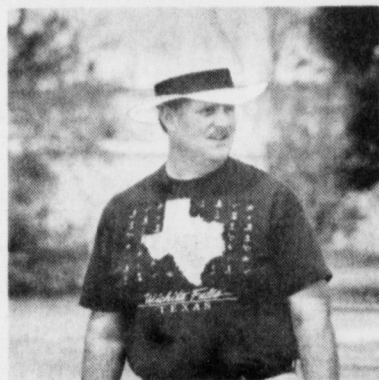
"He's a coach, but he's a principal first," said Bill Hood, who took over for long-time Three Way Superintendent Don Parker last December. "He knows the education of the kids comes first. Most of the time we talk, we discuss the educational aspect. I leave the coaching to him."

James took the farm-to-market road path to Three Way, with stops in Follett, Guthrie, Matador and Whitharral.

Small towns suit him fine. He's been a six-man coach most of his 15-year career.

"The kids looked like they were having so much fun," James said, remembering the first time he saw the game that is played on a 80x40-yard field." In six-man, you

## Muleshoe receives housing grant

The City of Muleshoe will receive a \$312,000 housing grant from the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs.

The grant is for rehabilitating low-income housing.

The City originally applied for a \$200,000 grant, but received word this week that the Housing & Community Affairs Board approved a grant for \$312,000.

"We're really excited about this," said Muleshoe Mayor Robert Montgomery. "It's a real good deal for the town. And the best part is it didn't have to come from the city coffers."

The grant was secured and will be administered by Housing Services, a private consulting firm in Austin specializing in state housing grants. The firm's \$12,000 fee is covered by the grant.

"We're looking forward to working with the city to implement the project," said Housing Services President Bruce Spitzengel. "We'll try to get it done as quickly as we can."

Spitzengel said it will take about two months to receive the grant funding, and his company expects to start taking

## New Texas Parks & Wildlife system makes licensing easier

A new computer system makes it easier to get hunting and fishing licenses from Texas Parks & Wildlife.

Licenses are available at just two locations in Muleshoe, the Bailey County Clerk's Office and Alco. All state licenses, stamps and permits are available at the outlets.

The system, called the Texas Outdoor Connection, links local outlets directly to the main office in Austin.

The automated process both speeds up the license processing time and simplifies book-keeping.

The new licenses, which look like credit card receipts, are placed in a laminated pouch designed to fold up and fit in a wallet.

## Muleshoe readies for annual Mule Days

MULESHOE— The City of Muleshoe will honor its heritage Labor Day weekend with its annual Muledays celebration.

Numerous events are planned, including the Tour De Muleshoe bicycle race, a mule rodeo, a golf tournament, the Rotary Club Team Roping and the Joe's Boot Shop World Championship On-Foot Goat Team-Roping.

Joe's Boot Shop will be the center of activity beginning Thursday, Aug. 29, as goat team roping jackpots begin at 7 p.m. in Joe's World Championship On-Foot Goat Roping Arena, set up on the boot shop parking lot.

Practice runs for the on foot goat team roping will take place all day Friday, Aug. 30, with more jackpots on Friday night, beginning at 7 p.m.

While there is a \$1 per team entry fee for the nightly jackpots, there are no fees for practice runs all day Friday.

The World Champion On-Foot Goat Team Roping will begin Sat., Aug. 31, at 9:30 a.m. and run through 5 p.m. No entry fee will be charged and anyone is eligible to enter. There is no limit to the number of times a person may enter, as long as they do not rope with the same partner twice. Partners may enter up and back, however.

Prizes will be awarded in eight age groups, with first and second place teams in each division winning their choice of an American Bangora or Guatemalan Palm Leaf straw hat.

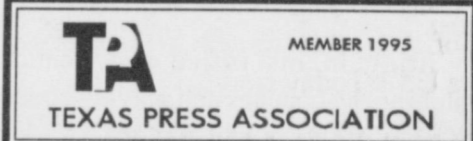

## Morales: from front seat to center stage

MESQUITE — U.S. Senate candidate Victor Morales is going Prime time.

Morales, whose grass-roots campaign has gained national attention, will address the Democratic National Convention in Chicago in a prime-time speech shortly after 9 p.m. Tuesday.

The former Mesquite school teacher gained notoriety earlier this year for conducting his campaign all across Texas from the front seat of his 1992 Nissan pickup.

Morales is running against Republican incumbent Phil Graham.

## Irrigation draining on water supply

Demands for water could exceed supply in some parts of Texas by the year 2030 without planning for conservation, waste prevention and drought management, according to the Texas Water Development Board.

The state population has doubled since 1950, and is expected to continue to increase.

Irrigation accounts for about two-thirds of the annual water use in the state, with the High Plains region drawing 4 million acre-feet a year from the Ogallala aquifer.

## World grain production appears healthy

World grain production in 1996-97 is expected to exceed consumption for the first time in four years, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The world grain trade is projected to be the lowest in 10 years as more countries will rely more on their own crops and less on higher-price imports.

## Corporate executives slam-dunking big \$

Professional athletes aren't the only receiving megadeals to switch teams.

This is also the era of free-agent executives, when guys who crunch numbers earn as much as guys who can slam-dunk basketballs.

Alex Mandal quit Monday as the president and chief operating officer of AT&T to take over an infant wireless communications company called Associated Communications Corp. He got \$20 million signing bonus and a promise of 18% of the growth in the firm's market value, according to a USA Today story.

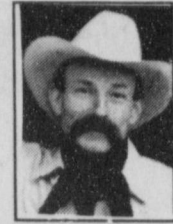

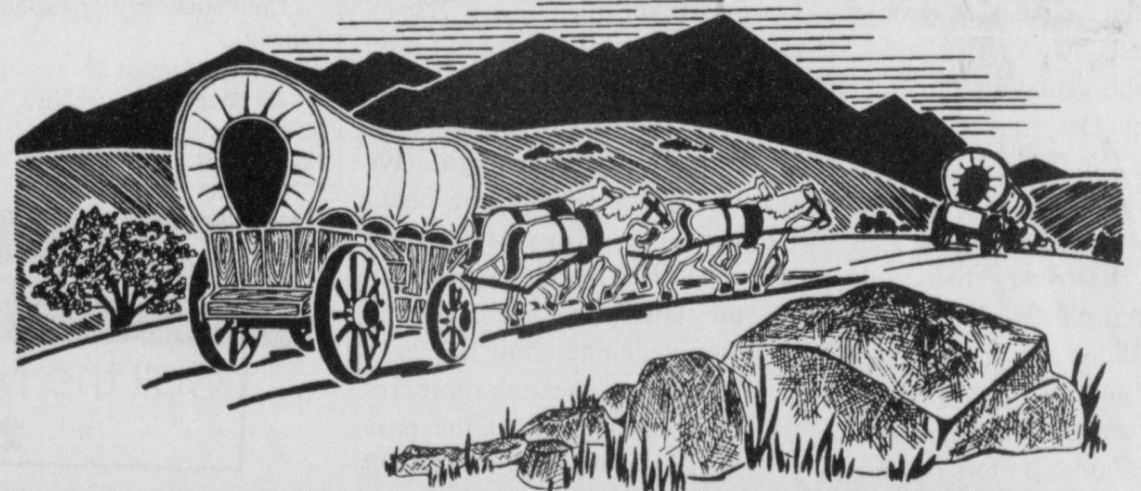

design plays to get the ball to every kid on the field."

At Three Way, he's inheriting a veteran team that finished 5-4 last year. The Eagles were 2-3 in District 2-1A, which includes two-time defending state champion Amherst.

The Eagles return four starters on both offense and defense. Senior co-captains Jesus Perez, Lupe Landeros, Kyle Kindle and Chris Soliz have started since they were freshman.

"I think we're going to surprise a few people this year," said the hard-hitting Landeros, who plays fullback and line-backer. "We've got some good young players coming up, and we've got some pretty good leadership."

James, who preaches fundamentals and a running game, is the Eagles fourth coach in five years.

"This situation needed stability," James said. "They needed someone to come in, stay awhile, and develop the talent. If we have some success early, we can be a factor in who's playing in November and December."

It's been 11 years since Three Way won its last district title in 1985.

Last year, Three Way operated mostly out of the spread offense, rolling up plenty of points but giving up just as many most nights.

James prefers the more tra-

ditional I-formation.

James is a believer that even in six-man football, where scores routinely run up into the 60s, it's important to be able to run the ball and control the clock.

Perez returns at quarterback, splitting duties with the versatile Soliz, who practices at all six offensive positions. Perez has the better arm, but the Eagles also need his quickness at tailback. Junior Randall Rodriguez will also log time at tailback.

Kindle and junior Cody Wilson are the top receiving threats.

"We want to make sure we beat the people we're supposed to beat, then step up and beat few of the big dogs," James said.

In this case, that would be preseason favorite Whitharral, which returns most of its players after reaching the state quarterfinals last year, as well as Lazbuddie and up-and-coming Silverton.

James warned not to forget about Amherst.

"They're no stepchild," James said. "They might have lost (all-world running back) Dwayne Miles, and (head coach Jack) Sealy is gone, but they still have some talent and they've learned how to win."

James appeared more relaxed talking about the pass than the TAAS as he walked

toward the Eagles' field, which is surrounded on two sides by knee-high milo just starting to head out.

"That's *awright*, isn't it," drawled the country boy in

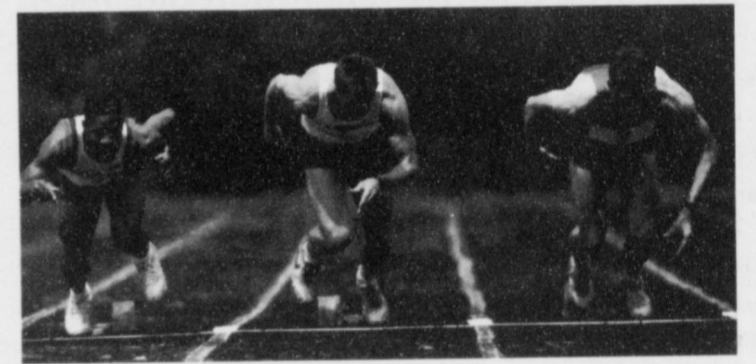

Out on the lake, in the middle of the night, a storm has come up, and the disciples are straining at the oars "because the wind was against them."

You know the feeling, don't you? We're in the same boat.

Often in our own journeys, the wind seems to be against us. It blows in the form of trials that test our faith, weaknesses in ourselves or others that cause us pain, bad decisions complete with unpleasant consequences, awful diagnoses, sudden tragedy.

Sometimes we've steered a wrong course and are in treacherous waters. We should have been wiser sailors. We should have consulted the Captain of our souls, His compass, His chart.

Sometimes, the storm is simply upon us and the most experienced

sailor in the world could not have seen it coming. But come it did.

Several of the disciples on the Sea of Galilee that night were experienced sailors who knew its every league, every fathom, every eddy. From the sea, they had made their living, but suddenly they are faced with the prospect of dying there.

At around 3:00 AM, in the middle of that dark night, Jesus goes "where no man has gone before" (at least not without a boat), walking on the water. He hears their cry for help, and He gets into the boat.

On the sea that night, the disciples had lots of fear, precious little faith—just enough to let their Lord get into the boat. 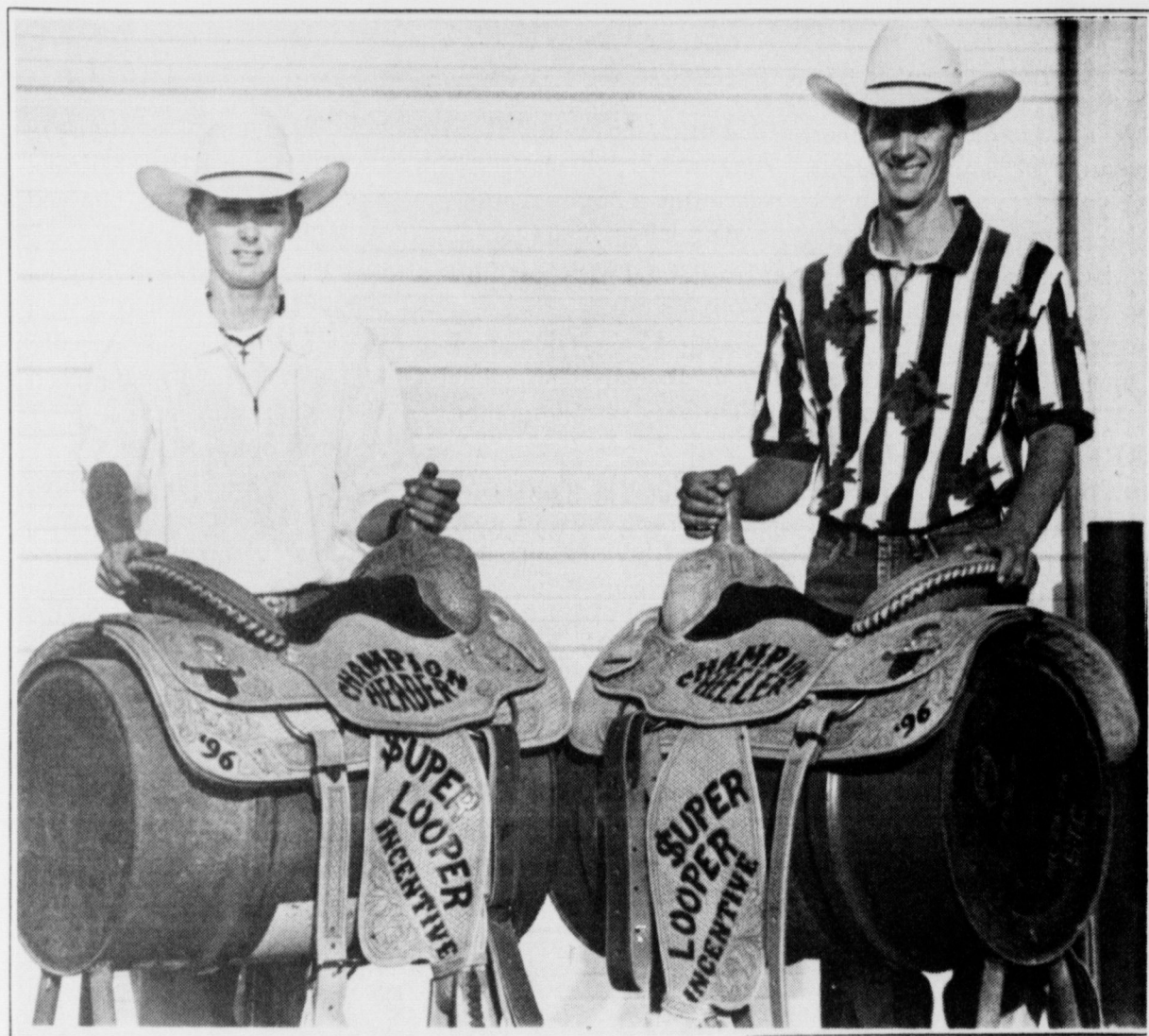

ALBUQUERQUE, NM — Muleshoe's Myers family made its mark at the recent Super Looper Southwest Regional team roping finals at Tingley Coliseum.

Competing in the #8 incentive of the #11 roping, Clay Myers and his uncle, Thurman Myers, put together eight solid runs to win new trophy saddles and almost \$4,000 apiece at the United States Team Roping Championships' second-largest event. Only the USTRC National Finals is bigger.

\$1,800 per man.

For eighth consecutive runs, the duo average a rapid 8.97 per run.

For Clay, a Muleshoe High graduate who will attend West Texas A&M this fall, it was his first trophy saddle. He plans to compete in team roping for WTAM, which is a member of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association's Southwest Region. He is the son of C.L. and Jamie Myers of Muleshoe.

Thurman, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Myers of Muleshoe, is married to the former Rhonda Dunham. They have three children, Madison, Jackson and Garrison.
