Sample receipts increased Spotted. this week due mostly to cotton harvested last weekend. According to the USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service, 1,572 samples were classed this ' week week bringing the season's total to 2,653. This compares with 55,800 samples classed by the same date last year.

Quality statistics for the week ending Dec. 3, 1971, show a decline in the quality of cotton classed. This is due partially to the increased percentage of shorter staple, stripper-type cotton harvested.

> School Large litters are always necessary for efficient production. This can easily be the determining factor in making a profit from a swine operation, particularly when prices are down. Following are some pointers on producing larger litters:

1) Condition of sow or gilt at breeding time - it is always best to have the gilts on limited feed of 3 to 4 pounds of 16 pernisspelled. They were Todd cent protein feed per day starting 8 to 9 weeks before breeding (gilts should not be

period). Then about 2 weeks purebreds. before breeding, the gilts need to be flushed by increasing the percent feed to about 8 pounds per gilt per day or selffeeding until immediately after they are bred. Then the amount of feed should be cut back down to about 4 pounds per day, depending on the type of pasture until about 15 days degrees F before farrowing. (At this time, the amount should be increased to about 5 pounds per day). It is recommended that first litter ilts gain about 75 pounds

Breeding sows on the first heat cycle after weaning is commended to get the sow back into production sooner. the weaning process served as flushing stage for the sows. butting sows on full feed before breeding and waiting until the second cycle will cause them to ect too fat. This contributes to poor conception and embryo development, small litters, and

(6) Age of the sow affects the litter size some. She will normally increase the number per litter up until about her fifth litter, then she will taper off slowly for about 5 litters, then drop rapidly.

In summary, for more pigs per litter at birth, one should flush the gilts; breed gilts on third heat cycle instead of the first; not let the gilts or sows get too fat: hand breed twice, 12 to 34 hours apart, use cross-bred

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
