

Appreciation Dinner Held For Custom Harvesters

What do you do to show your appreciation to custom combine crews who return year after year to harvest your crops . . . who wait out the rain and bad weather. . . who never complain, just do their job? These were some of the thoughts in the minds of Bob Brown, businessman, and James Smith, farmer, last week as they observed the crews who had waited patiently for weeks to begin the local harvest.

The two men put their heads together and came up with the idea of an appreciation dinner -or in local terms, a fish fry. After contacting the Brazos Valley Young Farmers to assure the use of their building and volunteers to cook the fish, Brown and Smith got on the phone and called local businesses who support the combine crews. Counting Brown's business, Munday Tire and Appliance, and Smith's farming business, there were 16 merchants and organizations participating in the appreciation dinner.

The affair was held at 7 p.m. Saturday, June 6, in the Young Farmers show barn. Following the "pass the word" invitations, approximately 114 guests registered, representing 10-12 custom combine crews. One of the crew bosses stated that in his 35 years in the business, he had never witnessed such a display of appreciation.

Local farmers would find it difficult to make it through the harvest season without the assistance of these combine crews. Their dedicated service and their patronage of local businesses are only two of the reasons the community united to show their appreciation. There are not many professionals who would patiently wait through day after day of wet weather to harvest another man's crop. These crews did, and for that, this entire farming community is in their debt.

City Sets Guidelines For New Dumpsters

(Guidelines have been established by the City for the newly installed trash dumpsters. To further explain, the following article was written by Jim Slayton, City Administrator.)

The moment we've been waiting for has finally arrived. . . the new garbage truck and dumpsters are here.

The dumpsters should be in place by the end of the week. Please continue to put garbage in your cans until the regular weekly garbage pickup has been completed for this week. Then please start using your dumpster or rollout cart. If you use your cans next week, they will not be picked up. Pickup days will remain the same as in the past for the time being. The City may change the schedule at a later date if it is neces-

The lids on the dumpsters have some rules listed on them. However, these rules are not the rules that the City will use. We still will not be able to dispose of grass clippings, brush, leaves, household appliances, fireplace ashes, furniture, dead animals, batteries, tires, motor oil and filters. These items must be taken directly to the Haskell Regional Landfill - with the exception of grass clippings, brush, limbs and leaves. The City provides a place for these items at the City Warehouse every Saturday morning from 9 a.m. to 12 noon. Dumpsters will be periodically checked to ensure that the above items are not being thrown in them. If you notice someone using your dumpster who is not supposed to use it, please record their license number and call it in to City Hall. We will prosecute any and all violations. Fines will be assessed to all responsible parties if violations are found.

The dumpster that is assigned to you is your responsibility. The location of the dumpsters may be changed by the City if we feel an adjustment is necessary. No one else is allowed to move a

Rains Continue . . .

Miller Creek Reservoir Five Feet Over Spillway

Generally speaking, when you don't like the weather in this part of Texas. . . just stick around 24hours and it will change. Not so for the past few weeks. Local residents have been forced to "grin and bear it", as the rains continue to fall.

Farmers and custom harvesters have been plagued by the recent stretch of rainy weather. Most wheat and potato fields are floating in water, with more rain pre-

A check with Dolan Moore of North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority revealed that Miller Creek Reservoir was at 39.01 feet Monday morning. As "full" is 34.54 feet, this reading is approximately four and a half feet over the spillway.

Moore stated that the water is all the way up to the cattle guard by the treatment plant, neccessitating employees to use a boat when checking the spillway. Not only that, but the water is still coming! Run-off rainfall will continue to pour into the lake for the next few days, bringing the water level even higher. Moore expects this to be the third year in a row for the lake to be running over on the first of July.

Elsewhere around town, evidence of the weather continues to build. Quality Implement had water inside the building Monday morning, following the heavy weekend rains. Some farm to market roads in the area were virtually impassable, except with four-wheel drive vehicles. Also, firemen were called to the home of Chris and Penny Phillips, east of town, during the Sunday afternoon storm after lightening struck the residence.

Long-range forecasts call for a wet month, with rain predicted all through June. Now, that's a lot of grinning, folks!!!



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

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

Estimate Your "Fat Cap" Estimating the recommended amount of fat in your diet can be complicated. Kristen McNutt, president of the nutrition education and health marketing firm Consumer Choices, Inc., has suggested the following simple way to arrive at a rough estimate

Step 1 - Write down your daily caloric intake. (For example, 1,500.)

of your limit on the calories from

fat that you can use, or your "fat

Step 2 - Cross out the last digit in the number for the daily caloric intake. (In this example, 1,500 becomes 150.)

Step 3 - Divide by 3 to get your "Fat Cap". $(150 \div 3 = 50 \text{ grams of})$

In the above example, the person calculating his or her "fat cap" has found that the appropriate fat consumption per day is about 50 grams.

For small framed or sedentary people, a "fat cap" of 50 grams is generally a good guide, but joggers and people with bigger bodies might be able to use as much as 100 grams per day.

Facts About Using Sunscreen Generously apply sunscreen 30 minutes before going outside to give it time to penetrate the skin. Be sure to thoroughly rub sunscreen on the nose, ears, cheeks and shoulders, as they are more apt to get burned. Re-apply sunscreen every three to four hours. Infants younger than six months

should be kept out of the sun and should not have sunscreen applied to their skin.

Your Trash: Your Lifestyle, Your Choice

One of the problems of living in a land of plenty is that there is always plenty left over. In fact, America generates more trash than any other nation in the world. The problem is finding the available land to bury this trash.

"Praise the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits - Who...heals all your diseases..." (Psalm 103:3, 3b).

To realize that God does "Heal all your diseases" is rather a startling statement. Some might ask "If God heals all diseases, why am I or someone I love still sick or handicapped?" Certainly this is a legitimate question, one that deserves consideration.

First of all, physical healing is not always the same for every person. What many are looking for is a restoration to a physically 'whole" state, such as: the terminally ill, completely curéd; the ame, walking; the blind, seeing; etc.

Sometimes healing comes in spite of the disease and even hrough the "hurt" (handicapped condition as might be the case). For example, I knew a lady whose body had been crushed in an accident and there was no way the nedical doctors could restore her lamaged joints and limbs. Her

testimony was that the "healing" came as she was able to find joy and meaning in life, even confined to a bed most of the time. (She was one of the greatest "prayer warriors" I've ever known.)

Now this is not to say it is impossible for God to restore to perfect physical health and wholeness, but that often it is "putting God to the test" to expect such supernatural intervention into the natural world. (For example, to ask God to "grow another arm" for a person whose arm has been amputated.)

We do not "tell God" what to do, how to heal, when to answer prayer. We do not command God, we can only praise Him, confess our need for forgiveness and healing, and lay our petitions and intercessions before Him, always seeking His will in our lives. We must remember that God loves us, that He is faithful, that indeed, He "heals our diseases" - in His time and in His way.



Don't Forget Social Security When Hiring Household Help

In millions of families, both the husband and wife now hold down fulltime jobs. Many of these families are hiring household workers to help them care for preschool age children, or to keep up with daily household chores.

What these increasingly typical American families may not know is that when they hire household help, they are probably required to pay Social Security taxes for the person they employ.

"Family 'employers' may not even realize that they are employers," says Social Security Commissioner Gwendolyn S. King. "And even those who are aware of that fact may not know that their household workers are sacrificing valuable Social Security protection when Social Security taxes aren't paid and when employee's wages aren't reported to Social Security. These workers could lose their eligibility for survivors, disability, retirement, and Medicare benefits -- the entire Social Security coverage

How does a family who hires household help know if they are considered an "employer" under the law?

Generally, if an employer pays a household worker \$50 or more during a three-month period, that employer must also deduct Social Security taxes and report the wages to both Social Security and the Internal Revenue Service.

Also, people who hire a housecleaning firm should check to make sure that the company is meeting its responsibilities of paying Social Security taxes for their employees.

A call to any Social Security office or to any Internal Revenue Service can clarify individual situations. The area Social Security office can be reached at 817-553-1832.

All Social Security benefits are based on a combination of how long an individual works and the amount of wages reported for him or her by each employer. Even part-time, seasonal, or temporary work can increase the future benefit amount for workers and their families. It also may provide current insurance against loss of income if the family breadwinner is disabled or dies before retiring.

Social Security officials note that household workers should make sure that they are getting proper credit for work and that Social Security taxes are paid on their behalf. They can check their wage records regularly by asking the Social Security Administration to provide a free Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement that shows year-byyear figures of the actual wages reported to the agency by employers since 1951.

This statement also projects what an employee's retirement benefits may be and estimates what Social Security benefits may be payable to his or her family in the event of a disabling injury or


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
