When it comes to agriculture in Knox County, there are several areas to cover. For example: cow/ calf, stocker cattle, horse, dairy cattle, row crops, hay, forage, spray drift while applying chemirangeland, etc. Knox County is very diverse. 



New drug aides Alzheimer patients Aricept, a new drug approved normal, Doody feels the treatment

for Alzheimer's disease, improves will be beneficial to a great numthe symptoms and daily function- ber of patients. ing of many patients.

"In the more than 900 mild to moderate Alzheimer's patients studied nationwide, 80 percent showed improvement or didn't get any worse," said Dr. Rachelle Doody, clinical director of the Alzheimer's Disease Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Aricept was tested for five years in clinical trials involving more than 30 centers in the United States. Approved by the Food and Drug Administration in late November 1996, it is expected to be available in most pharmacies by mid-January or early February.

Doctors measure Aricept's effectiveness by using standard Alzheimer's memory evaluation tests and by interviewing patients and caregivers to assess changes in daily functioning.

The drug contains an enzyme that blocks the breakdown of acetylcholine, a neurotransmitter in the brain.

"Acetylcholine is associated with memory and learning and is deficient in Alzheimer's patients," she said. "Blocking the breakdown helps patients keep more acetylcholine in the brain."

The medication is taken once a day and has few side effects.

"Less than 10 percent of all the patients studied had to stop taking it because of side effects," Doody said. "Mild side effects included nausea, diarrhea and vomiting that often went away on their own."

While it cannot stop the progression or make a patient return to

"With the improvement of symptoms or just the slowing of decline, Aricept brings an improved outlook for many patients and their families," she said. "This is not a cure, but it may provide relief while we await a definitive treatment for Alzheimer's."

Here's a no-hassle way to file those income tax returns

Filing a federal income tax re- ' married couples to those who can turn will be as simple as picking up a telephone and "letting your fingers do the filing" with the Internal Revenue Service's paperless system this year.

TeleFile, the IRS's new file-byphone system, is now in its' second year. It is available to about 26 million people nationwide. It offers quick, easy and free tax filing for people who receive the special tax package in the mail. Last year, 246,223 Texans used TeleFile in its first year to be offered nationally. IRS officials in Dallas expect that number to grow significantly this year. A total of 99 percent of the users say that they will use the system again.

According to an IRS 1996 study, 24 percent of all TeleFile users were 20 years old or younger. Thirty-three percent were age 21 to 25, and 29 percent were 26 to 40 years old. More than 92 percent of all users said they were very satisfied with the system.

"No matter what your age is, TeleFile is easy and paperless. And, the best part is, it's free and can be filed directly with the IRS in less than 10 minutes," Bobby Scott, IRS North Texas district director said.

To file by TeleFile, first, you must receive a special TeleFile tax package. If you do, then follow the easy directions inside the package. People who received the packages included those who: have no changes to their name, social security number or address; have less than \$50,000 in taxable income; have W-2 forms for all wages and taxable scholarship or fellowship grants, but no more than five W-2s; have taxable interest income of less than \$400; do not owe any employment wages paid to a household worker.

This year, for the first time, married couple, as well as single taxpayers, without dependents will be able to use the TeleFile system. "TeleFile users told us last year FIND WHAT YOU NEED IN that they wanted the IRS to add

use the system. And we listened. So this year, TeleFile has been expanded to include married couples with no dependents who file jointly," said Scott.

To access and use the system, TeleFilers will need a special personal identification number inside the tax package. Once inside the automated system, the filer is asked to enter wage and tax information from Form W-2 on their phone's keypad. TeleFile automatically calculates the total taxable income, adjusted gross income, amount of refund or balance due, and even the earned income tax credit for those who qualify. After the system pauses to calculate the totals, a recorded voice lists the TeleFiler's adjusted gross income, taxable income and the amount of their refund or tax due. At the end of the call, a confirmation number is given to the caller.

Telefile is available for use 24 hours a day, so it accommodates anyone's work schedule. It is available for the hearing impaired who have access to TDD/TTY equip-

So if you received a special TeleFile package, you are invited to file by phone. It makes filing a tax return as simple as picking up the telephone and calling a friend. Get more information about TeleFile on the IRS Web Site at www.irs.ustreas.gov

Should I be concerned about my water?

About 95% of this country's rural residents use ground water to supply their drinking water and homestead needs. Wells should be designed to provide clean, safe drinking water. If improperly constructed or maintained, your well could allow bacteria, pesticides, fertilizer or petroleum products to contaminate ground water. These contaminants can put family and animal health at risk.

The condition of your well and its proximity to contamination sources determine the risk it poses to your ground water. For ex-17-tfc ample, a cracked well casing may allow bacteria, nitrates, oil or pes-

ticides to enter the well. A fertilizer, pesticide or oil spill near the well could result in the contamination of your family's drinking water supply. Feedlots, animal yards, septic systems, fertilizer applications and waste storage areas can release large amounts of bacteria, nitrate and other contaminants that could pollute your well.

Preventing ground water contamination is very important. Once the ground water supplying your well is contaminated, it is very difficult to restore it to original condition. Most options are costly and could involve treating the water, drilling a new well or obtaining water from another source. A contaminated well can also affect your neighbor's wells, posing a serious health threat.

The Seymour Aquifer office staff is offering a free well assessment to rural residents. The TEX*A*SYST assessment is voluntary and completely confidential. This program involves a series of worksheets used to evaluate your homestead and your well for potential for contamination. The worksheets cover topics such as well head management pesticide storage, fertilizer storage, petroleum storage, and more. If you would like more information or would like a TEX*A*SYST evaluation conducted, please call the Seymour Aquifer Project office at (817) 864-3334.

Timely Tips on New Tax Advantages

hen you sit down at the kitchen table to prepare your taxes this year, you'll probably be thinking, along with a lot of other people, that the trouble with being a breadwinner nowadays is that the government takes such a big slice.

Here is a rundown on several of those new provisions:

* The Internal Revenue Code, in certain situations, now allows penaltyfree withdrawals from Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) for reasons other than retirement.

But there is a small bit of good news: Tax legislation enacted in 1996 may

Withdrawals now are allowed to pay medical bills for you, your spouse or your dependents, but only for expenses in excess of 7.5 percent of your adjusted gross income. Withdrawals also may be made without penalty by those who remain on unemployment insurance for at least 12 weeks; these withdrawals must be used to pay health-insurance premiums.

We're trying to add education costs and first-time home purchases to the list of penalty-free withdrawals.

* The self-employed will enjoy increased tax deductions for their healthinsurance premiums. For the 1996 tax year, the deduction is established at 30 percent of premiums paid.

This deduction jumps to 40 percent for 1997 and will rise incrementally to 80 percent in 2006.

* Beginning this year, the terminally ill and chronically ill may obtain tax-free benefits, often referred to as "accelerated death benefits," from some life insurance policies. This provision contains strict guidelines defining chronic and terminal illness.

* Medical Savings Accounts (MSAs) are now available to a limited number of individuals allowing them beneficial savings plans to pay for their medical expenses. MSAs are tax-deferred savings accounts which are available to self-employed and employer groups of 50 or fewer individuals in conjunction with certain high-deductible health plans (deductibles of \$1,500 -\$2,250 per individual, or \$3,000 -\$4,500 per family). Eligible individuals can contribute up to 65 percent of the amount deductible under their health plan (75 percent for families) to an MSA, and use that contribution to pay for medical expenses, including dental and eye care. Money contributed can be deducted from the business owner's gross income for tax purposes, and accumulates tax-deferred interest.

* Last but not least, one-income families now can benefit from the Homemaker IRA, which I sponsored. The Homemaker IRA raises the limit on IRA contributions for one-income couples from \$2,250 a year to \$4,000 a year, \$2,000 for each spouse. Finally, homemakers are getting equity when it comes to retirement savings.

A single-income couple that invests the new maximum amount annually into an IRA account beginning at age 25 will accumulate \$1.1 million by the time they reach retirement age at 65. (For more information on this, call my Dallas office at (214) 361-3500.)

It's not a perfect system, but we have made it better. I urge all Texans to investigate the advantages these new tax-code rules have to offer.


