





If you tow a trailer, know the speed limit

If you tow a trailer with a passenger car or a light truck, you should be aware of the following which is taken from the transportation code (traffic law book).

"Light truck" means a truck with a manufacturers rated carrying capacity of not more than 2,000 decorating consulting. Phone Denise Pounds, including a pickup truck, panel delivery truck, and carry-all truck. (This would cover 1 ton, 3/ 4 ton, 1/2 ton, and smaller pickup

> Unless a special hazard exists that requires a slower speed, the following is the speed limit: 60 miles per hour in daytime and 55 miles per hour in nighttime if the vehicle is a truck, other than a light truck, or is the vehicle is a trucktractor, trailer, or semi-trailer, or a vehicle towing a trailer, semitrailer, another motor vehicle, or a house trailer of an actual or registered gross weight lighter than 4,500 pounds and a length of 32 feet or shorter, excluding the tow bar; 45 miles per hour if the vehicle is towing a house trailer of an actual or registered gross weight heavier than 4,500 pounds or longer than 32 feet, excluding the tow bar; 50 miles per hour if the vehicle is a school bus (55 miles per hour on interstate highways).

> The important point to remember is that if you are towing a trailer, the speed limit is 60 MPH during daytime and 55 MPH during nighttime. This includes any size or type of trailer.

"Daytime" is the period from 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 min-20-3tc utes after sunset.

Contributions in varying amounts, plus vehicles, farm equipment and other donations that can be raffled or sold have pushed the total toward the eventual goal of \$500,000 for 1996.


