Research Center studying native saltwater plants

. needed at Truscott Brine Lake to help evaporation

The Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center is working on a very interesting project to help solve a problem at the Truscott Brine Lake.

The Truscott Lake was constructed to control the salt level and improve the quality of water in the Red River. It was built to last 100 years, but is now onethird full in less than 10 years. The lake has no outlet works. It is maintained through the action of evaporation on the pool.

The Corps of Engineers contacted Dr. Jerry Cox, Resident Director of Research at Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Vernon, to ask if there was some kind of plants to put around the edges of the Truscott Brine Lake to draw out more water than was occurring through evaporation.

Dr. Cox decided that the best approach to this problem was to travel to coastal areas around the United States and collect plants that can withstand salt water and grow in a climate similar to ours.

Morris Houck, Manager of the Plant Material Center in Knox City, contacted several plant material centers on the south and east coast and has brought in a variety of cord grasses and shrubs which are native to our area. Some of these grasses are at the Munday Research Station and will be transplanted at the lake in August or September if all goes well. Several Munday youth will be given the opportunity to help with the planting.

Maurine Williams, an employee at the Munday research center, is taking care of the plants at the local station and at the Truscott Lake.

Dr. Cox will also be traveling through several states searching for other plants native to the United States for this project.

According to the director of research, the next step is to build several ponds, plant these native grasses in the bottom, sides and around the edges, and then fill the ponds with salt water from the Truscott Brine Lake. The plants will be submerged, partially submerged, and never submerged. In this way it will be determined

Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center's main office is located in Lockett, near Vernon. Munday is one of the smaller branches of the center, as is Chillicothe, and they have 20,000 acres on the Waggoner Ranch.

The combined centers employ around 50 people including a group of scientists - a wheat breeder, an entomologist for cotton and wheat, an agronomist who looks at implements to manage crops, irrigation and drainage, and a ranching group which includes doctors who specialize in grazing systems, an antmal nutritionist, and a plant spe-

"We are here to help the farmers and ranchers stay in business in the future." Dr. Cox said.

Q: What is the Holy Spirit? A: A better question would be: "Who is the Holy Spirit?"

The Bible teaches us that God exists in the form of three persons - God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

God the Father loved us so much He sent God the Son to die for our sins (John 3:16; John 1:1-4, 29-36; Philippians 2:4-11). In turn, God the Son loved us so much that He sent God the Holy Spirit to enpower us to obtain saving grace and to be our guide in the Christian life (Titus 3:5; John 14:16, 26; 15:26; 16:7).

The Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit are not three gods nor are they "part" of God. They are three personalities in one God. Each is a personality with emotions and all three should be referred to as 'He" and never "it". The King James version of the Bible wrongly refers to the Holy Spirit as an "it" while the more modern versions correctly refer to the


