Orchard Fest is quickly approaching - know your cook-off rules!

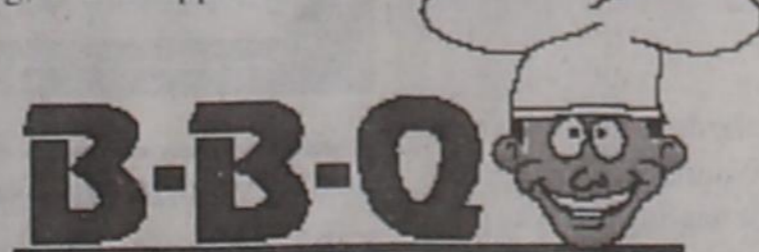
Autumn days means Orchard Fest is almost here and cooks in the area are getting ready for some fun competition and braggin' rights! The brisket, chili, ribs, chicken and dove cook-off, along with many other fun activities, takes place Saturday, September 27th in Hendrix Orchard.

If you're planning on entering the cook-off here are the rules you need to know!

1. All meat must be inspected before cooking begins.
2. No marinating allowed before meat inspection.
3. Turn in 5 slices of brisket, 5 ribs, and 1/4 of a chicken.
4. Meat may be cooked in sauce but, once meat is placed in tray, do not pour sauce on top.
5. No ingredients in chili larger than a bean.
6. No more than 3 people on a cooking team.

Meat must be inspected by 7:00 a.m. Saturday morning on the 27th. Turn in times for the meat categories are: Chili - 11:30 a.m.; Chicken - 12:00 noon; Ribs - 1:00 p.m.; Brisket - 2:00 p.m. Meats must be cooked over wood or charcoal only.

Judging will be based on texture, aroma, taste, smoke ring, overall appearance.

A Breath of Fresh Air

Politics as Usual

"Everything is changing. People are taking their comedians seriously and the politicians as a joke." --Will Rogers

The game of politics is more confusing here in this country than it is, say in North Korea. Many of our citizens have been so turned off by politics that only a fraction of them bother voting. On the other hand, in North Korea, the citizenry is jumping for joy because of its most recent election.

According to the New York Times, when North Koreans recently heard "the happy news," housewives left their houses, children left their schools and workers left their jobs, all "dancing with bunches of flowers in their hands." Why?

You guessed it! By a vote of 687-0, the Supreme People's Assembly of North Korea just re-elected the "The Dear Leader," (better know throughout the world as The Dear Nut Case) Kim Jong Il to his most important post--chairman of the National Defense Commission. Oh yeah, I forgot to tell you, he ran unopposed, winning a five-year term, "reflecting the unanimous will and desire of all the servicemen and the people." (According to the Korean Central News Agency).

Wouldn't it have been fun to watch what would have happened if just ONE member had voted AGAINST Jong? Whoa! That would be even worse than belonging to the Republican Party in Hollywood.

The art of politics is somewhat different in this country. Here, it is almost impossible to become elected--especially if one is a sitting member of Congress. Case in point: during the past forty years, 49 sitting member of Congress have run for President. All of them lost--49 up and 49 down.

Instead, they have been responding to only a shadow of reality--committee hearings, lobbyists, town-hall meetings and other politicians. (Gotta think about getting re-elected, don't ya know).

In addition, they are plagued, as Mr. Brooks states, "with mindless team spirit." The main complaint that many voters have against the system is that apparently kind and intelligent people come to Washington and immediately begin acting like idiots. They tend to make crude partisan statements that only the most lemminglike party hacks could possibly accept at face value. They quickly become experts at charging the other side with dastardly betrayals of the national interest. (Observe the nine present Democrat candidates).

But you know what? They can't help it. After all, it's what is happening in Hollywood. Larry Sabato, political scientist at the University of Virginia, reminds us simply to look at the movies being produced, what's on TV, the language used and the situations portrayed. He asks, "Why should our politics be any different?"

In North Korea on the other hand, at least according to the government news agency, the entire Korean people, including servicemen, old men and women and children are coming out of their houses and work places and dancing with bunches of flowers. They were in colorful dress and children with red scarves sang songs and danced in the street.

Hey, it could happen here. Or not.

Capitol Highlight

Bad drivers to earn points for violations

AUSTIN — While Democrats and Republicans make their points in the ongoing congressional redistricting fight, Texas drivers are going to be paying a lot more attention to something involving another kind of point — marks for bad driving.

Well before anyone imagined the Legislature would be convening in a third special session to argue redistricting, lawmakers did agree on instituting a point system for moving traffic violations. This is how the "game" is played: Drivers with no Class C misdemeanor moving traffic violations on their record started off with no points as of Sept. 1.

Here's the point breakdown: 2 points for a moving traffic violation conviction (speeding less than 10 percent over the limit, seat belt violations and parking tickets don't count) and 3 points for a traffic violation resulting in a crash. At six points, a driver must pay the state \$100 a year for three years to keep driving, and another \$250 a year for three years if they get caught and convicted for driving with an invalid license. And every point above six costs another \$25 a year.

The rate for driving while intoxicated convictions is \$1,000 annually for three years for a first offense and \$1,500 annually for three years for a second conviction. Money raised through this new program will go to benefit hospital trauma centers and highway projects.

TWC, PUC get new officials

The Public Utility Commission welcomed a new commissioner and the Texas Workforce Commission selected a new top chief. Paul Hudson is the newest appointee to the PUC's three-member panel, beginning a six-year term that continues until Sept. 1, 2009. Hudson most recently was director of policy for Gov. Rick Perry.

Larry Temple became executive director of the TWC. Temple was the TWC's deputy executive director and former director of welfare reform.

Remember being a Texan

A new specialty license plate from the Texas Department of Transportation is going to help people celebrate their Texan-ness and remember the Alamo, too.

Designed by artist Benjamin Knox, the plates show an image of the Alamo in front of the San Jacinto monument in front of a Texas flag. Just in case anyone has any doubts, the plates also bear the legend: "Native Texan." Available by mail through TxDOT, the plates cost \$30 above the regular fee for new plates. The legislation that makes these plates possible gives \$22 of the fee to the Daughters of the Republic of Texas for preservation and educational programs and \$8 to TxDOT. For more information on the various other specialty plates available, check TxDOT's Web site at www.dot.state.tx.us.

No limit on clarifications...

The sky's the limit when it comes to dove hunting opportunities in Texas. But the bag limit is not 15 in every county. It's confusing, but getting it wrong can be expensive if a game warden happens to drive up and wants to check your birds. Last year, the mourning dove limit in all three major zones — North, Central and South — was 15. But this year, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department decreased the limit to 12 birds in the Central and South, leaving it at 15 only in the North zone. Though hunters can take three fewer birds per outing, the hunting season was extended to Oct. 30 this year from last year's mid-October end. Best bet: Make sure you know what hunting zone you're in.

Nothing fishy about this...

In addition to changing the dove limits this year, TPWD has dropped the requirement for a person to have a fishing license for angling in a state park. Since Sept. 1, it has been legal to fish in any of Texas' 70-plus state parks without a license.

THE VIEW FROM THE PULPIT

One of the first gifts for my office upon my arrival in Munday was an "Atomic" wall clock. These instruments are amazing. Each comes with a remote unit which receives information via radio or satellite from the official time keeper in the US. I think this process is repeated several times a day. If my personal clock is off by even a fraction of a second, it will be automatically corrected. In addition, it tells both the inside and the outside temperature, the date and the day of the week. As a result, I can with a quick glance determine exactly what time it is, what day of the week I am living in, and the day of the month, along with the inside and the outside temperature. What a GREAT application of technology.

I have also been told of the wonders of GPS location instruments. A friend told me of his first experience with a proprietary brand of GPS system in his automobile. Having just purchased a new vehicle equipped with this wonder, he pressed the button to see how it would work. Immediately a voice message greeted him by name and asked why he had exceeded the speed limit in the school zone through which he was traveling. What a deal!

Long ago, technology was not so accurate. The city of Edinburgh, Scotland devised a clever method of informing ship captains in the local Leith Harbor of the correct time. This was a vital piece of information for their navigation calculations. On a high hill in plain view of the harbor, a tower shaped like an upended telescope was erected. Every morning a large cork ball painted white was hoisted to the top of the tower. A cannon was situated on the battlements of Edinburgh Castle and pointed toward the harbor. At precisely one P.M. every day the cannon fires and the ball drops providing both auditory and visual signals to set the ships chronometers. This allowed those who sailed from the port of Leith to know exactly where they were if their calculations were correct. That's an important element while navigating the ocean.

Even with technological wonders like atomic clocks and GPS navigation systems many people in our world and our community do not know where they are. Oh, everyone has some geographical sense of their location, but too many have lost sight of the essentials in life. God has provided all that we humans need to know ourselves and correct our mistakes. God's word is an everlasting guide for the soul. Do you know where you are?

What Do Rising Interest Rates Mean to Investors?

Long-term interest rates shot up significantly this past summer. If you're an investor, what do these higher rates mean for you?

There's no one simple answer. How you respond to various economic events, such as a higher-rate environment, depends, to a certain extent, on your investment preferences, risk tolerance and financial objectives. Also, in looking ahead, you'd like to know if long-term rates will continue to climb - and that's notoriously hard to predict. But it's interesting to note that the Federal Reserve seems committed, for the near future at least, to keeping short-term rates low - a stance that could also help restrain increases in long-term rates.

But let's take a look at how a change in rates would affect your investments.

Let's begin with stocks. Rising interest rates are frequently accompanied by a strong economy, which generally translates into greater profits for companies - and potentially higher stock prices.

On the other hand, higher rates mean that companies' borrowing costs will increase - so it becomes more expensive for them to expand their operations. This added cost could affect stock prices.

In short, it's impossible to say, unequivocally, that rising interest rates are always good or always bad for stocks. Of course, the best thing to do is hold onto high-quality companies for the long term, regardless of interest rate changes. This is how you create the opportunity to build wealth.

Now, let's consider the impact of rising interest rates on bonds. Unlike the case with stocks, the effect of higher rates on bond prices is clear: when rates go up, bond prices drop. If you have a bond that pays four percent but market rates go up to six percent, nobody will want to pay full price for your bond. So, if you want to sell it before it matures, you'll have to offer it at a price that is less than you paid.

Of course, if you plan on holding your bonds until maturity, you might not care about rising interest rates and falling prices. No matter what market rates are doing, you can expect to receive regular interest payments. And, as long as your bond is of good quality, and has earned an investment grade credit rating by an independent rating agency, you can expect to receive the face value back when the bond matures. Additionally, insured bonds can increase the credit quality even more. (Keep in mind, however, that insurance does not eliminate market risk.)

But even if you do hold your bonds until they mature, you can take steps to blunt the impact of higher interest rates. How? By building a "bond ladder" - a portfolio of bonds with different maturities. When your short-term bonds come due, you'll be able to reinvest them at a higher rate. And if rates start to fall, you'll still have your longer-term, higher-yielding bonds working for you.

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THE COMMON COLD

"I've been snortin' and sneezin' all over the place here lately. Man, I feel rough. I'm pretty sure I've got an old head cold. Is there anything I can do about it?"

The common cold is an infection of the nose, nasal passages, and the throat. It is usually caused by the rhinovirus. This Greek word "rhino" means nose.

Common cold infections are so widespread that there are very few people who escape the infection each year. It has been estimated that adults suffer 2 to 5 colds per year.

Although most cases are mild and usually last about a week, colds are the leading cause of doctor visits and lost days at work and school.

The first symptoms of a cold are often a tickle in the throat, a runny or stuffy nose, and sneezing. Other symptoms may include a sore throat, cough, headache, mild fever, fatigue, muscle aches, and loss of appetite.

So far an effective cold vaccine has not been developed. "Time cures all." That may not be always true, but in the case of the common cold, it's pretty close. Medicine cannot cure the common cold but can be used to relieve some of the symptoms such as muscle ache and headache.

Also, saltwater drops to the nostrils can relieve the nasal congestion. A cool mist humidifier can increase air moisture. Petroleum jelly on the skin under the nose can soothe the rawness. Cough drops can relieve the sore throat.

To avoid catching a cold be sure to wash your hands frequently and avoid close exposure to people with colds. Also, do not touch your nose or eyes after coming in contact with a person with a cold. If you have a cold, always use a facial tissue when sneezing or coughing.

A healthy diet and getting plenty of sleep are also important in helping to prevent colds. Our immune system is also affected by stress. Studies have shown that people are more apt to get a cold after times of psychological stress.

Remember, the common cold is caused by a virus. This means that antibiotics will not help. A cold should never be treated with antibiotics because unnecessary antibiotics can lead to antibiotic resistance where the germs get stronger and stronger over time.

One myth floating around out there is that you should feed a cold and starve a fever. Actually, there is no scientific evidence that excess eating will cure a cold. However, eating tasty food will not make the cold worse and can certainly make you feel better.

Generally speaking a child's doctor should be called if there is increased throat pain; coughing which produces green or gray sputum or lasts more than 10 days; fever lasting several days or over 101 degrees, or if the child has shaking, chills, chest pain, shortness of breath, difficulty swallowing, poor fluid intake, ear pain, enlarged tender glands in the neck, or blue lips, skin or fingernails.

The Meek Blood Center Bloodmobile will be parked at Knox County Hospital from 1:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. Meek Blood Center supplies blood to Knox County Hospital and fifteen other medical facilities in Texas Midwest.

"The entire nation is experiencing a very critical blood shortage at this time. Meek Blood Center has been fortunate to have an adequate blood supply until recently," said Frances Baker, donor recruiter. "Our blood supply has been critical since Labor Day. I am asking the people of Knox County and the surrounding areas to roll up their sleeves and help save lives.

The blood supply is dependent on volunteer donors. Donors must be at least 17 years old, weigh at least 110 pounds and in good health. Aspirin, and most maintenance medications, including blood pressure, cholesterol, thyroid, hormones, and anti-depressants are acceptable. Diabetics who are not insulin dependent are also acceptable. There are some restrictions regarding some medications, certain medical conditions and some travel areas outside the U.S. Those who have questions regarding donor eligibility may call Meek Blood Center at 325-670-2805. Donors are asked to eat a meal and drink plenty of fluids prior to giving blood.

Each donor will receive a coffee mug and a complimentary total cholesterol reading. A test for West Nile Virus will also be done at no charge with written permission from the donor. Results on both tests may be obtained two days after the blood drive by calling 325-670-2799.

Commissioners' Court

Be it Remembered on the 11th day of August 2003 there was conducted a Regular Meeting of the Honorable Commissioners' Court of Knox County, Texas, at the Courthouse thereof, in the City of Benjamin, Texas, for the purpose of transacting any and all business that may lawfully be brought before the same.

Knox County Judge Greg Clonts called the Regular Meeting to order at 1:35 P.M. at the Courthouse in Benjamin, Texas. Other County officials present were Commissioners Weldon Skiles, Jerry Parker, Jimmy Urbanczyk, and Johnny Birkenfeld, Sheriff Dean Homstad, Treasurer Penny Brown, Director of Aging Services Susan Cockrell, and Clerk Ronnie Verhalen.

The court considered the following matters as posted and filed for Record in the office of the County Clerk on July 25, 2003, at 2:42 P.M.

Upon motion by Commissioner Birkenfeld and second by Commissioner Skiles, the Court voted unanimously to approve the Minutes of the Regular Meeting of July 14 and the Special Called Meeting of July 22, 2003.

The Court received an Extension Office Activity and Travel Report submitted by Jane Rowan. Information Only.

Commissioners' Court next considered Road and Bridge issues. Several related matters were discussed: Commissioner Urbanczyk had gathered information concerning comparative paycales for roadhands in Baylor and Haskell Counties. Members discussed replacement for County equipment in the future. Also receiving attention was the use of County graders for use in fire control in the County. Information only.

Director of Aging Services Susan Cockerell gave the Court a report for July, generally relating that the outlook is now better than it has been recently. She reported on meals served, percentages paid, and home deliveries. (C.C. Minutes, 8-11-03, #1)

I live in Falls County and my adorable hubby picked up two (3 gallon) Hibiscus plants over the week-end. I have never attempted to grow these beauties.

One is a Hibiscus Assorted (Hibiscus rosa-sinensis assorted) and from the dropped bloom, in the planter, appears that it'll have an apricot colored bloom. This plant has the glossy leaves and a couple of buds on it now.

The other plant is labeled Plumbago Blue** (Plumbago auriculata 'Imperial Blue') and this one has a bunch of small blue blooms with a different type leaf, more of a skinny, dull green...but such a lovely plant.

Now, my question(s) is this, (1) where will they survive best? I have a back (next to the house/under the eaves) flower/planting area that faces south (easterly), gets some sun, not a lot, but is shaded from the hot afternoon/evening sun. (2) may these be planted in terra cotta pots or do they go into the ground? I understand that I'll have to protect them come winter time, so am thinking the planters would be best. (3) feed and watering? anything special I need to know or do? They look lovely now and would love for them to continue their growth, but do need your help.

Also, one other question. We found some 'dwarf' crape myrtles; the label says height:3 foot, width:2 feet; is that true? I don't think I've ever seen any this small, but am really wanting to plant them (3 reds) in front of our patio, which is in full sun and would be facing the south and west. If they start to exceed their desired height, can I cut them back?

Can I transplant rose bushes at this time of the year? I'm thinking I'd like to place the dwarf crape myrtles when I currently have rose bushes that are NOT doing well.

Thank you very much for your help and assistance. - B. M.

It's good to hear from a fellow Texas gardener trying something new and know you are excited about doing so.

Yes, your hubby is a sweetie.

All varieties of tropical hibiscus or Hibiscus rosa-sinensis are considered hardy only in zone 10. You live in a zone 8b where the historical average low temperatures are in the 15 to 20 degrees F. range. If left outside the winters would terminate your beauties. In most zone 9a coastal areas of TX such a Port Lavaca they have survived the past several relatively mild winters but they are not 100% winter hardy in zone 9a or 9b. Zone 9b is in the valley.

Plumbago is considered hardy in zone 9. Zone 9 is along our entire Gulf coast and through out the Rio Grande valley area. Heavily mulched and in mild winters you may get regrowth from your plumbago if planted in the ground. It usually survives year after year along the San Antonio river walk because of the microclimate created from the concrete, buildings and water in the area.

Both of these plant groups may be grown in full TX sun during frost/freeze periods anywhere in the state. However, they are considered tropical and do need winter protection usually indoors for most TX locations to help insure their survival.

These plants should work well as container grown selections. Plant in containers of clay, plastic or any other materials you desire to utilize including wood and use a quality potting soil. Carl Pool's BR-61 will work great to nourish these babies. Water sufficiently to maintain a moist but not wet soil during the growing season. Only water your selections sufficiently to prevent soil dryness during the dormant/winter season if plants are indoors.

There are many varieties of crape myrtles from miniatures to almost tree size in heights and widths. So, yes there are dwarf varieties.

All crape myrtles may be pruned.

I do not recommend relocating roses at this time of year. The best time to do this task is Dec. - Jan.

Have fun with all your new plants.

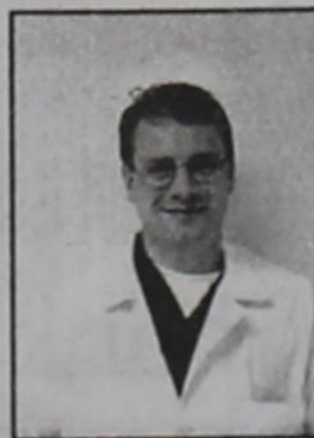

JUNIOR HIGH CROSS COUNTRY BOYS. Corey Thomas and Geoffrey Cude race to the finish line.

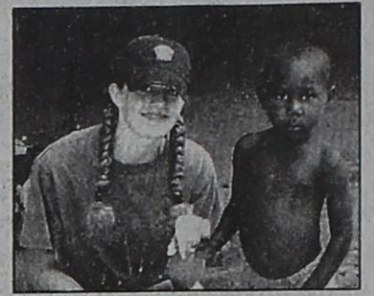
Searceys visit Suriname on Mission trip, spend nine days in jungle

Matt Searcey and his daughter Samantha spent twelve days in the country of Suriname on a mission trip along with two other adults and eleven youth from the Olney First Baptist Church. Suriname is a small country located on the northeastern coast of South America in the Amazon rain forest. Nine of those days were spent 150 miles in the interior of the jungle. The mission trip was headed up by Terry and Vicki Lassiter, who are Southern Baptist missionaries that have been in Suriname for the past 4 years. Terry is the son of Don and Cynthia Lassiter of Olney.

The trip was made by flying

into the interior on small planes and landing on a grass strip followed by a canoe ride down stream on the Tapanahony River.

The Canoe was a 40' dugout canoe with an outboard motor. A group of 22 people, all their luggage, food and supplies for nine days piled into one canoe and made the hour long trip to where they would be staying for the next week and half.

the Aukan children, napping, or working on projects around the cabin that needed fixing. In the evening they went back to the village and set up a make shift movie screen and showed the video. Afterwards they returned to the cabin in the dark on the river. Traveling the river at night was very dangerous because of areas of rapids and huge rocks, some of which were above water,

but many were submerged. The boatman had to cautiously navigate the canoe with only handheld lights to see by.

The people that inhabit this area are the Aukans. They escaped from Dutch slavery in the 17th and 18th centuries into the interior and have had very little interaction with the outside world. They set up their own societies, forming a unique culture, language and lifestyle.

In the interior Matt, Samantha, and the rest of the group stayed in a small cabin-like house where they slept in hammocks and bathed in the river. In the mornings they took the canoe to villages located up and down the river where Terry held dental clinics under the canopy of the trees or where ever he could find a place to set up. The group from Olney prayer walked the village and tried to communicate with the Aukans the best they could. They prayed with them and invited them to come to the showing of the "Jesus" film in the evening. They spent the afternoons swimming in the river with the piranhas, playing with

One afternoon the group had the privilege of visiting the Gaanman, who is the ruler of the Aukan nation. This was quite an honor. Most Aukans have never even met the Gaanman. Terry told the Gaaman a funny story that had happened to Samantha the day before in the village. He laughed and said it would have been good to have caught it on video. The next time you see Samantha ask her about "the pingos"!

After nine days in the interior the group flew back to the capital city of Paramaibo where they toured the city, ate food from different cultures and prepared for the 26 hour trip home.

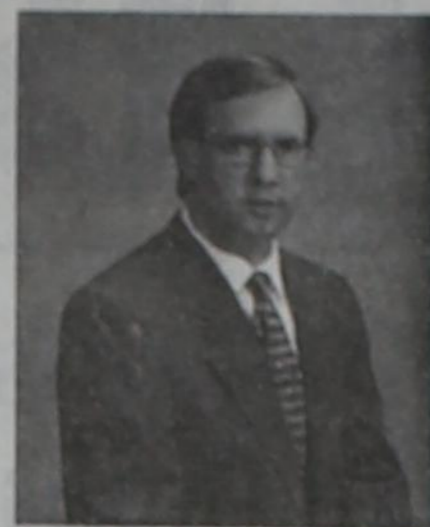

Moguls drop home opener to visiting Seymour 13 to 6

The Munday Moguls shut out the Seymour Panthers 6 to 0 in the first half of last Friday's contest against their 2A rivals to the north but wound up short 13 to 6 at the final gun. Seymour used a ball control ground game on the opening drive of the third to tie the score and went ahead for good in the fourth on big plays by the running backs and a 40 yard pass to set up a 2 yard plunge to pay dirt with 4:47 left in the game.

Munday's offense piled up 217 yards rushing against the tough Panther defense but was kept out of the end zone primarily by their own penalties and mistakes. Munday's lone score was the result of a 62 yard punt return by Dustin Flye who was the Moguls' leading rusher with 174 yards on 24 carries. Flye also caught two passes for a net 14 yards to add to his total.

The first quarter ended in a scoreless tie with both teams resembling prize fighters punching and jabbing, trying to find out what's going to work and create an opening. Munday moved the ball to the 50 on their opening drive and after a 21 yard punt by Jr. Sanchez and a 3 yard return by the Panthers, Seymour took over at the 32.

Munday's defense, which all in all played a great game against the explosive Panther offense, took control early and shut down the big play prone Seymour attack. The Panthers were forced to punt after a three and out and Munday took over at their own 32. Coach Kelly Spiller gave the Panthers what they were going to have to stop in order to win and that was a healthy dose of Dustin Flye. Flye carried the football 7 times advancing to the 15 yard line before the Panther "D" would stiffen and deny the score. On first and 10 from the 15, Sanchez's pass to Josh Myers fell incomplete. Sanchez called his own number on an option for no gain and with third and 10, a personal foul penalty moved the football back to the 30 where it would be third and 25. Dustin Flye caught a pass from Sanchez out of the back field and moved the football to the 10 for a 20 yard gain, but met a brick wall on his next rushing attempt for no gain and the ball went over on downs to the Panthers.

Munday forced another punt early in the second and Flye returned the 33 yarder 62 yards for the Moguls' only score.

Seymour would mount a drive late in the second that looked like it would terminate with a touchdown, but teammates Cody West and Miguel Nunez would force a turnover by the Panther quarterback to give Munday the football with just enough time to find the promised land before the half.

Munday took over on the Panther 32 after the fumble recovery by Nunez and marched down the field on the

legs of Dustin Flye to the Seymour 15. On third and 1 with :28 on the clock and no time outs, a Sanchez fumble put the Moguls back to the 17 with time running out. Sanchez got the fourth and 3 play off for a three yard loss and Seymour took over with :03 showing on the clock. One incomplete pass attempt later both teams left for the locker room to make their half time adjustments.

Munday answered the Seymour scoring drive in the third with a good drive of their own, this time featuring the punishing runs of fullback Jerome Flye, but once again penalties stalled the drive and forced another Sanchez punt.

Munday's final shot to tie or go ahead of the visiting Panthers came with 4:47 left on the game clock. After a procedure penalty all but negated a Flye 8 yard run, a holding call on the next play not only wiped out another good Dustin Flye run but set the Moguls back another 10 to force them from a second and 2 situation at mid-field into a second and 17 from their own 36.

Sanchez went to the air after a 4 yard Flye run missing Josh Myers and then Terrance Allen to turn the ball over on downs. Seymour forced the Moguls to use up their time outs by staying on the ground, and advanced the ball to the Munday 15 before they would kill the final seconds to end the game. The loss put Munday's record at 1 and 1 while Seymour improved to 3 and 0.

Munday athletic director and head football coach Kelly Spiller had these comments following the game: "It was a good test, just like we thought it would be. We expected it to be a hard-fought game and a matter of who blinked first." Spiller also added, "We grew as a team as a result of it, not just as players but as coaches, too. We'll be better off for the experience."

Munday will head into a bye week before facing the Windthorst Trojans in Windthorst for another tough game. Windthorst soundly beat the state champion Petrolia Pirates last Friday and looks to be on the road to a championship run themselves.

"Windthorst is the type of team that is similar to Seymour in a lot of ways," said Spiller. "They are well coached and the kids play well. The difference is that they have some tradition behind them. They expect to win. It'll be another great test for us to find out where we are as a team."

Game time is at 7:30 on Friday, September 26 in Windthorst. The Mogul seventh grade will play here on Thursday, September 25 at 4:00 PM followed by the eighth grade Moguls and the JV Moguls.



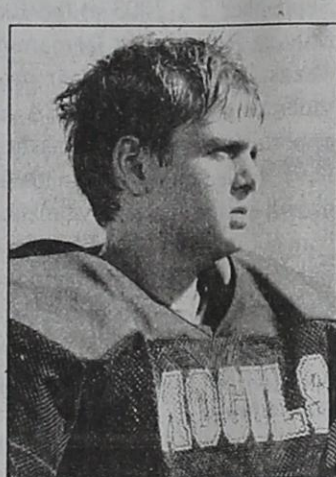

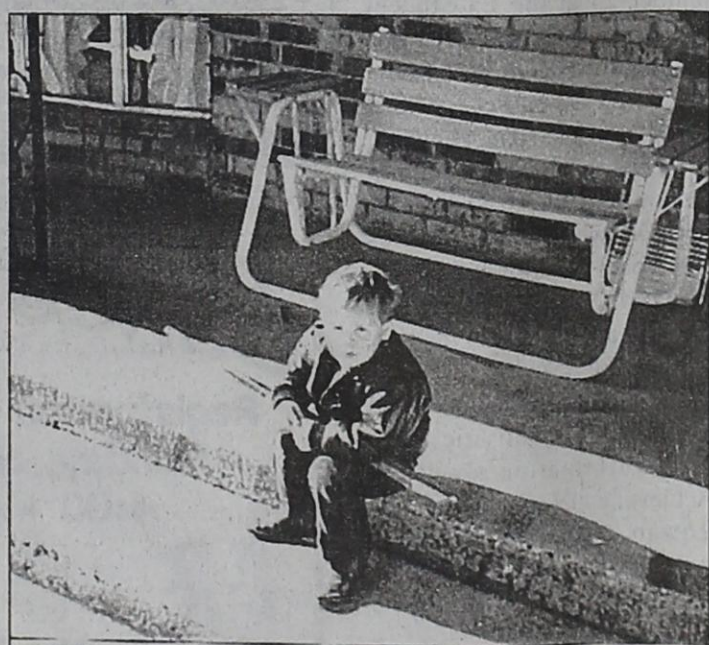

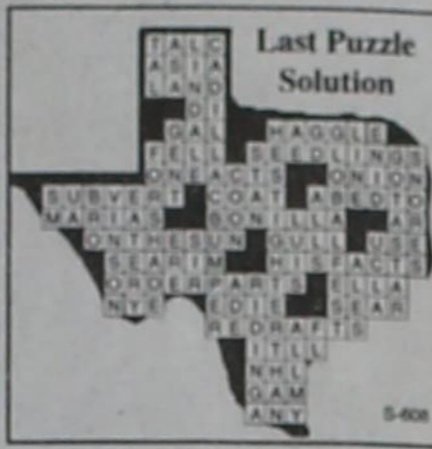

West Nile Precautions apply to Animals, too

While you're taking precautions against West Nile virus and other mosquito-borne diseases for yourself, take them for your horses and pets as well.

If horses have not been vaccinated, owners should do this immediately. Since the vaccination is not always effective, protect horses from bites by covering them with blankets in the early-morning and evening hours; placing them in mosquito-proofed buildings, or treating with approved repellents. Repellents are available at local feed stores and other outlets, he said.

For pets, "Take the same steps you would to protect your self. If they are indoor pets, keep them indoors as much as possible during the times when mosquitoes are active," he said.

Check with a veterinarian for approved repellents for both dogs and cats.

"The reason people need to be even more cautious of West Nile virus and other such viruses form now on is because these bird-reservoired, mosquito-borne viruses tend to build up during the early to mid-part of summer," Olson said.

"The chances that your animal can come into contact with an infected mosquito are currently quite high from late summer until the first cold weather of fall," he added. The symptoms of West Nile are listlessness and high fever, followed by a drop-off in eating. Dogs become unstable while walking, then become comatose, Olson said.

West Nile virus, or encephalitis, is and infection of the brain, Olson said. The most serious manifestation of West Nile virus is fatal encephalitis in humans and horses, as well as certain domestic and wild birds and animals.

The West Nile virus was first isolated in the 1930's in the blood of a woman in the West Nile Province of Uganda. Officials do not know how the virus migrated from Central Africa to the United States, where it first caused problems in the New York area in the summer of 1999. A total of 753 cases and 17 deaths have been reported since it entered the U.S.

Humans and horses are usually infected by the bite of a mosquito that has fed on an infected bird. According to the Center for Disease Control, West Nile virus is primarily transmitted by infectious mosquitoes, but there are other ways this can occasionally happen, such as transfusions with contaminated blood, organ transplants and through mother's milk, and bird-to-bird transmissions have been proven in lab settings. There is no documented evidence of person-to-person transmission of West Nile virus by contact. People can protect themselves and their animals by reducing mosquito populations. Since mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water, dump and found in old tires, flower pots, bird baths, or other artificial containers, Olson said. Keep well fitting screens on doors and windows.
