A Congressman doesn't have to be a printer to realize no one can set type, get a press ready, and run 1,000 envelopes through it for that price."

#### HALLMARK OF A FREE MARKET

Last year, according to the National Retail Dry Goods Assocation, department stores and specialty stores fared a little better profit-wise than in 1951. But it's a safe bet that profits were a great deal smaller than the public at large realizes.

A typical group of department stores showed a net profit after taxes of 2.3 per cent. A typical group of speciality stores showed at net of 2.4 per cent.

In other words, less than three cents out of each dollar the consumers spent in these stores stayed with the owners. All the rest of the money went right out-for merchandise, wages, taxes,

advertising, rents ,and so on down the list. Mass-distribution is based on the idea that it is better for all concerned to sell a large volume of goods at a small profit. It is the hallmark of a free, competitive market.

#### FARMING IS A PROFESSION

A late March issue of the Pennsylvania Farmer carried a brief but significant article by Wellers Assocation. His theme was the almost incredible progress we have witnessed since the turn of the century. As he put it, "Fifty-two years ago the telephone and electricity were in the infant stage. No one believed in the horseless carriage or the gasoline engine. Old Dobbin and the wagon wheel were here to stay. The breech loader was then our secret weapon

"Today I am surrounded with the necesary but apparently luxurious automobile, streamliner, super-sonic jet aircraft, atomic submarine radio, television, deep freeze, electric kitchen, combine, hay bales, field chopper and diesel tractor. Even old Daisy (the family cow) is equipped with a jet pump . . . . During the years following World War II there have been fabulous investments made in agricultural enterprises. Such invest-

### Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by Dr. Geo. W. Cox. M. D., State Health Officer of Texas

There are detergents advertised on today's market for practically any cleaning job\_from cutting stubborn grease on a mechanic's hands, to discouraging fleas on the family poodle.

They work, too, in most instances, but State Health Officer George W. Cox has this word of warning:

"Make sure you follow the directions to the letter." Otherwise you could end up with a discomforting cast of "housewives ec

These so-called "soapless" products have found wide favor with housewives for washing clothes and dishes. No doubt a good bit of their popularity is due to high powered advertising, including the decorative boxes featuring happy ladies hanging the washing or putting up dishes which the product had cleaned all by itself.

Dr. Cox identifies the active! ingredients of these products as chemical compounds which act to lower surface tension of water, making it more penetrating and able to get through grease and dirt to break it up and keep it from resettling

Many brands contain special purpose ingerdients, such as ammonium salt, which make the compound bactericidal.

A duck is supposed to sink like a rock in water containing some of these detergents, probably because the "wetter" water gets through the oil in the duck's feathers which is the reason a duck is ordinarily waterproof and able to float.

It stands to reason, Dr. Cox points out, that if these compounds will cut through grease and film, and there is no doubt that some of them will-they will also penetrate the natural oils of the skin and cause irritatio and discomfort if the condition is neglected.

The health officer's recommendation? Keep some hand lotion within reach and apply it liberally after using detergents for household cleaning or laun-
