The youth of our State have reached that time of year when they start watching the calendar. The girls are probably happier about it than the boys, but regardless of the reception awaiting it in the minds of the youngsters, the opening of school will soon be here. -----

The beginning of another school year means many things to us all. To the parent, it signifies that the child is growing up and may not remain a child much longer. To the child, school means both work and play mixed with joys and disappositments. To the adult population it means that the future citizens of tomorrow have gone back to the task of preparing themselves to assume responsibilities of the adult world which will soon be thrust upon them.

The opening of school should bring another thought to our minds, although most of the citizens of our State will remain complacently unaware of it. There are now 759 empty chairs that were occupied in the classrooms at the beginning of school in Texas last year. Where are they this year? These children will not come in late, they are not at home sick, or visiting out of Statethey are dead!

759 school age children in Texas died last year as a result of accidents. The accidents were of various types; traffic, home, recreational, and others, but all of them claimed a life.

Think of that for a moment; did you know any of them? Will you know any of the approximately 800 who will die this next year. They wil die, you know-unless you do something about it. Don't stop reading and look around you and say, WHO, ME? YOU are the one. It is your responsibility just at it is the responsibility of each and every one of us. There is considerable confusion as to just what is happening to the cost of living. On the one hand, official barometers of prices have been risings) even though only fractionally, and have touched new highs. On the other hand, many commodities are selling well under the levels of the recent past. In some cases, beef and household appliances being conspicuous examples, the price drops have been sharp.

In any event, the consumer can be sure of one thing-our free, competitive economy is working to protect his dollar as best it can. So far as consumer goods are concerned, virtually everything is in abundance. The result is a buyer's market, in which strenuous efforts are made by all concerned to attract and please the public.

We see this in full force on the retail level today. The emphasis is on intensive selling, with all that implies in the way of better service, more attractive displays, increased advertising and promotion, price inducements, and so on The flood of goods that finds its way into the American home is one of the economic wonders of the world.



L-Hook Shelves

WASTE space between shelves in a kitchen cabinet may be utilized by the installation of simple hanging shelves on which small items such as cups and saucers, salt and pepper shakers and bric-a-brac may be stored.

Usually small in size due to space imitations, these shelves ordinarily are from six to eight inches wide and from twelve to twenty inches



long. Make them from Masonite quarter-inch tempered hardboard. Insert long L-shaped hooks through drilled holes in the hardboard and then screw them into the shelf above. The hooks should be near the edges and at the corners of a shelf which is not longer than ne foot. Intermediate hooks inserted mid-way on the long sides of the rectangle should be used if

the length is greater. Paint or enamel the shelves, as desired, using an undercoater and two finish coats.

The same principle of attachment may be used for other small helves similarly located.

The cost is small. The returns large for two Hamilton County farmers who followed the fertilizer recommendations given them by M. K. Thornton in charge of the Soils Testing Laboratory of the Texas A. & M. College System.

Sparks and Jack Cates reported to Hamilton County Agent E. R. Lawrence outstanding yields of oats from the fertilized fields on which soil tests had been made before the plant food was applied.

Sparks reported a weighed yield of 79 bushels of oats on an acre from the field on which he applied 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate an acre. The adjoining field which was not fertilized produced 37 bushels of oats an acre. That, by simple arithmetic, is five bushels an acre more than double the unfertilized yield and a mighty good return on the dollar spent for soil analysis and the 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate.

Cates used 100 lbs. of 14-14-0 fertilizer an acre on one field and reports the yield as a third

higher than for another field which received no treatment. Both, according to Lawrence, are well pleased with their "feeding the soil according to its needs" demonstration




