Zoning Noted

Would rural zoning serve as an aid for more orderly plans for land use in Texas? Reagan Brown, extension rural sociologist, believes it would.

He says that forward-thinking citizens are coming more and more to believe that the town or county which leaves its future to chance and fails to conserve the basic things so vital to well-being is in for trouble. A community, town or county which fails to plan for the future is permitting ts resources and particular advantages for living, work and play to be wasted, exploited and

even destroyed. Brown, in his work with the eaders of organized rural communities in all sections of Texas, says that many communities are caught in a haphazard growth pattern. Once peaceful agricultural areas have become a hodge podge of industrial activity. Valuable farm land is being, in many areas, used where less productive soil would have served the same purpose.

Rural residents, he adds, are finding they have no control over what use is made of land purchased in their community. City residents who have moved to the country to find peace and quiet may find a noisy mill moving in across the road.

Brown believes that no town or county need grow like "Topsy," and become a hodge-podge of conflicting land uses. Rural zoning, he believes, can be a real aid for keeping development in rural areas orderly and on a high plain. Zoning, is well known in most cities but is relatively new in rural areas. In 1929 Wisconsin became the first state to enact rural zoning legislation. Today about 90 percent of all the states have passed rural zoning laws.

PROPERTY RENDERING DEADLINES NEAR

April 1 will be the deadline for most Texans to render their prodates. Those who fall to comply taxes. can blame only themselves for the money loss they may consequently suffer.

Some Texas cities set their own tax deadlines. These are the cities of more than 5,000 population which have incorporated under

the "Home Rule" provisions of our statutes. All other cities are governed by the general laws of

In towns operating under the general laws property must be rendered for taxes between January 1 and April 1 each year. A number of home rule cities set up the same requirements in their ordinances, while others prescribe different periods.

For state and county tax purposes, property must be rendered to the County Tax Assessor by April 30, and homestead exemptions must be claimed by the same

In some localities a third taxing unit is involved - the independent school district. In other places school taxes are collected by the city or county. In addition, some localities have water, irrigation, or levee districts which assess and collect taxes. Make inquiry as to where these various taxes are assessed, and as to applicable deadlines for rendition.

What property must be rendered for taxes? If Texas laws were strictly enforced, we would be required to render to all taxing units nearly every piece of real and personal property which we own, down to the very clothing on our backs. An exception is the constitutional exemption of \$250 worth of household furniture. However, no taxing unit carries their reqquirements this far, and it will be necessary to inquire of each tax assessor when rendering your property whether specific types of property are ordinarily rendered in that locality. Some cities and counties collect ad valorem taxes on automobiles, television sets and other personal items, while others ignore practically all personal property. Business and professional men are generally required to render all merchandise, furnishings, fixtures, business automobiles and equipment.

If property is not rendered by the tax payer, it may then be placed upon the unrendered tax roll, and the taxing agency places such valuation thereon as it considers fair. One advantage of rendering your property is that you year. can set your own valuation. Then, if the county or city decides a higher valuation is in order, you perty to certain taxing agencies. 




