Local Airman Being Moved To Defense Sector

Col. Jack W. Williams, commander of the 408th Fighter Group at Kingsley Field, Ore., has received word of his pending transfer, effective in July, 1960, to the post of director of operations, Portland Air Defense Sector at Adair Air Force Station near Corvallis.

Williams has served as base commander of Kingsley Field since his return to the United States from an assignment in Alaska in August, 1958.

Col. Williams began his flying career with the Army Air Corps following graduation from Texas A&M in 1941, with a degree in electrical engineering. His nearly 19-years of military service were interrupted in November, 1946, when he accepted a discharge and took a position with Republic Aviation Corporation at Howard Hughes Aircraft Co. flying experimental aircraft.

In October, 1947, Williams re-entered the Air Force upon award of a regular commission. During his career he has flown more than 118 different types of aircraft including the Focke-Wulf-190 German fighter; the Japanese Zero; the British Lancaster, as well as nearly every type of U. S. plane.

Col. Williams has held numerous responsible posts in both the United States and foreign commands, and was graduated from the Air Command and Staff School, the George Washington University Manpower Management Course and the Armed Forces Staff College.

He will be accompanied to Adair by his wife, Elizabeth, and their four children, Jackie, 16, Jane, 14, Bill, 13, and Roy, 8. He is the son of Mrs. P. V. Williams of Munday.

The family will reside in quarters in the Capehart Housing development on the station.

County Over Halfway Mark In Bond Sales

During the first five months of this year the citizens of Knox County purchased \$134,396 in Series E & H United States Savings Bonds. This announcement was made today by W. E. Braly, Chairman of Knox County Savings Bonds Committee.

"We have now achieved 67.2 per cent of our 1960 goal of \$200,000," Chairman Braly reported. May sales were reported at \$21,240.

Texas sales for the first five months of this year were \$69,824,409, which represents 47.2 per cent of the 1960 goal of \$165,500,000. May sales in Texas totaled \$12,341,632, which is \$1,049,468 greater than sales in the same month during 1959.

"The United States Savings Bonds program is one of the finest ways of encouraging regular savings. Through the payroll savings plan or other regular purchases, millions of Americans have become savers for the first time. They have found these 'save-as-you-earn' plans an ideal way to build up financial reserves for emergencies and for special goals such as sending children through college, buying a home, or supplementing retirement income," concluded Mr. Braly.

200 See Airport Dedication At K. C. On Sunday

More than 200 persons attended the dedication of Knox County's Municipal Airport last Sunday, with 20 planes and 45 persons flying for the formal opening.

Visitors enjoyed a barbecue dinner, which was served at noon. Among the activities were flying demonstrations by Henry Mallette of Munday in a J-3 Piper Cub. Five jets from Webb AFB in Big Spring demonstrated formation flying.

A crop-dusting demonstration was given by Leland Snow of Olney.

W. M. Lea of Roswell, N. M., was the first to land and came the greatest distance. He won first prize of a picnic ice chest. Other prizes were awarded to Judy Ward of Abilene, the first woman pilot to land, and Roy Neal of Lubbock, who had the oldest pilot's license, issued in 1937.

Joe Woodruff of Abilene won by having the newest pilot's license. His was dated June, 1960. E. O. Wykes of Quanah was the oldest pilot at 65. He will be 66 next month.

The airport, built on land furnished by the city, is located one mile north of the city. It has an all-weather landing strip 100 feet wide and 2,800 feet long which is adequate for planes up to and including DC-3's.

Lighting equipment is to be installed in the near future, making the port the only lighted field in this part of Texas.

At present, three private planes are kept at the airport. During the cotton season, however, the new airport will swarm with crop-dusting planes.

WHEN THE COLD WAR DEEPENS

The collapse of the Summit, the present Communist saber-rattling, and the deepening of the cold war have produced many a grim possibility. One is that American defense spending may be increased materially beyond the current \$40 billion-a-year level.

Time will tell as to that. But one thing is certain—in the present state of world affairs, the American government needs to tighten its belt in all areas of spending that are not essential and unavoidable. The taxpayers' money has to go where it is really needed.

This means, among other things, that government services, wherever possible, be placed on a self-supporting basis. To take one example, parcel post is now running, as it long has run, on a deficit basis. Everyone pays a part of the cost of providing the service, whether they ever use it or not. Parcel post is thus substantially responsible for the huge losses sustained by the Post Office Department.

There is neither reason nor justice in this. Parcel post is a purely commercial service. It is competitive with private enterprises providing comparable services. It is not a basic Post Office function, as it the carrying of mails, magazines and newspapers—material which contributes to the enlightenment and well-being of the public. Under these circumstances, the least we should demand is that parcel post charges honestly equal the cost of providing the service.

SUPREMACY ISN'T LEADERSHIP

World leadership may be slipping from the United States due to "the deteriorating moral fiber of our people."

That warning came from the commencement speaker at Aquinas College in Grand Rapids—Albert P. Beatty, assistant vice president of the Association of American Railroads. And he went on to draw this important distinction between world supremacy and world leadership: "World supremacy comes from national character, which, in turn, inspires trust and confidence on the part of other peoples. When national character deteriorates, leadership wanes. As leadership is threatened, so is world supremacy."

Mr. Beatty was speaking to young people just starting out in life—a cross section of the young people who will determine what the future

of this nation is to be. If they put their faith solely in material values and material advancement that future will be bleak indeed. For, to quote him once more, "a nation is no stronger than the morality and faith of its people."

YOU

The head of a taxpayer research organization warns that all the government spending plans and programs now being hatched in Washington will have to be financed from just one source—and that's the already tightly squeezed taxpayer. The wonder is that such a warning is needed. But it is—for, apparently, great numbers of people still labor under the delusion that government money comes magically out of the blue, not out of their pockets.

Well, in the short span of three decades government's tax take has jumped from a proportion of about one dollar out of ten to about one dollar out of three of the national income. If the big spenders have their way, the proportion will soon become one in two, or still more. And you, along with the other 180 million or so people in this country, will do the paying. No one else can.

THE DOOR IS OPEN

In various quarters, there is a belief that the era of worldwide inflation that followed World War II has ended or is ending.

The Portland Oregonian, in taking notice of the thinking says this: If the postwar inflationary era is, indeed, ended it means that the United States will have to obtain more production at lower or no increased costs. If we are to stay in competition with the highly efficient countries of western Europe and Japan, we'll have to avoid, among other things, costly strikes such as the one in steel. That ill-advised conflict threw the doors wide open to good, cheap foreign products against which it will be extremely difficult to shut them again.

In other words signs point to increasingly tough competition in the world markets. And American employment like all facets of American prosperity, will depend on our ability to meet it.

TREASON

The history of liberty often shows that a would-be tyrant likes to accuse his opponents of treason. So, to safeguard our liberty the constitution itself sets out the kind of proof we need to find some one guilty of treason.

For this reason America has had relatively few cases of treason. Not so in early English and Roman law. "Treasonous acts" covered many things, in fact, anything that seemed to threaten the community safety.

In the fourteenth century the English tried to define treason: Since every subject owed allegiance to the King, trivial breaches of a private nature became "petite (small) treason." But a subject disloyal enough as to attack or plot against the king himself was guilty of "high" treason.

The kings liked this: For one to imagine the king's death became treason subject to death.

The broadened treason widened further to include crimes against private persons. Later even the king himself was not exempt: In 1649 they indicted, convicted, and beheaded King Charles I for treason.

King Henry VIII made it high treason to slander Queen Anne or her children. Failure to take an oath not to slander the queen itself became treason.

Under Elizabeth I it became treason for anyone to hold a religion which did not conform to the crown's.

Conviction of treason was easy. In some cases you needed no witnesses. Trials were short and the accused could not have defense counsel.

In conflicts for power, the losing politicians often became "traitors" as they do in many countries to this day. Our early settlers lived in troubled times with the coming revolution creating new factions. For them treason was also a frequent accusation.

But after the revolution the founding fathers and the people had had enough.

They decided to limit "treason" and faced these problems: Should the new executive put down rebel-

lions and define treasons himself? Should the Congress during "troubled times" have power to define treason?

No. The new Constitution took treason out of politics. It said treason "shall consist only of levying war against the United States or in giving aid and comfort to the enemy."

Conviction required testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act.

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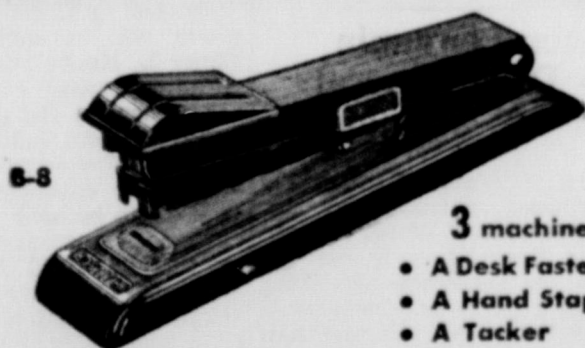
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Miss Hutchens And Joseph Dickson, Jr., Marry In Goree Church Ceremony

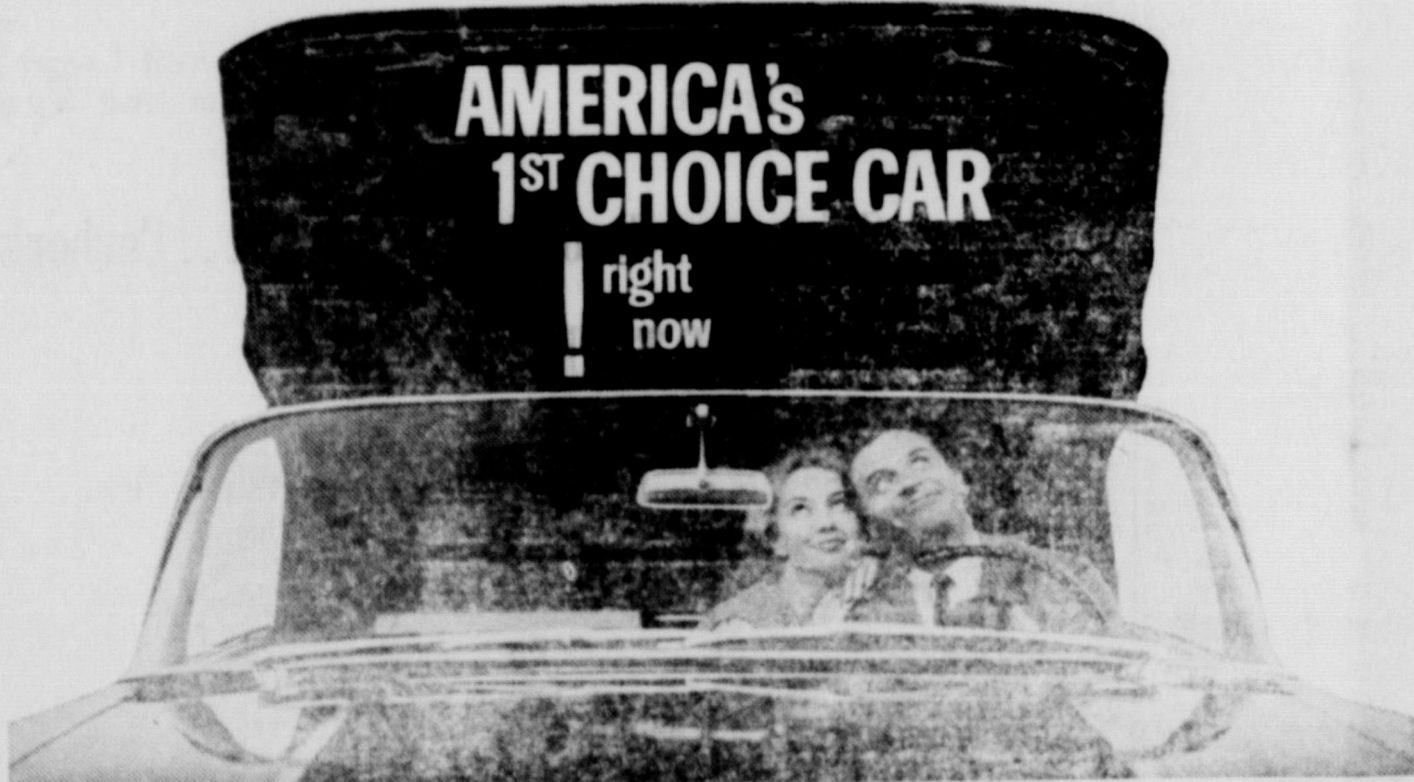

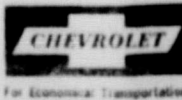

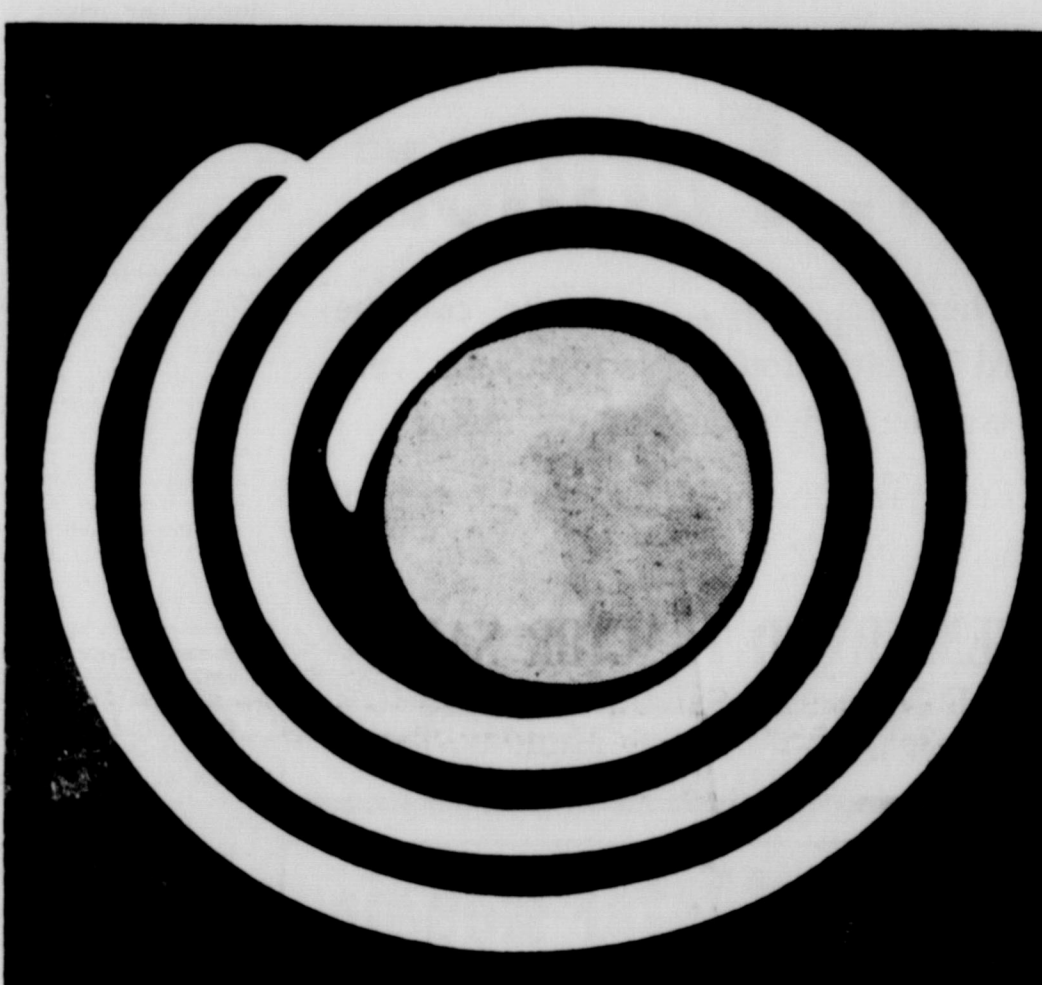
