Notes From Knox Farms, Ranches

Potato Demonstrations

The two potato demonstrations that were conducted in the Munday area of Knox County have been harvested and observation results are available; however, the statistical results will take some time getting. From the fertilizer test conducted on the Lonnie Offutt farm, it appeared that 100 pounds of nitrogen and 100 pounds of phosphate was the most desirable fertilizer application for the Munday soils.

There were two varieties of white potatoes tested in the fertilizer test testing 10 rates of fertilizer application and a no treatment plot. The demonstration was a replicated test.

A variety test was conducted on the James Smith farm and there were several results obtained. Year before last there was a similar variety test conducted on the Gene Thompson farm and 154 experimental varieties were tested.

The Munday farmers asked for further testing on 12 of these varieties in an advanced test plot. The farmers also added two other varieties to the test. Out of the advanced test conducted this year, the Munday potato producers have recommended that 4 of these varieties be either released to commercial seed growers or sent back for further testing.

The Munday growers have found a white potato that yields excellently that is of a russet type that has a specific gravity ranging from 1.090 to 1.087. There were 42 varieties in an experimental test and there were 9 varieties asked for in an advanced test plot next year.

Cooperating with Dr. Clyde Singletary, Extension Vegetable Specialist, and County Agent Jack Moore, is the Vegetable Committee, composed of Lonnie Offutt, Gene Thompson, James Smith, Bill Langford, Clint Norman and Leland Floyd, Mr. Virgil Woodfin of the Iowa Park Experimental Station cooperated this year in the planting and harvest of the tests.

The local program for Monday night will be the election of the delegates, new business and an entertaining movie to enlighten members on travel and world culture.

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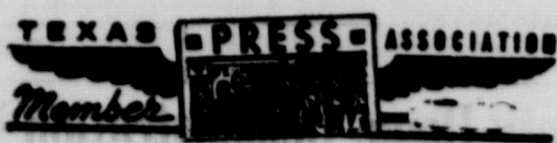

WISE WORDS FROM THE PAST

A century and more ago the phrase "welfare state" was not known. But the philosophy it describes was—and had been all through recorded history. And some of the greatest Americans warned tellingly against its dangers.

For instance, Abraham Lincoln said: "The legitimate object of government is to do for a community of people whatever they need to have done, but cannot do at all, or cannot so well do, for themselves, in their separate and individual capacities. In all that people can individually do as well for themselves, government ought not to interfere."

Then, long before that, Thomas Jefferson expressed the same philosophy in other words: "I place economy among the first and most important virtues, and public debt as the greatest of dangers to be feared. To preserve our independence, we must make our choice between economy and liberty or profusion and servitude. If we run into such debts, we must be taxed in our meat and drink, in our necessities and our comforts, in our labors and in our amusements. If we can prevent the government from wasting the labors of the people, under pretense of caring for them, they will be happy."

We can profit, if we only will, from these wise words from the past.

WOMEN—AND THE GAS TAX

The General Federation of Women's Clubs—along with an ever-lengthening list of organizations of almost every nature—has taken up arms against excessively high gasoline taxes.

Specifically, the Federation calls for the roll-back of the fourth cent of the present federal gas tax. This cent, it should be remembered, was supposed to be a "temporary" levy. But in government tax matters, "temporary" is all too often a synonym for "permanent."

The Federation, which has a membership of 11 million women in 15,500 clubs, points out that the average combined state-federal tax on gasoline is higher than any other everyday item in the entire economy, and runs to almost 50 per cent. In the words of the Federation's President, "This is more than the tax rate on diamonds and chin-chin coats. We do not believe that such an important item on the family budget as gasoline should bear so heavy a tax burden."

It's good to have the distaff side taking an active part in a campaign that directly affects practically everyone in the country. And the campaign against excessive gas taxes can't be

allowed to languish—for, if it does, more "temporary" taxes will be piled on top of "temporary" taxes and the price of gas will become prohibitive.

WHO MUST PAY?

The head of the Citizens Public Expenditure Survey, a New York organization, has issued an important warning to the people of this country.

It amounts to this: The potpourri of government spending plans now being hatched will have to be paid for by middle and lower income groups—not by the rich.

The reason is simple enough. Taxes on big incomes have just about reached the ultimate—91 per cent at the top. And the people with big incomes are very few in number. Even if they were taxed at a 100 per cent rate in the upper brackets the resulting revenue would hardly make a noticeable dent in present federal budgets.

So, if government spending continues to soar, the man of moderate means will have to pay the bill, one way or another. No one else can. He has no way of controlling public expenditures except at elections when he can vote for or against men and measures that represent excessive extravagance, debt and taxation.

DAK., INDEPENDENT: "As we take a good look at the whole social security program we can't help but feel that it has the characteristics of an overdecorated Christmas tree that is precariously weaving back and forth. With each new Congress, someone tries to hang some more 'junk' on this tree in the form of so-called additional benefits and amendments."

NORFOLK, A., THE TIME ADVOCATE: "We may well ponder the prophetic warning voiced by Thomas Jefferson, long ago, when he said: 'When all government, domestic and foreign, in little or great things, shall be drawn to Washington as the center of all power, it will render powerless the checks provided of one government or another. And will become as vernal and oppressive as the government from which we separated.'"

SELDEN, KANS., ADVOCATE: "Here's what the American Bankers Magazine, a publication which represents a traditionally hard-headed profession, has to say:

"No business man or woman in any town should allow a newspaper to go to press without his or her name and business being mentioned somewhere in its columns."

Knox Prairie Philosopher Worries, But Only A Little, About Reduced Amount Of Soap In The Giant-Size Box

Editor's note: The Knox Prairie Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Miller Creek discusses soap this week. We think that's what he's doing.

Dear editor:
What happens to food after it leaves a farmer's hands and works its way through the processors to the super-market's shelves is one of the weak links in farming, and I have long contended that where us farmers are slipping up is in failing to learn how to grow beans that come up inside a cellophane bag—you can get ten times more for them that way than plain—but what interested me this week about this matter was a hearing before a Congressional committee in Washington.

A bunch of women appeared before the committee and complained that some food packagers were outsmarting them, they sell one package of soap labeled Giant-Size containing say two pounds of soap flakes, then run in some more packages alongside them also labeled Giant-Size but containing only a pound and a half, with the rest of the box empty, yet selling for the same



price. In their hurry to beat somebody to the check-out counter, some women grab the wrong box without reading the fine print.

And what interested me more about this was the reason these this practice. "Such practices," they said, "weaken the reputation of the United States abroad."

I don't understand how making a bunch of women mad in the United States by selling them less soap than they think they're buying can weaken our reputation abroad, but I'm in favor of the argument, if they can make it stick.

For instance, say I have a prime Jersey steer for sale and some smart buyer offers me two cents a pound less than I ought to get and I'm forced to sell because I ran out of feed day before yesterday. It's not the money I'm losing that bothers me, it's the damage this fellow is doing to our reputation abroad. Or take taxes. Say the government promises us \$1.25 in service for every \$1 we pay in taxes, and winds up delivering only 65c worth. You can see what this does to our reputation abroad.

And speaking of our reputation abroad, people are always talking about it, but you never hear anything about the people abroad worrying about their reputation here in the United States. If some Scandinavian grocery man outsmarts some Scandinavian housewife, half the time I'm not even aware of it. Scandinavia ought to do something about this.
