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

Plan Statewide Test of NEAR **Warning Device**

The first successful device for indoor warning of impending enemy attack, tornadoes, flash floods or other disasters will be tested on a large scale in Michigan by the Office of Civil and Defense Mobilization.

OCDM Director Frank B. Ellis has announced that the National Emergency Alarm Repeater, or

Emergency Alarm Repeater, or NEAR device, will be tried out on a statewide basis. Afterwards it is hoped to mass produce it for the American public.

THE RECEIVER plugs into ordinary house electrical outlets, and buzzes when a warning signal is sent out over electric lines. This would alert people to turn on their radios for emergency instructions.

Signal generators have been installed at Grand Rapids and Battle Creek, Mich., for more than a year for local tests already concluded successfully. Additional generators will be installed elsewhere in Michigan to operate the home devices for a

The NEAR receivers will function only where power systems are equipped with the NEAR generators. From 400 to 600 generators in power systems could make the NEAR device usable throughout the whole country.

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


