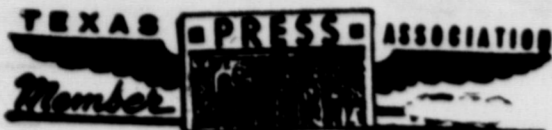

Faith Alone; Grace Alone; Baptism Alone.

We differ widely about what saves us. One man says we are saved by GRACE ALONE, and quotes Eph. 2:8. Another claims justification by FAITH ALONE and quotes Rom. 3:1. Still a third, perhaps, contends that BAPTISM ALONE saves man, and he quotes 1 Pet. 3:21. Now suppose these three want to effect a union on the Bible. They are willing "to speak where the Bible speaks, and be silent where the Bible is silent."

Suppose the grace alone man invites the other two to come over and stand with him. Could they afford to do this? Each of them is as scriptural as he is. His doctrine is not Bible. Suppose the baptism alone man asks the other two to come to his hobby of baptism alone. They would almost raise a charge of blasphemy, and rush wildly about crying water salvation. No union would be possible or desirable on any of these three doctrines. Union or error is no better than no union at all. There is only one word causing the trouble among these three. The little word "ALONE". What can they do? Each one cut it off of his favorite theory of salvation. They all can be saved by grace. All must agree to this because it is Bible. (Eph. 2:8). Likewise they can all stand together on justification by faith, because it is Bible. (Rom. 5:1). Likewise they can stand together in saying we are saved by baptism, because it is Bible. (1 Pet. 3:21).

One man has as much right to say we are saved by baptism alone as another has to say we are saved by faith alone. Both are unscriptural and neither can ever be a basis for unity. Grace, faith, baptism, and many others things are said to save us, but no one of them, without the other, is sufficient. "For whosoever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all." (James 2:10).

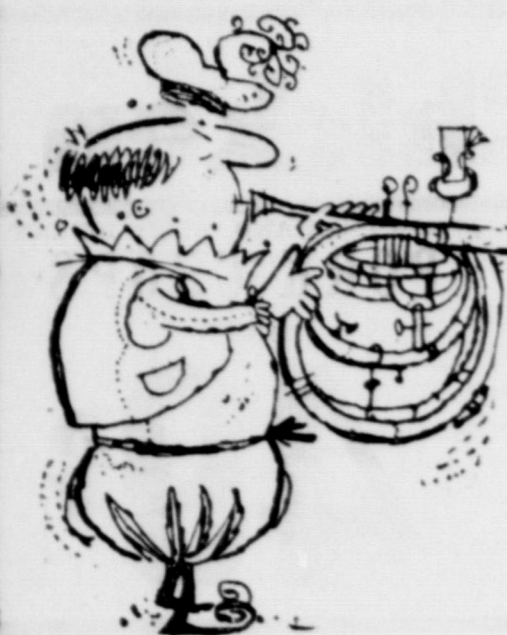

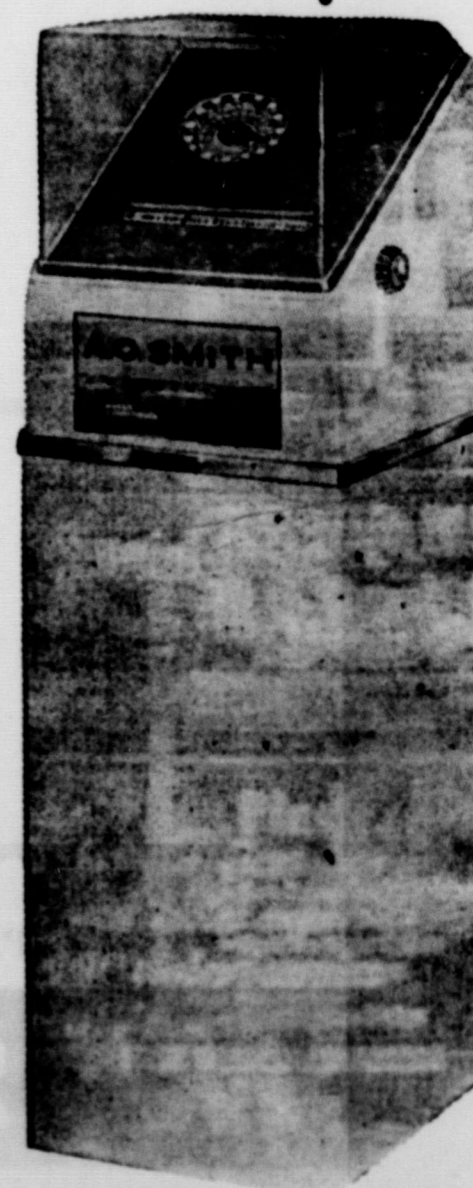

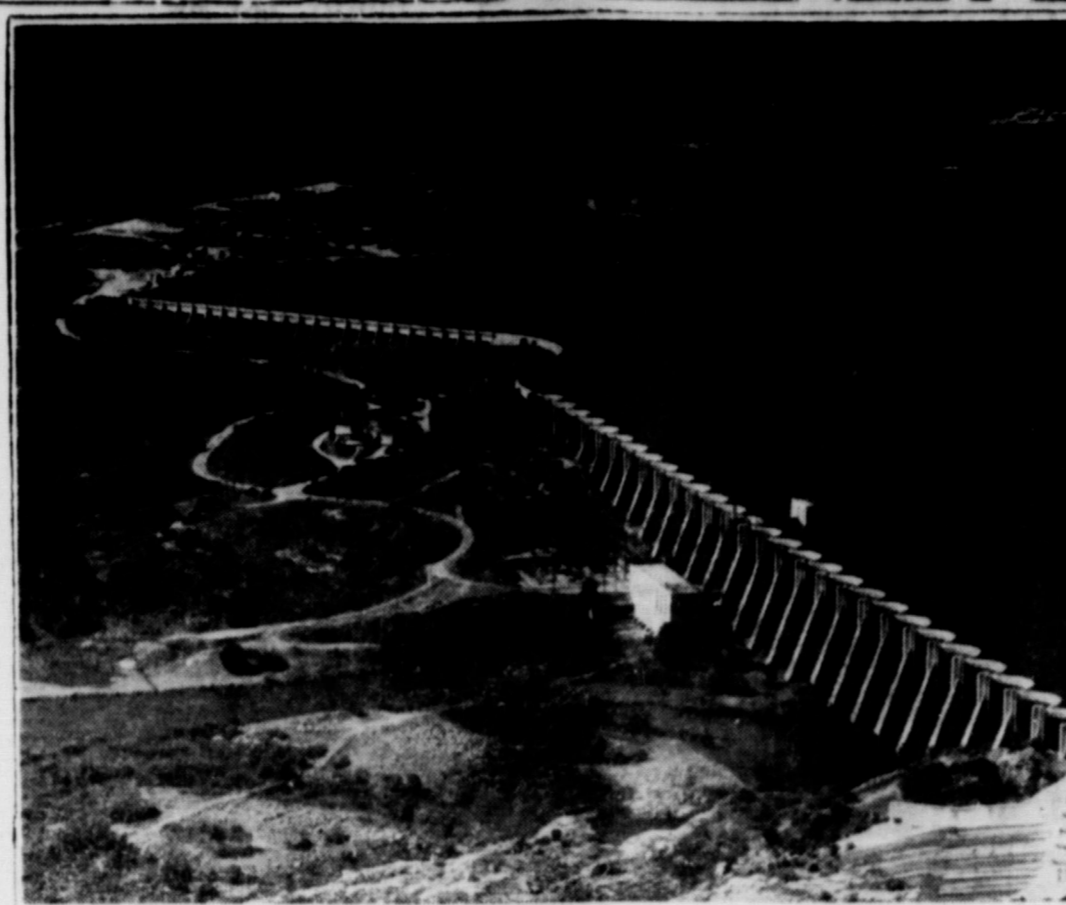

## Weekly Health LETTER

Issued by the State Health Department

A person can live three weeks without food, three days without water, but only three minutes without air.

Would you know what to do if a member of your family or neighbor became unconscious and stopped breathing and there was no doctor around?

In just a few minutes anyone can learn the technique known as mouth to mouth breathing. This method has been known to man since biblical times but has recently been proven much more popular than any other method of artificial respiration.

This technique may be used to revive all unconscious and non-breathing victims of drowning, electric shock, smoke or gas inhalation, drug or chemical poisoning, injuries to head, chest, neck, and abdomen, convulsions, cardiac arrest, and other causes.

Mouth to mouth rescue breathing starts with clearing the mouth of any foreign objects such as tobacco, food, seaweed, toys, loose teeth or any other small objects.

Then, with one hand grasp the victim's chin, placing the other hand on top of the head and with a rotating motion tilt the head backward. A roll of clothing or blanket placed under the victim's shoulders will help keep the neck in favorable position.

Insert the thumb of one hand between the victim's jaws. Grasp the lower teeth and pull the jaw forward. Never let the victim's chin sag or let his head return to normal, relaxed position. Stop air leakage through the nose by pinching the nostrils closed with the thumb and index of the other hand.

Next, take a deep breath and place your mouth over the victim's mouth as firmly as possible in order to prevent air leakage. Keeping the mouth open wide breathe deeply into the

victim's lungs.

As soon as you see the victim's chest rise you have delivered adequate breath. You must then remove your mouth so that the victim may exhale naturally. Repeat rescue breathing about once every three or four seconds, about 12 to 20 times a minute, until the victim breathes naturally or until a doctor arrives. If the victim is an infant or small child, breathe gently using only small puffs from the cheeks and throat.

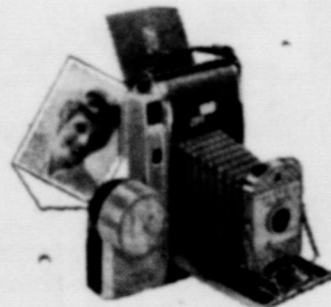

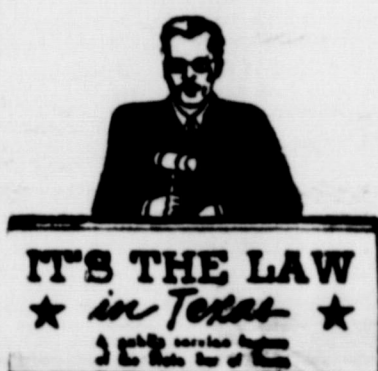

Take Me out To The Ball Game

It was a beautiful day for baseball. Harriet's fiancé, Dick, was taking her to her first big league baseball game. They arrived just before the opening pitch and found their seats along the first base line in the fifth row.

Harriet was enjoying all of the color and excitement of the ball park, the baseball fans, the hot dog vendors, and, of course, the game itself. Suddenly a hard hit foul ball flew into the stands and struck Harriet, severely injuring her.

Harriet brought a lawsuit against the baseball club. She alleged that spectators should be protected from such injuries, and that additional screens should have been put up to prevent fouls from coming into the stands.

But the court said, "No" to Harriet. She had chosen to sit in the unscreened bleachers in preference to sitting behind a screen where the tickets cost more. Therefore, she had "assumed the risk" of being hit by a batted or thrown ball during the playing of the game. No recovery was allowed.

In such cases, the courts say that the spectator is an invitee to whom the invitor (the ball club) owes the duty to exercise ordinary care to render the premises reasonably safe for him.

"But," say the courts, "the invitor is not an insurer of the safety of the invitee; protected against all hazard, nor relieved of all duty to himself for his own safety. And to the extent that the duty of self-protection rests upon the invitee, the duty of the invitor to protect is reduced."

The same rules as to "assump-

tion of risk" are applied to most places of amusement and amusement devices. A swimmer must anticipate that a diving board will be wet and slippery. A person who rides on an amusement device and sees flying sparks takes the chance that a flying spark may strike his eye.

And one who goes upon a revolving floor device for the purpose of being thrown from it, accepts the dangers inherent in the sport so far as they are obvious.

On the other hand, if the danger is not apparent or obvious, the operator of the device has a duty to warn the rider or spectator. It is the ordinary risk that is assumed, not the unusual. Where, for example, a device was operated on a particular occasion at an especially fast speed so that it jerked and jolted violently, a rider who was injured by these unusual conditions was permitted to recover.

A patron of a place of amusement is entitled to be protected from hidden dangers, but he cannot go into a place of danger which he appreciates and understands, and then recover damages if he is injured.

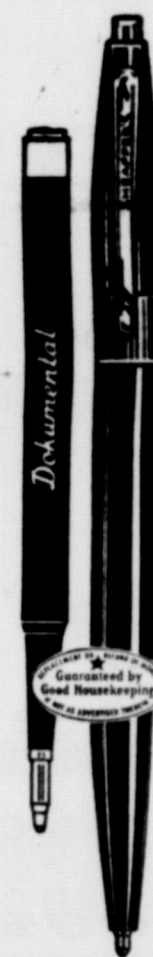

**Farm Facts**

Back in 1947, food sales represented 88% of total grocery sales. They represented only 86% in 1956. At the same time, beer, wine, and liquor sales jumped from 2% of the total to 5%. Other non-foods were only 10% of the total in 1947, but had reached 15% by 1959.

This is reported by Cleo Fitzsimmons and Sarah L. Manning of Purdue University's Experiment Station in a study made by them in the Indianapolis area in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service.

About 15% of the total spent by customers in the stores studied went for non-food items (beverages and gum in addition to tobacco and other inedibles). Of the average of 12 items per shopping basket, 2 were non-food.

Soaps, detergents, paper goods, household care items, tobacco products, and health and beauty aids were noted most frequently and in that order in the non-food items



1/5 of our grocery bill is for non-food items.
