Fort Chaffee, Ark. (AHTNC)—Specialist Four Bobby F. Killian, 26, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fay J. Killian, Munday, is scheduled to be released from active duty August 10 after serving as an armorer with Company L of the 100th Division's 398th Regiment at Fort Chaffee, Ark.

U. S. Bond Sales Continue To Rise

Savings Bonds sales in Texas for the first 6 months of 1962 totaled \$76,720,875 which represents 102.3% of the 75 million dollar Freedom Bond Drive goal for Texas. June bond sales in Texas were \$11,489,268.

These figures were reported recently by W. E. Braly, Chairman of Knox County Savings Bonds Committee. Mr. Braly also reported that bond sales in Knox County were \$161,402 for the first 6 months of the year. This figure represents 80.7% of the 1962 sales goal. Sales in June amounted to \$19,201.

"The achievement of the Freedom Bond Drive goal in Texas demonstrates to the Nation that Texans stand ready to do their part in our fight for freedom. These bond dollars will help our Nation maintain a strong military posture and at the same time will keep our country economically stable," Chairman Braly concluded.

14 State Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On In General Election

Fourteen state constitutional amendments, seven of which appear in this week's issue of The Munday Times, will be voted on in the general election in November. This is the largest number of amendments in several years.

A brief digest of the 14 proposed amendments follows:

Number One On The Ballot (HJR 25)—Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for the employees of all political subdivisions.

Number Two On The Ballot (SJR 9)—Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000).

Number Three On The Ballot (SJR 21)—Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins

Benjamin Youth Drowns In Lake

Gary Connor, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Connor of Benjamin, drowned in Lake Benjamin last Sunday afternoon, apparently after stepping into a deep hole while moving a trolly.

The tragedy occurred at about 3 p.m. Sunday. Companions of the victim said Connor, who was not a strong swimmer, was alone some distance from the group at the time of the accident.

The victim was wading in the west end of the lake while working with a trolley, his companions said. He yelled for help after stepping into the hole, but they were unable to rescue him. He was at the lake with Butch Duke, Bill Roberts and Ken Roberts.

Divers from throughout the area were called to the scene to assist in searching for his body, which was recovered at 6:57 p.m. by a party headed by Bill Dodd, depot agent. Dodd's boat was one of about 15 assisting in the search.

H. C. Stone, Knox County sheriff, headed the search party.

A spokesman for the search party said from all indications Connor "just went under" while working with the trolley. He was a spring graduate of Benjamin High School.

Funeral services were held at 4 p.m. Monday from the First Baptist Church in Benjamin with the pastor, Rev. Lynn Wilson, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Gerry Gragory of Brownwood, and burial was in Benjamin Cemetery.

Survivors include his parents; three sisters, Mrs. Peggy Haley of Weatherford, and Glenda and Brenda Conner of Benjamin; the paternal grandmother, Mrs. O. D. Conner of Benjamin, and the maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Green of Weatherford.

Serving as pallbearers were Butch Duke, Gary Coppedge, Ken Roberts, Robert Coffman, Johnny Hale, Dean Dykes and Bill Pierce.

Number Four On The Ballot (HJR 46)—Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.

Number Five On The Ballot (HJR 51)—Creates hospital districts and limits their power.

Number Six On The Ballot (HJR 36)—Authorizes retirement disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.

Number Seven On The Ballot (SJR 13)—Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.

Number Eight On The Ballot (SJR 7)—Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.

Number Nine On The Ballot (HJR 70)—Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.

Number Ten On The Ballot (SJR 12)—Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board, provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.

Number Eleven On The Ballot (SJR 25)—Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.

Number Twelve On The Ballot (SJR 19)—Delegates limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

Number Thirteen On The Ballot (SJR 6)—Provides that taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.

Number Fourteen On The Ballot (HJR 32)—Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.

Shifts Continue In Farm Real Estate

The average value per farm in Texas increased from \$48,378 to \$64,950 between 1959 and 1962, according to C. H. Bates, economist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In this same period, the average Texas farm is worth \$59,302. Buildings are worth an additional \$5,648. The average value for land and buildings is about \$91 per acre, he said.

"The rate of sales of farm land accelerated some during the last year also. The number of farm title transfers in Texas rose from 51.8 per 1,000 farms in 1960-61 to 58.2 in 1961-62.

A study by USDA's Economic Research Service shows the average value per acre of farm real estate reached a new high of \$123 per acre in the U. S. in 1962, 5 per cent higher than in the previous year. The average farm has 336 acres, and is worth \$41,400. About \$32,800 of this is accounted for by land, and the balance, \$8,600, by farm buildings, Bates said.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for the Legislature to provide for trial de novo on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II of a new Section to be known as Section 2, said new Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power of authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from Justice of the Peace Courts to County Courts and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the conditions prescribed by the Legislature, even though such action on the part of the courts involves administrative or executive rather than judicial powers; provided, however, in the absence of legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment, all such appeals shall continue to be presented in the manner now provided by law, as interpreted and applied by the Appellate Courts of Texas on the date of the adoption of this amendment, and no change in the manner of such appeals shall be effectual except by legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trial de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting the Legislature power to provide for trial de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamations for such election and this amendment shall be published and the election shall be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Farm Facts

Scientists are evaluating bird-repellent grain sorghums. Growing from seed coverings of test varieties are sharp spines which seem to keep birds from feeding.

Agricultural Research published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, reports some of these sorghums have been grown in south Florida and tests are being conducted at Beltsville, Md., and in Mississippi and other states.

An effort will be made to cross sweet sorghums with the grain sorghum strains to learn if widely adaptable bird-repellent sweet sorghums can be produced.

Bird feeding on sorghums is a problem in the South and Southwest.

Agronomist T. T. Boyd, in charge of the Plantation Field Laboratory of the Florida Agricultural Experiment Station at Fort Lauderdale, found the bird-repellency characteristic during tests of hundreds of sorghums. Blackbirds, rice birds, Eng-

lish sparrows, and Florida grackles left two sorghums strictly alone. By crossing these with others, some 80 strains have been developed with their own built-in bayonets.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamations for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled, and providing that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled may never exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled be amended and renumbered as to read as follows:

"Section 51-b.1. The Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this state for at least one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application and who have resided in the state for at least an additional five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; and provided further, that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of state funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments shall not exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to issue such financial aid for individuals who are permanently and totally disabled as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to establish a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section therein to be known and described as Section 11, providing that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coterminous with the limits of such county, authorizing the levying and rates of taxes; providing for the acquisition of land and properties for hospital uses, as well as the maintenance and operation of the same; and authorizing the issuance of tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements; and further providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coterminous with the limits of such county.

"If any such district is created, it may be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property within the district; provided, however, no tax may be levied until approved by a majority vote of the participating resident qualified property-tax-paying voters who have duly rendered their property for taxation. The maximum rate of tax may be changed at subsequent elections so long as obligations are not impaired, and not to exceed the maximum limit of Seventy-five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within or having the same boundaries as the district may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall by resolution assume all such responsibilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge obligations, liabilities, and responsibilities, and to maintain and operate the hospital system, and the Legislature may authorize the district to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of improvements and initially equipping the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cent (75c) tax. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of the amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution permitting the creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Castro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties, each district to be coterminous with the limits of such county."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas authorizing the Texas Water Development Board to acquire and develop storage facilities in reservoirs, shall not be in effect until the Legislature shall provide for the use of funds received from the disposition of acquired storage and water, providing that any enabling Act shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character, pending the form of the ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication by the LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new Section thereto to be known as Section 48-d, as follows:

"Section 48-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites for storage facilities for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the State, whose waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. To this end, and with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, the proceeds from the sale of State bonds deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund as provided in Article III, Section 48-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, for the additional purpose of acquiring and developing storage facilities for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes in and from reservoirs constructed or to be constructed or enlarged within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, by any one or more of the following governments or governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by general law, the Texas Water Development Board may also, with the approval of the Board of Water Engineers or its successor, execute long-term contracts with the United States or any agency or department of the United States for the acquisition of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as State bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 48-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 48-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on

Dear editor:
I never try to stand in the way of progress—I've tried it and it don't work—and if people want to bounce television shows and telephone conversations off a satellite, it's all right with me, but I am curious about what they have to talk about that's so important. I can't imagine anything I could think to say that would require the launching of a satellite to bounce it to the other side of the world.

Quick communication, I've been told, is a boon to understanding, but have you ever listened to two women talking on the telephone for 45 minutes without ever coming to any understanding?

I understand also you can now install a telephone on a tractor, but I always figured a man with something so important he needed a phone while plowing, is too important to be plowing in the first place. I guess I could get a phone installed on mine, but I can't think of anything I could say that couldn't wait till I could write it down and mail it, and I don't know of anything anybody could call me about that would make riding a tractor any better. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 51 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties; the assumption by the district of the indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereof to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levy of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assumed indebtedness, and for operating and maintaining the district; providing other terms and conditions for accomplishing the purposes of this Amendment.

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section to be designated as Section 9, which shall read as follows:
"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or restoration of buildings and improvements and equipment for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer in the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that such district or districts shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (\$0.75) on the one hundred dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or operated unless approved by such taxpaying electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose, and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district."
"Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxing voters in the district concerned."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:
"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to create hospital districts and prescribing limitations upon the powers of such districts."
Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Marital Status Change Needed By Social Security

When an employed woman marries she should announce the event to the social security office as well as to her personal friends, Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security district office said today.

"If she continues to work without notifying the social security administration and has earnings reported in her new name, she may have difficulty getting credit for those earnings," Tate continued.

"This is true because if our central accounting office records show that a certain number is assigned to "Ruth Doe", wages reported under that number to "Ruth Jones" cannot be credited. They are held in a suspense file until such time as the discrepancy can be cleared."

"Of course, the social security office is not interested in an engraved announcement; just get a Form 7003, "Request for Name Change" from your social security office or local post office. Mail this completed form and your social security card, if you still have it, to the social security office. You will receive a new card showing your new name and the old number. In this way, you can be sure your wages are posted promptly without our accounting office contacting your employer or you later."

Post card forms to be used in obtaining a statement of the earnings credited to your social security account are also available at any social security office. Write to your social security office, 411 Federal Bldg., Wichita Falls, Texas.
