





Farm Facts

Scientists are evaluating bird-repellent grain sorghums. Growing from seed coverings test varieties are sharp spines which seem to keep birds from feeding.

Agricultural Research, published by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, reports some of these sorghums have been grown in south Florida and tests are being conducted at Beltsville, Md., and in Mississippi and other states.

An effort will be made to cross sweet sorghums with the grain sorghum strains to learn if widely adaptable bird-repellent sweet sorghums can be produced.

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision. A Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

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



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Cotton Pickers Are Needed In Valley

The 1962 cotton harvest is quickly fanning out from the near peak operations in the Lower Rio Grande Valley to the just starting Upper Coastal Bend areas. With real hot, dry cotton popping weather prevailing, demands for cotton harvest hands have soared in active areas to over 18,000.

The Lower Valley had a wonderful week, with over 96,000 bales ginned in the 7-day period. It is estimated that 50% of the erop has been gathered to date by machines. Hand picker shortage is reported at 5,045; no serious shortage of machines exists but more could be used. With irrigated cotton now ready, even greater use of machines is expected next week in the Valley.

Coastal Bend harvest needs have jumped to 9,675 workers, with the Corpus - Odem - Mathis areas the needlest. And just start ing with a real good crop is the Bryan-El Campo-Bay City areas.
