



laxes become **Delinguent On** 

Notice has been given by both M. A. Bumpas, Jr., tax collector for Knox County, and Harvey Lee, tax collector for the City of Location is one mile northwest Munday and Munday Schools, that all 1952 taxes become delinquent on February 1, 1953. Saturday, January 31, is the last day on which taxes may be paid without penalty and interest. It is also the last day for securing poll tax receipts which entitle you to vote in elections which may come up during the year.

Regarding payment of poll taxes, Mr. Bumpas said:

"Every person who will reach the age of 21 years after the first day of January, 1952, and before the day of a following election shall be entitled to vote at said election, and it will not be necessary that said person shall have paid his poll tax. But he should obtain an exemption certificate. All those who became 21 before January 1, 1952, must pay poll tax before they can vote.

"Those persons who were 60 year's of age before January 1, 1952, are entitled to vote without an exemption certificate.


Wichitans To **Deliver Buyer's Guide Tuesday**

#### GOOD CONTROLS ARE DEAD CONTROLS

Michael DiSalle, who took over again as price control administrator during the closing weeks of the Truman Administration, said that under economic and international conditions exisiting now or likely to exist in the near future there is no possibility of safely eliminating direct controls. Even if matters improve to the extent where direct controls can be eliminated, he went on, standby controls, which could be instantly put into effect without Congressional action, would still be necessary.

Of this an association representing thousands of retail stores observed, "We can't buy any of that. Direct controls of themselves serve no purpose whatsoever. They are meaningless today; and in the event of any new emergency, inflation should be curbed by using tested fiscal measures. Thereafter direct controls should be included in the program only if absolutely necessary. Putting the power to impose direct controls on a standby basis might prove too tempting long befor the effective weapons were even tried."

That stand is both realistic and reasonable. There is no emergency existing now which justifies controls of any kind, save for the allocation of a very short list of critical materials of which few are widely used in the production of consum-

terial should be large enough to allow for the sawing of a "collar" to fit around the clock. The center of the "collar" may be

cut out with a coping or similar-type saw. To get the blade started, insert it in a hole bored near and inside the line marking the outline of the clock.

Shape of the clock will determine whether the outer edge of the "collar" is round, square or hexagonal. The distance between the clock and the outer edge of the Presdwood should range from four to six inches, depending on the size of the clock and the amount of wall space available.

Public opinion samplings indicate that many of us believe corporations earn far greater profits than is actually the case-and that the stockholders who own the corporations cut deep into the money that is taken in through sales and services.

Actually, the largest share by far-86 percent-of all the income of our corporatinos goes to labor, to the men and women who work for them.

Profit is one of the small items in the average corporation's balance sheet. In a typical year it work out less than 7 cents of each sales dollar. And not all of the profit goes to the stockholders in dividends. In most caes a substantial proportion of it is plowed back into the business, to build and improve plants which employ more labor, to create financial reserves, and so on. In most cases the bulk of the profit is used in this fashion.

Finally, that part of corporation profits which does not reach the shareholders doesn't become the property of a mysterious and rather ominus group of "big capitalists."

In late years the number of individual shareholders in American enterprise has been rapidly growing. Most of the shareholders today are typical American men and women-people with average jobs and moderate incomes. They put part of their savings in stocks in which they have faith-just as savings are invted in bank accounts, insurance policies, government bonds, or anything else of value.

#### FARM LABOR OUTLOOK

Slightly less available farm labor at a slightly higher price! That is the forecast of the United States Department of Agriculture for farm help during pected to be sufficient, on the, whole, to keep farm production at high levels.

The number of workers employed on farms has decreased steadily during the past 15 years. At the same time, labor requirements have also declined because of rapid gains in farm mechanization. The result is that output per farm work now is the greatest on record. Further progress in mechanization and other advances in technology should lower labor requirements. Even so, the problem of replacing some workers must be met if production is to be maintained.

Prospects are that wages and farm worksr this year may rise less than 5 per cent, as compared will arise of about 7 per cent. in 1952. The extent of the rise will vary according to the net losses of farm workers to indus-



try in certain areas, and to the Armed Forces.

Although only a nominal increase in the net size of the Armed Forces is predicted in 1953, the rotation of service personnel 1953. 
to non-farm employment because of higher wages or improved working and living conditions. It may be good business for farmers in need of help to be on the lookout for potential year-round workers and to train them.

varies greatly from year to year. A good flexible policy on labor importation from Mexico is the hope and goal of many people in Texas.

**Masonite** Wastebasket Simple to Make

CVERY room should have a wastebasket, and some rooms should have two! Making one or several from the plan here described and illustrated is an easy test of an amateur craftsman's skill.

From a lumber yard obtain some three-quarter-inch quarter-round and a panel of Masonite Tempered Presdwood one-eighth inch thick. With a cross-cut saw, cut from the panel four



dentical pieces for the sides and a smaller one for the bottom. The side pieces are 12 inches long and tapered rom a top width of 10 inches to a botom width of 8 inches. An 8-inch square serves as the bottom.

The panels are nailed to the quarterrounds serving as corner posts. At the bottom of each side piece attach a length of quarter-round to form a square framework into which the bot-

Hand holds may be cut out, as illustrated, with a coping or similar saw. To start the blade, drill a hole.

As a variation from this style, use the same sized sides and bottom, lacing instead of nailing the sides together. No quarter-rounds then are needed, except as a base for the bottom. Drill holes about an inch apart and a halfinch from the edge. Use leather thongs for lacing.

Farmers no longer need to coddle the cobs on which corn grows, thanks to a new advance in grain storage methods recently reported to the American Society of Agri-cultural Engineers.

cultural Engineers. The development is a grain dry-ing and storage unit that makes the corn picker-sheller a practical harvesting machine for corn grow-ers, and cuts farm labor and stor-age costs. D. B. Poor, agricultural engineer for the Great Lakes Steel Corporation's Stran-Steel Division and A.S.A.E. Farm Structures Di-vision chairman, reported to the Society that shelled corn of up to 25 per cent moisture content can be dried successfully with unheated air while stored in this unit. "This means." he said. "that the "This means," he said, "that the

time is now at hand when farmers can eliminate much of the work and structural costs they now put into coddling the cobs on which corn grows."

The new unit was described as a 16-ft. wide Quonset equipped with a unique down-flow aeration sys-tem. 
