









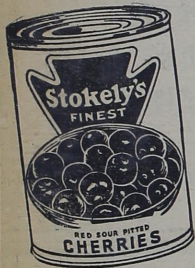

Dear editor:

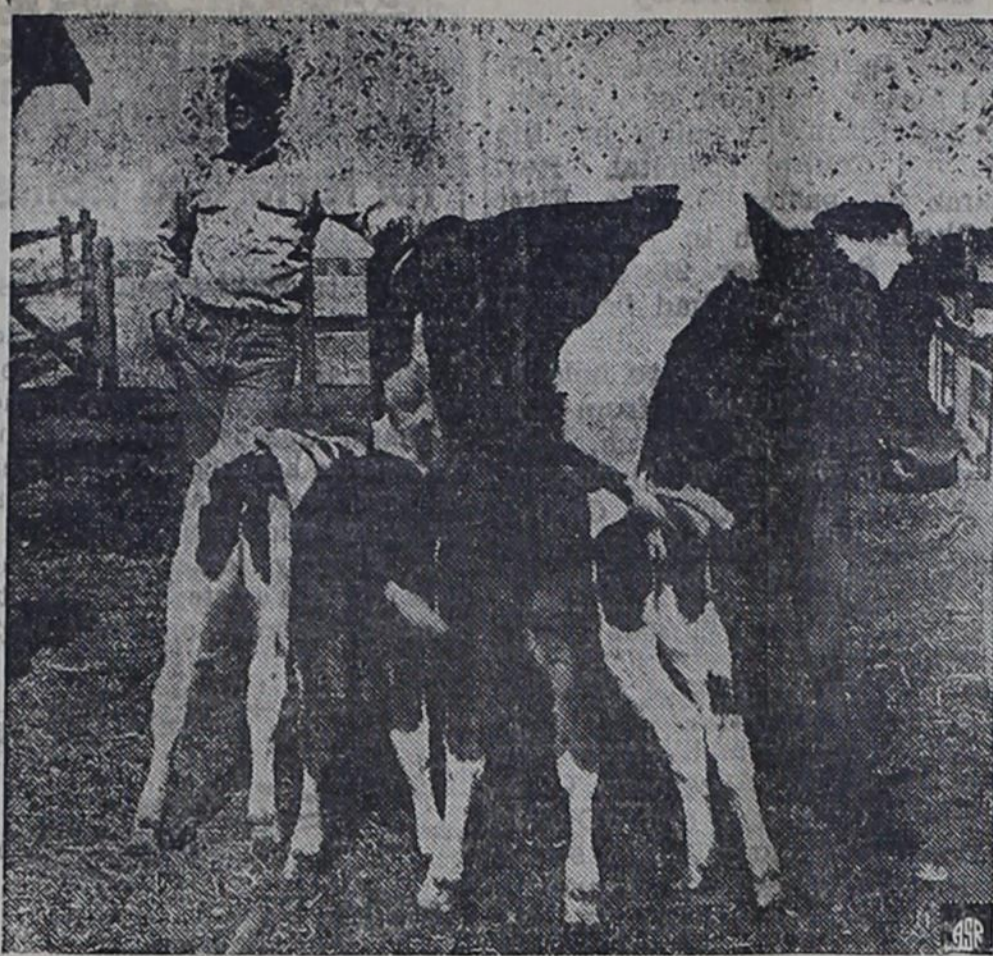
I have been reflectin on the cattle market situation out here, and as you know the market has been pretty rough, not only on the cattlemen but also on the bankers, as any banker who had a hundred dollars loaned on a two hundred dollar cow is now about in the cattle business with a seventy-five dollar cow and the grazing around most banks I've been in is pretty short.

Naturally, somebody ought to come to the rescue of us cattlemen and bankers, especially us cattlemen, and I don't know of anybody who's better equipped or had more experience than the

government in Washington.

Now I've been thinkin over how the government can do it, and it's not easy. A price support deal on grass might help, and I suppose there are experts in Washington who could work out a system where Bermuda grass could be supported at so much. Johnson grass at so much, needle grass at so much, etc., but the thing will be complicat-

ed as there's not much way to determin how much grass a pasture has been producing over the years, except to take my word for it, and some experts might not consider that reliable evidence. I always judge my pasture by the shape of my cows, when the bones begin showin I know the grass is playin out and if a neighbor's fence doesn't give before long the situation will get serious.

But the best system I've figured out is just a price support program for the cattle themselves. You buy a good Jersey steer for 18 cents a pound and keep it a year and sell it for 8 cents and there ain't no way on earth to come out ahead without goin through Washington and pickin up something on the way, and when it comes to a choice, Washington was designed to bear the brunt.

Naturally, the program is gonna have to be a little different from the price support program for grain or cotton. The government can buy grain and hold it for a better price, but you try storin a cow and you run into all kinds of complications.

But I believe Washington can do it, and if it can't, that's Washington's worry not mine.

I hope Congress will turn up the air-conditioned and really give some heavy thought to this problem. Me and my cows can't hold out much longer.

## Brief Articles On The Draft Law And Regulations

II.  
(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of short articles on the draft law and its rules and regulations.)

It is the local draft board's responsibility, under the law and regulations to decide, subject to appeal, the class in which each man registered with it shall be placed.

Each registrant is considered as available for military service until his eligibility for deferment or exemption from military service is clearly established to the satisfaction of the local board.

The board is obligated to receive all pertinent information on classification presented to it, says Brig. Gen. Paul L. Wakefield, state draft director.

Mailing by the local board of a classification questionnaire to the latest address furnished by a registrant is notice to the registrant that he will be classified in I-A, unless information is presented to the local board, within the time specified for return of the questionnaire, which will justify his deferment or exemption.

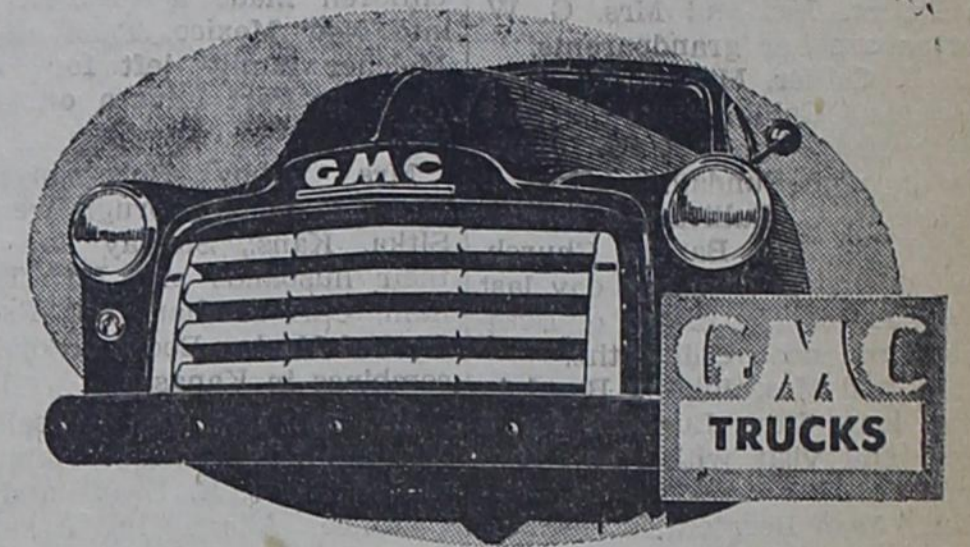
Unless the local board gives him added time, the registrant must return the questionnaire filled out within 10 days from date it was mailed.

The state draft director points to this paragraph in the Selective Service Regulations which the board must always keep in mind:

"In classifying a registrant there should be no discrimination for or against him because of his race, creed, or color, or because of his membership or activity in any labor, political, re-

ligious, or other organization. Each registrant shall receive equal justice." Kay Waheed and Abraham Choucair visited relatives at Sulphur, Okla., last Sunday.
