The American Cotton Growers be using dye until their third phase. Denim Plant in Littlefield has contracted to make denim strictly for Levi Strauss & Company. They proximately 29 million yards of 60-inch denim.

Upon reaching the plant, I was surprised at the size of the structure, which covered approximately 10 acres.

We watched in amazement as the cotton was separated into small tufts by six large machines passing back and fourth over the tops of the cotton bales, picking up a small layer with each pass, blending 192 bales to get the right yarn texture (as shown below). Cotton

Through a warping process, 353 individual strands of yarn were gathered in a rope form and wound onto a log, thus forming a ball warp (as shown below). The yarn



goes through sulfur dye, wash boxes, indigo dye vats, and drying cans, and coiled into tubes. The dyed yarn was then separated back into individual strands, called beaming, and run through a slashing machine which coats it with a starch and wax solution. All this is done with large machinery that you just have to see to believe.

The weaving process, which will be Phase II for the local plant, interlaces the dyed varn and the natural colored yarn, producing 100% cotton denim. This particular room held 354 weaving machines, all electronically conremoves foreign matter and short trolled. REMINDER TO TAXPAYERS

January 31, 1994

is the last day to pay your 1993 taxes and avoid the additional penalty and interest charges

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS

Homeowners are not required to file a homestead exemption annually. If you are already receiving the state mandated \$5,000 homestead exemption or additional over sixty-five \$10,000 exemption, you need not reapply for the taxing year of 1994. However, if you became 65 after January 1, 1993, and before January 1, 1994, you need to apply for the additional over sixty-five \$10,000 exemption. If you have changed your place of residency, you need to apply for a new exemption. All homestead exemption applications must be filed with Chief Appraiser Stanton Brown between the dates of January 1, 1994 and May 1, 1994. These exemption forms are available at the Knox County Appraisal District Office, which is located in the Knox County Courthouse.

AG-USE EXEMPTIONS

Annual applications for qualifying land for agriculture use is not required. If you have been receiving the AG-USE exemption on your land in prior years, you need not reapply for the exemption. If you have recently purchased a farm, you need to report this to the Chief Appraiser. AG-USE exemption forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1994, and May 1, 1994.

DISABLED VETERANS EXEMPTION

These exemptions need to be applied for annually. If you received your exemption on the 1993 tax roll, you will automatically receive it for the tax year of 1994. However, if your disability percentage has changed, you need to report the change to the Chief Appraiser. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1994, and May 1, 1994.

RENDITIONS

Taxpayers are reminded that it is still their responsibility to render their property to the Chief Appraiser. These rendition forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for tax renditions is between January 1, 1994, and April 1, 1994.


A pickup parked between the house and church was pulled to safety. None of the Millers were hurt. A Benjamin fireman was overcome by the heavy smoke for a time.



Medicare General Enrollment Period Begins Darla Griffis-Lane

Did you decide not to take Part B of Medicare when you were first eligible for it? Or did you have Part B once and then dropped the coverage? If you fit into either . of these situations, you'll have a chance to sign up for Part B during the annual enrollment period that runs from January 1, 1994, through March 31, 1994. This three-month period offers a second chance to those who did not enroll when they were first eligible and those who dropped their coverage in the interim. If you enroll during the current sign-up period, your coverage will begin July 1, 1994.

If you did not enroll when you first were eligible, your Medicare Part B premium will be 10 percent higher than the basic monthly premium for each twelve-month period you were eligible but not enrolled. For 1994, the basic monthly Medicare Part B premium is \$41.10. There are special premium rules and enrollment periods (generally with no penalty for delayed enrollment) for workers age 65 or older and for people under age 65 with disabilities who have group health coverage based on their own or their spouse's current employment. Part B coverage, also called "medical insurance," helps pay for doctor's services, outpatient hospital care, and other medical ser-

If you're age 65 or older and not eligible for Medicare's premiumfree Hospital Insurance (Part A) coverage, you can buy this coverage along with Part B coverage during the annual enrollment period. (People entitled to Medicare Hospital Insurance through the Social Security or Railroad Retirement systems or through government employment do not pay this premium). Your monthly premium will be 10 percent higher than the basic amount if you delayed your enrollment for 12 months or more after you were first eligible to enroll. In 1994, the basic monthly premium for Part A coverage will be \$245. For individuals with 30 credits or more of

work covered by Social Security but not enough to qualify for benefits, the amount is reduced to

If your income is about \$600 a month and you have limited assets, the state may pay some or all of your Medicare expenses, including buying Part A coverage under the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) program. Under the QMB provisions, Medicare hospital and medical premiums and the deductible and coinsurance amounts may be paid by the state government. If your income is slightly above the level to qualify for the QMB program (more than \$600 a month but less than \$700), you may qualify for state help in paying your Part B (Medical In-

surance) premium under the Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiary (SLMB) program. Only your state can decide if you qualify for help under either program. Contact your state or local medical assistance (Medicaid) agency, social services office, or welfare office if you think you qualify. Call the toll-free number, 1-800-638-6833, for the telephone number of your medical assistance of-

If you think you qualify but you haven't filed for Medicare Part A, contact Social Security to find out if you need to file an application. Further information about filing for Medicare is available from your local Social Security office or from Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213.


