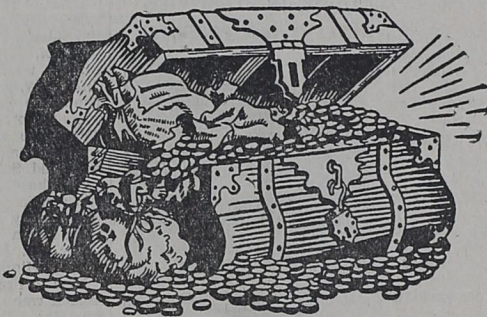


Munday Merchants Again Present Their

Thanksgiving May Be Time To Solve Yule Mail Problems

Thanksgiving Day can be an even happier holiday for the family already planning Christmas shopping and mailing.

This observation came from Postmaster Chan Hughes, who predicted another heavy mail volume for Monday this Christmas.

Mr. Hughes said he has received reports from the Post Office Department in Washington, D. C. that a record Christmas mail volume of nearly 12 billion pieces is expected nationally during December.

"Our office will be catching it both ways—going out and coming in. I hope the residents of Munday will begin their Christmas shopping and mailing Friday if they have not already done so."

Mr. Hughes suggested that several hours planning during this Thanksgiving holiday can be of immense value in saving time and trouble later on Christmas mailing. Here are a few good tips:

1. Dig out last year's Christmas mailing list if you have one, or make up a list if you don't have one.
2. Check any changes in address and make corrections wherever possible.
3. Use ZIP code to speed your mail on addresses wherever possible. If it is not feasible to obtain the addressee's ZIP Code, at least include your own in the return address.
4. Settle on as many specific gift purchases now as you can, and make a calculation of how

much strong mailing material—tape, boxes, cord, etc.—you will need to obtain. Get these mailing materials while items are in good supply locally.

"A few hours spent on Thanksgiving Day in planning Christmas mailings will provide plenty to be thankful for later on," the Postmaster observed.

"And," he added, "your Munday Post Office and nine employees will be very thankful too."

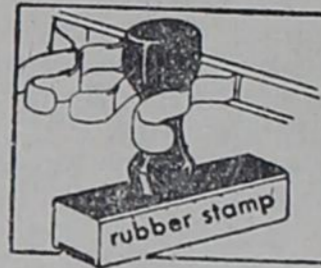

Driving Courtesy

We hear a lot these days about courteous driving. Courtesy is the oil that keeps friction from developing when we rub each other the wrong way in traffic. Without it we would soon be at each other's throats.

Courtesy is such an important part of the daily life of each of us that we speak of it as "common courtesy." You have often heard someone say something like this, "Well, common courtesy demands that we do this." With courtesy such a common thing it seems almost out of place to have to mention it to a group of professional drivers.

But courtesy is not a common thing among drivers. It seems that when we get behind the wheel we forget many of the things we do as a matter of course at other times. The man who politely tips his hat and stands aside for a lady to enter a room ahead of him will, behind the wheel, race the same woman for first place at an intersection. The most charitable thing we can say about discourtesy in traffic is that it is the product of a fast moving civilization that places too much emphasis on winning and not enough on how the victory is won.

Courtesy is far reaching. If you perform an act of courtesy to some driver he will usually look at you a little bewildered at first as if he can't believe his eyes,

then a smile lights up his face and he goes down the street ready to pass it on to someone else. Thus a small act of courtesy moves outward in an ever-widening circle like waves when a pebble is thrown in a pool of water.

What are some of these courteous acts that produce such wonderful results? Very simple things like—

1. Slowing down when passing through pools of water to avoid splashing cars or pedestrians.
2. Stopping to assist a motorist in trouble.
3. Waiting behind a confused motorist without sounding our impatience on the horn.
4. Yielding to avoid an accident or a close call, even when it's our turn.
5. Stopping and making a break in traffic to let a vehicle enter from a driveway.
6. Waiting for elderly or confused pedestrians to clear the intersection.
7. Dimming our lights first when meeting traffic at night.
8. Dimming headlights when following closely at night.
9. Giving turn signals in plenty of time to warn those following.
10. Parking parallel to the curb and not double.
11. Keeping engine noise down.
12. Helping a child across a busy street.
13. Waiting for a good opening before entering a traffic stream.

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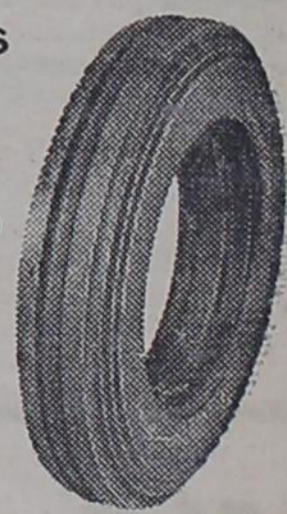

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New Areas Report Screwworm Threat

Mission — Reports of screwworm infestations in counties that have not had cases all year have prompted screwworm eradication officials to issue a warning to livestock producers. They caution livestockmen that they cannot yet afford to let down their guard against the insect.

Failure to prevent development and spread of the livestock pest could cause serious outbreaks in areas that have been screwworm-free so far during 1963, authorities said.

Even as the number of infestations which had reached record proportions during October, appeared to be declining, cases were being discovered in Archer County in North Texas and such East Texas counties as Madison, Kaufman and Houston. This marked the deepest penetration into East Texas by the screwworm fly since early this spring.

Eradication workers feel that weather is now ideal for screwworms to migrate into areas where it might have been too hot and dry for them to survive earlier this fall and summer. Cold fronts experienced thus far have been too mild to relieve the danger of further infestation except in the most northern Texas counties, they said.

To insure that screwworms do not have the opportunity to develop and produce offspring that could infest "free" areas, eradication workers urge producers to check their livestock frequently and treat cuts and scratches that could invite infestation. When infestations are detected, a dozen or more of the larvae should be collected and the discovery reported to county agents, livestock inspectors or vocational agriculture teachers. Then appropriate control measures can be initiated. The wound should then be treated with insecticide to kill the remaining larvae.

Officials said October proved to be a busy month for screwworms with farmers and ranchers from 107 Texas counties reporting 1,725 cases, the largest number reported during any month this year. Even with the buildup, however, less than 20 per cent as many cases were discovered this year as during October 1952, when 8,702 infestations were reported in 222 counties.

Bond Sales Are Short Of Quota

October Savings Bond sales in Knox County totaled \$3,812. This announcement was made recently by Mr. W. E. Braly, chairman of the Knox County Savings Bonds Committee.

Total sales in this county during the first 10 months of 1963 were \$144,981 which represented 50.5% of the 1963 sales goal.

Texas Bond sales to date amounted to \$122,667,337 or 31.4% of the year sales goal.

"According to information received from the Treasury Department, 1963 Bond sales are hitting new peacetime highs. During the first 10 months of the year Bond sales nationally have increased 11% over the same period in 1962. While sales have shown a fine increase, it is also noted that Bond redemptions have decreased 2.7% during the same period," Mr. Braly reported.

Mrs. Mary Etta Pounds Speck, 78, mother of Mrs. Wylie B. Johnson of Munday, passed away at 8:15 a.m. Tuesday in the Haskell hospital after a long illness.

She was born June 29, 1885, in Hopkins County, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Pounds, and married J. D. (Dillard) Speck on January 17, 1904, in Rochester. She had lived in Haskell County since 1903.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday from the First Baptist Church in Rochester with Rev. Paul Nelson officiating. He was assisted by Cecil Cox, Church of Christ minister at Rochester, and Rev. Hubert Sego of Haskell. Burial was in Rochester Cemetery.
