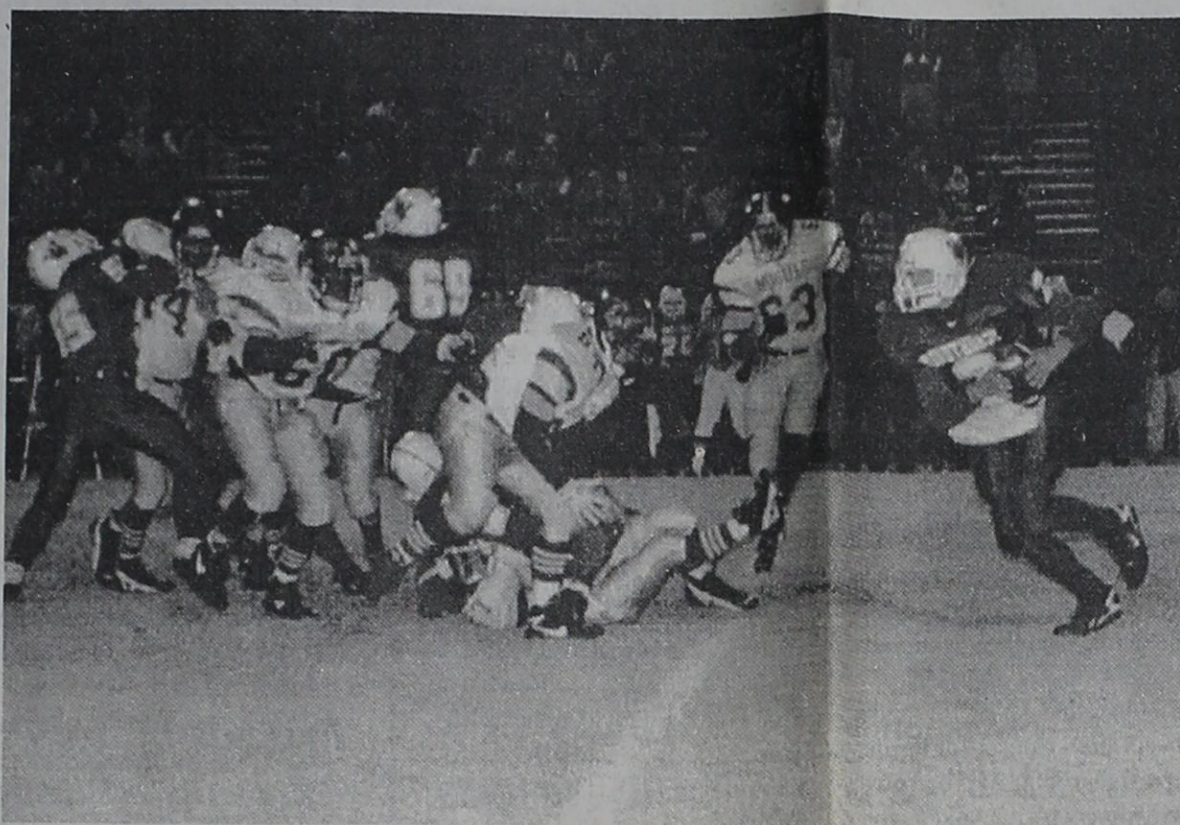

Moguls defeat Windthorst  
for Bi-District Championship

Chilling winds and snow could not cool the Moguls last Friday night as they upended the defending Class A State Champion Windthorst Trojans 28 to 21 at Seymour Panther stadium.

Munday scored on runs of 47, 38, 52 and 51 yards to defeat Windthorst in the Bi-District Championship game.

The Moguls scored on the third play of the game. Brian Urganczyk covered the opening kick-off at the 40 yard line. Munday moved across to the Trojan 47 on runs of 4 and 9 then Roberto Nunez went off the right tackle untouched for a 47 yard touchdown run.

Windthorst would turn the ball over twice in the first quarter. After pushing their way out to their 48 yard line, the Trojans set up for a pass. Brian Urganczyk shook off a block came, from behind the quarterback, stripped and covered the fumble. Munday would move up to the Windthorst 20 yard line. A 40 yard field goal attempt sailed wide left.

The Trojans moved the ball down to Mogul territory with three first downs, one reverse play going 18 yards. The Munday defense stiffened up and held Windthorst for a fourth down and four. The Trojan runningback was stopped two yards shy and a fumble was recovered by Jacob Cabrera.

With the change of the quarter and with the wind behind them, Windthorst began one of their two scoring drives in the second after receiving a Mogul punt at their own 35. Eleven plays and 65 yards later Kyle Schneider scored from 10 yards out. With the extra point the score was tied at 7.

Roberto Nunez returned the kick-off 54 yards to the Trojan 46 but the Moguls could not take advantage of it. The punt settled at the Windthorst 8 yard line and the Trojans started a 92 yard scoring drive and 5 minutes off the clock. Andy Syrus scored from 8 yards out and 38 seconds left in the first half. The extra point kick was wide, but Windthorst was on top 13 to 7.

Munday took the second half kick-off and would score. A 58 yard drive was capped off by a 38 yard run off tackle by Jonathan Reagins with 9:43 for a 14 to 13 lead.

After trading punts Windthorst had good field position at the Munday 47. They would stop the Trojans at the 30, 1 yard short of the first down. At that point lightning would postpone the game for approximately 20 minutes. When the Moguls came back they would score in four plays. From the 48 Jonathan Reagins sped 52 yards for the touchdown. Key's extra

point would put the Moguls up by 8, 21 to 13.

The Trojans evened up the score with 8 minutes left in the game. A drive from their own 31 yard line ended with a 2 yard plunge by Wes Johnson. Johnson would keep the ball on the extra point run to tie the score at 21.

The Moguls bounced back to regain the lead 28 to 21 with 6:35 left in the game. Three plays after the kick-off Roberto Nunez would race 51 yards for the winning touchdown.

Windthorst would have one more chance after driving to the Mogul 8 yard line. On fourth down and 4 yards to go, Munday's defense held strong to stop the Trojan's short of the first.

With less than a minute to go in the game, Munday would run out the clock and claim the Bi-District Championship.

**Coach Gunter's Comments:** I couldn't have been prouder of the way our football team stuck together and got the victory last Friday night. Our line and backs on offense blocked well. I was really concerned about the size of their defensive front, but we were able to handle them well enough to move the football.

Defensively I know they made some plays, but we came up with big plays when we had to. Overall it was a great win for our kids, community, and school.

This week we face a very explosive team in the Baird Bears. Baird is led by the throwing and running of their quarterback. They also have a good TB that has good speed. Defensively, they use a variety of fronts so, we will have to be able to pick up assignments against each of these. The Regional Championship game will be played in Hamlin at 7:30 Friday night. Munday will be the home team.

The 1997 Knox County Pecan Show has been scheduled for Saturday, December 6. The judging will take place at the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Station in Munday beginning at 8:30 a.m.

Entries must be submitted by noon on Wednesday, December 3, 1997 to one of the following locations: Whittle & Paint Shop, Knox City; Knox County Extension Service office, Benjamin; or the TAMU Vegetable Research Station, Munday. There is no entry fee and no limits as to the number of entries submitted by an individual.

All entries must have been raised on trees in Knox County. Each entry must include the exhibitor's name, complete mailing address and telephone number. An entry consists of forty (40) pecans of one variety grown on the same tree.

This year the judge will be Emory Boring, III, Entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Vernon. Mr. Boring has judged many pecan shows here in Knox County and throughout West Texas.

This year's pecan show is being sponsored by the Brazos Valley Young Farmers, the Knox County Horticulture Committee, and the Knox County Extension Service. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin. Indi-

Norman, who works in a doughnut shop and is unable to resist the lure of the sweet pastries, takes great pride in the huge bundle of keys which dangle from his waist; Lucien P. Smith has the mind of a five-year old, but imagines that he is able to read and comprehend the weighty books which he lugs about; Arnold, the ringleader of the group, is a hyperactive, compulsive chatterer, who suffers from deep-seated insecurities and a persecution complex; while Barry, a brilliant schizophrenic who is devastated by the unfeeling rejection of his brutal father, fantasizes that he is a golf pro. Mingled with scenes from the daily lives of these four, where "little things: sometimes become momentous (and often very funny), are moments of great poignancy when, with touching effectiveness, we are reminded that the handicapped, like the rest of us, want only to love and laugh and find some meaning and purpose in the brief time which they, like their more fortunate brothers, are allotted on this earth.

### Health checks for all gulf vets urged by The American Legion

In the wake of reports that 98,000 U.S. troops may have been exposed to chemical weapons after the Gulf War, the leader of the nation's largest veterans group has urged all Gulf War veterans to sign up for free VA physical examinations. "Veterans concerned about health problems that may have been caused by their military service in the Gulf owe it to themselves, their families and other

veterans to take the exams," said Joseph J. Frank, the national commander of the American Legion. The Legion commander pointed out that the latest news from the Pentagon dealt with a single event and only one caused from a long list of medical suspects. "The most recent report doesn't explain why a single Gulf War

veteran is ill. Nor does it provide information that will help doctors to treat that veteran," Frank said. "We're at the beginning of a long road that will lead toward answers. The latest announcement doesn't place us any closer to the end." Gulf War veterans who believe their military service may have harmed their health can receive free, extensive physical examinations from the Department of Veterans Affairs. The examinations can be scheduled by calling 1-800-827-1000.

# Why America needs more small towns

I have finally figured out just exactly what has caused the decline in American ethics and morals. I believe it can be attributed to the absence of old-fashioned family values and to the fact that most Americans do not live in small towns.

## TxDOT joins forces with criminal justice agencies to maintain roadways

With the passage of House Bill 2825 this past legislative session, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will get some much welcomed help in maintaining state roadways from an unlikely partner - the criminal justice system.

In its monthly meeting today, the Texas Transportation Commission authorized TxDOT to develop a program to work with criminal justice agencies. Under legislation by Representative Allen Place, D-Gatesville, the Texas Transportation Commission can contract with criminal justice agencies, including community supervision and corrections departments and county sheriff's departments with a county farm, workhouse or correctional entry program for inmate and probationer labor.

The legislation allows TxDOT to use inmates and probationers to assist in highway improvement projects. Anticipated projects include activities such as cleaning debris under bridges, trimming trees and brush, painting, removing graffiti and picking up litter from rights-of-way.

TxDOT already has a similar agreement with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ). In fiscal 1997, TDCJ inmates participated in more than 300 roadway improvement projects around the state, logging in more than 130,000 hours.

The Texas Department of Transportation conducted a pre-construction meeting on November 14, 1997, at TxDOT's South Area Office in Munday, to discuss plans to rehabilitate the existing roadway on FM 1608. In attendance were TxDOT officials, contractor and Johnny Birkenfield, Knox County Commissioner.

According to D.J. Peters, Lipham construction Company, the \$666,147.23 the project is to begin next week with barricades being set. With weather permitting, the project should take 75 days to complete, with an estimated completion date of May, 1998.

Traffic will be diverted to one lane during the daylight hours and opened to two lanes to traffic during nighttime hours. Gary Mizer stressed that "ensuring the safety of the workers on the job and the traveling public were our prime concerns in the completion of this project."
