Meet Moulton In First Tilt

Bearing a gaudy 37-1 season record, Baird's girls basketball team goes after the big one this weekend at the University of Texas' huge Gregory Gymnasium.

The Baird High School girls face Moulton in the first round of the Class A girls state tournament at 3:40 p.m. Friday. Wylie and Jourdanon clash in the other Class A game at 2 p.m.

Winners of the two games will square off at 3:20 p.m. Saturday for the state championship. Losers will tangle at 10:20 a.m. Saturday to settle third place.

State tournaments in the other classifications will be conducted at the same time.

Members of the Baird team will leave at 8:30 a.m. Thursday for the tournament. Scheduled to make the trip are Paula Corn, Karen Bearden, Elaine Hass, Sue Howard, Betty Corn, Sharon Jeter, Dana Corn, Vicki Jones, Sally Green, Yvonne Shellnut, Kathy Townsend, Nadine Shellnut, Peggy Gordon and Joyce Howard.

The state tournament will climax what has already been a highly successful season for the Baird team and Coach L. B. Howard. The girls swept through District 10-A without a defeat, mopped up on three practice games, and bashed Copperas Cove in bi-district play before going into regional action.

Their only loss this season was at the hands of Trent — a team they have beaten several times during the year — in the finals of the Hardin-Simmons University invitation tournament.

The Baird team is averaging more than 70 points per game while having held their opponents to slightly less than 50 points per outing.

In the regional finals last Saturday night, the Baird girls had to overcome stubborn Millsap for a 65-59 win and the trip to Austin. But it took a fourth-quarter surge to ice it away.

Baird rolled to an 18-11 margin after a quarter and made it 34-29 at halftime. But when the fourth started, Baird held only a slim 48-44 edge.

Paula Corn poured through 43 points, including 10 in that important fourth quarter. Karen had 10 and Elaine Hass made 10.

Eldonna Wright had 33 for Millsap and Drenda Henderson had 17.

Opening the tournament at Denton, Baird rolled over Wylie by 72-56 with Miss Corn tallying 53. Miss Hass hit 11 and Miss Bearden added eight. Betty Sue Strickland paced Wylie with 29.

Baird opened up a comfortable 24-11 margin in the first quarter and made it 41-24 at halftime. When the fourth frame opened, Baird had a 19-point cushion, 58-39.

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Tractor Maintenance Course Set March 31-April 3 at Eula School

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held March 31-April 3 under the sponsorship of the Eula and Clyde high school vocational agriculture departments, according to vocational agriculture teachers Claude Rock and James Trammell of Clyde.

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Harold T. Wiedemann, tractor maintenance specialist with the vocational agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will be instructor. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Wiedemann, a native of Mission, received his B.S. degree in agricultural engineering from Texas A&M University in 1956. During summer vacations he worked with the John Deere Implement Company of Mission, and while serving 24 months active duty with the U. S. Army he was in charge of instruction and maintenance of both track and wheel type vehicles.

The short course will be held at Eula and is scheduled to begin March 31 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held on April 1, 2, and 3.

During days the short course is in progress, Wiedemann will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction, according to Rock and Trammell.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the schools superintendent Mac Coppinger at Eula or Farrell Newton at Clyde, or the vocational agriculture teachers. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged.

Tractor maintenance short course certificates are to be presented to each individual who attends all the training sessions.

Wiedemann said the key to longer tractor life comes from a "full knowledge of the fundamental of the proper maintenance skills involving lubrication, fuels, carburetion, air cleaners, cooling systems, valves and ignition."

Wiedemann will cover the proper adjustments and maintenance skills of the above, with emphasis on the importance of each in obtaining longer tractor life.

Throughout the short course emphasis will be placed on "learning to do by doing" through the use of several demonstration tractors. Students will have the opportunity to perform actual adjustments and maintenance on these tractors. Safety during both maintenance and actual operation will also be included in this course.

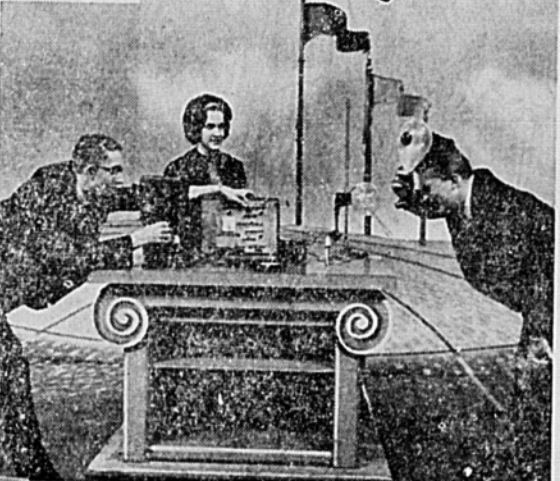

QUICKIE LESSONS IN GRAMMAR BY LLOYD D. HUFF

One of my correspondents writes asking for information about the following sentence: "The bottom of the Caribbean, planted with swaying coral fans and seaweed and inhabited by millions of tiny fish, is a place of strange beauty." Her question centers around the part played by the words "planted" and "inhabited." She holds that these two participial phrases modify "bottom." Her friend, in disagreement, holds that the two modify "Caribbean." Actually this sentence is an ambiguous one and shifts its point of view as one reads it. Looking at it logically, the coral fans and seaweed could grow only rooted in the ocean floor or bottom; likewise, the millions of

tiny fish would not live in the mud of the bottom, but would swim in the water of the "Caribbean"; as I see it, "planted" could not modify "Caribbean" and would have to modify "bottom" — conversely, "inhabited" could not modify "bottom" and would have to modify "Caribbean"; and this ambiguity makes for confusion.

One other question asked was about the sentence "That dress becomes you," and the question is "What part of speech is you?" Regularly, of course, "becomes" is a linking verb and anything following it will be either a predicate adjective or a predicate nominative. In this sentence, however, "becomes" is idiomatic and means roughly the equivalent of "fits," "flatters," or "suits"; hence, "you" is readily seen to be a plain old everyday pronoun used as a direct object.

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
