



The typhoid germ travels from an infected person to the well person; this is generally accomplished by water, milk, flies, fingers, or food. Every case is contracted by way of the mouth and digestive system.

A carrier is a person who has had typhoid fever at some time and who even after recovery carries the germs of the disease in the urine and discharge of the bowels. Health Letter

Texas State Department of Health, Austin, Texas, Geo. W. Cox, M. D., State Health Officer.

Austin-"There is no easy road to the abatement of insects and rodents, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Frequently people get enthusiastic about the destruction of the insects and beieve that, if an airplane flies over the town, or if a huge fogging machine rolls through town spreading an insecticide, the insects will killed instantly and peace from the insect nuisance will remain forever. This is an erroneous and, unfortunately, bad practice, be-cause it creates an unwarranted

ense of security.

Before any killing is anticipated, a thorough clean-up of the com-munity should be carried on. This means cleaning up the rubbish and garbage and eliminating all insect feeding and breeding places. It might mean the draining or filling in of wet areas for destrucion of the mosquito larvae. When this is done, one will be surprised now few insects are left to become a nuisance and, perhaps, a public health problem.

Following this, it is suggested that insecticides be sprayed man-ually to those places inhabited by the insects. Experience has shown that a 2 per cent to 5 per cent solution of DDT is still the most effective insecticide to use for general sanitation. This is spread to form a thin coat on the surface, where it can remain for future destruction. A spray that will just moisten the surface is sufficient to be effective. Spray only those areas where you know the insects

A new weapon against alcoholism is promised in the new drug antabuse. At least this is what experiments today indicate. These experiments have been going on in some seventy medical instituer will feel hot, his face flushes, advanced for their construction, his heart beats faster, his breathing heavier, and he feels nauseated, may vomit, and usually winds up by getting drowsy and falling asleep. The drug is not for sale to the public and its use as a doctor's prescription awaits final evaluation of the tests. Antabuse was discovered by accident. Years ago in a St. Louis chemical factory it was found that when workers exposed to the drug drank beer, they became ill. In 1947 two doctors in Copenhagen, Dr. Erik Jacobsen and Dr. Jens Hald were conducting tests of the drug in other fields. They tried it on themselves and noticed strange effects when afterward they dead to the people of our region." when afterward they drank cocktails. 


