Quarantine at Kerrville, shows that in Texas the area where the fly was found to have survived the winter extends at least 300 miles farther north, 150 miles farther northeast and 200 miles farther northwest than during any winter since 1943 when the survey program was started. Several farmers cooperating with the Lower Pease River Soil Conservation District in the Crowell work unit area have recently planted grass seed. Joe Orr. A. L. Mc-Ginnis and Ramon Rasberry have planted a mixture of Big Bluestem, Little Bluestem, Side oats and Indian grass. J. C. Prosser planted Indian grass and a mixture of Side oats, Big bluestem and Little bluestem on a retired tenacre field. Dr. R. L. Kincaid has planted about ten acres using a mixture of Blue grama and Side oats. He also plans to seed a small amount of King ranch bluestem on a trial basis, W. S. Carter planted five acres using a mixture of Side oats, Blue grama and Buffalo. He prepared the seed bed by planting sudan grass in the fall and chopping it in after it had made a good growth. By doing this he has a firm seed bed with a good cover to help hold moisture and protect the seed from wind.

Feather-bedding scheme of Firemen's Union to put an additional fireman on diesel locomotives has been

Fact Finding Boards appointed by Presidents Roosevelt and Truman have said these demands were "devoid of merit" and they were

Now the Firemen's leaders seek to paralyze railroad transportation to compel the railroads to employ a wholly unnecessary additional fireman to ride on diesel locomotives. This scheme is plain

LEADERS OF the Firemen's union have called a nationwide strike starting with four great railroads on April 26. These railroads are the New York Central, Pennsylvania, Santa Fe, and Southern.

Again, on September 19, 1949, after a second hearing on the union leaders' demands, a second Board reported to President Truman that: "there presently exists no need for an additional fireman . . . upon either the ground of safety or that of efficiency and economy of operation."

Although the railroads accepted the Board findings, the union leaders have brazenly rejected them. They represent that an

extra fireman is needed for "safety" reasons. Here's what the Board had to say on that point:

"The safety and on-time performance of diesel electric locomotives operated under current rules have been notably good ...

"Upon careful analysis of the data submitted on safety, we have concluded that no valid reasons have been shown as a support for the Brotherhood proposal under which a fireman would be required to be at all times continuously in the cab of road diesels. The proposal must be rejected."

The real reason behind these demands is that the union leaders are trying to make jobs where there is no work. In other words, a plain case of "feather-bedding." The railroads have no intention of yielding to these wasteful make-work demands.

DISGRACEFUL HYPOCRISY

At a recent press conference, President Truman called for an electric power network for America. According to news reports, this would include the great rivers and valleys-the Columbia, the Ohio and Mississippi, the Snake, and the rest. When asked who would transmit this power to users, the President answered, "The government will do it if necessary . . . private companies if they could do it as cheaply."

The significance of this is plain. It is simply one more phase of the campaign to socialize, step by step, all the power resources of the country; to give the government complete control over a service which is vital to the life of industry, agriculture, and the individual, and to bring to an end local control over a great local resource and taxable asset. The cost to the taxpayers would be gi-

It was said, it is true, that private companies would distribute the power if they could do it as cheaply as the government. But the whole history of government activity in the field of business is that honest accountings of costs are never made. Government exempts its business activities from taxation. Government gets the money for construction either free of interest or at an interest cost far lower than private enterprise can command. Government - as in the case of its power projects
—can charge off costs to flood control, reclamation, navigation or other activities, in order to delude the people as to the true cost of producing the electric power. Government business is free of all state laws which govern private citizens and private business. Government can create and maintain monopolies which wipe out all competition and such monopolies are exempt from all antitrust laws which apply to other combinations in restraint of trade. Government in business is the rankest kind of unfair, destructive competition that can be used to put private citizens out of business. - Indus



When man pays \$300 toward the erection of a bond estate he has crenot increase until he pays in more, out when he pays his first life inpolicy he has created an estate

with an estate that would have been ample to care for them adequately as long as they might live, but through lack of management, unwise spending and bad investments, the estate became exhausted and the beneficiaries had to live their last days with relatives or from grants from the County Wel-fare office.

This never happens in the case of a life insurance estate. Life nsurance estates are always administered just as creator of them desired and planned. There are no slip ups. If he desires that his wife receive \$150 a month as long as she shall live, it will be paid in just this way and no one can

In my community I have seen a number of wills the makers of which desired that their property should be administered in a certain way. Through court action this olan has been thwarted and none of the desires of the deceased have been carried out. This does not happen in the case of life insur-ance. The plans of the creator of the estate are always carried out as he planned and wished them to

I know of some instances in my community where lawyers' fees and court costs consumed most of several sizable estates and the real wish of the creator of the estate was thwarted and defeated.




