Class History

Well do we remember an early September day in 1947, when we, a merry but frightened group of six year olds, entered the door of learning, better known as primary school.

Staring wide eyed—with mouths open—or peeping from behind our mother's back, we got the first glimpse of our first grade teachers, Miss Thelma White and Mrs. Carrie Hart. In this group were 24 of our present class: Joyce Howard, Bettie Knox, Jeanne Johnson, Don Hunter, R. H. McCoy, Joe Wheeler, Dale Johnson, J. W. Golden, Lillie Polk, Larry Hord, Vera Porter, Jimmy Cates, Gerald Bradford, Jerry Fairchild, Duane Johnson, Pat Prosser, Linda Jane Harris, Roberta Hough, Judy Hollenbaugh, Robert Fish, Linda Teague, Jimmy Rader, Sandra Simmons and Dee Ann Christian.

In our second year, featuring Mrs. Graves and Miss Berdel Nelson—we gained Henry Faske, formerly of Northside. Our third year was supervised by Mrs. Gordon Cooper and Miss Nina Jo Chesser. We really felt big by the time we were fourth graders under Mrs. Martha Thomas and Mrs. James Welch. Eugene Monkres of Pampa, Mary Ann Brown of Truscott and Roxie Adkins from Thalia enrolled that year. Our fifth grade found us guided by Miss Marilyn Hays and Miss Florence Black. In the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades we had departmental work under Mesdames Otto Davenport, Dick Todd, Elmo Todd, W. C. Smith and Messrs. Glen Taylor, Clark Hitt, Gordon Erwin, Miss Cora Carter and Mr. Hitt were our principals during these years. In the eighth grade Diane Sledge came from Hawley, and David Carpenter from Thalia. That year ended with the first big thrill—graduation. Bettie Knox was valedictorian, and Sidney Lanier was salutatorian.

We began life as freshmen numbering sixty-seven. This included nine who had been classmates at Thalia and were transferred to our high school. They were Don Taylor, Janie Wright, Eldon Whitman, Johnny Matus, Oecie Tarver, Jimmy Werley, Gayle Taylor, Pat-

McRae, Judy Vaughn, Janie Wright and Gayle Taylor were the valedictorian and salutatorian of their class. Ronald Yarbrough of Paducah joined us in the freshman year, too. As the high school years passed—so did many of our group pass on to other places. Kirk Walters from Paducah joined as a sophomore, but no new student enrolled during our last two years.

So—the years have come and gone—and we are proud to claim the honor of having forty-three members to make this one of the largest senior classes in the history of Crowell High School.

Calendar of Events—1958-1959

The Senior Class of '59 officially came into being on Sept. 4 when the members met to organize. At this time, Kirk Walters was elected president; Bettie Linda Knox vice president; Roxiann Adkins, secretary; Duane Johnson, treasurer; Pat Prosser, reporter; Henry Black and James Welch, sponsors; and Mrs. Gerald Knox, Mrs. Virgil Johnson, Mrs. Percy Taylor and Mrs. Houston Adkins, room mothers. Later in the year, David Carpenter and Peggy Cates were chosen class favorites. The executive council immediately began outlining plans for the operation of the senior concession stand at all of the home football games.

Any elementary school pupil desiring to transfer out of his home district must also be transferred by the parent or guardian not later than such date.



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
