

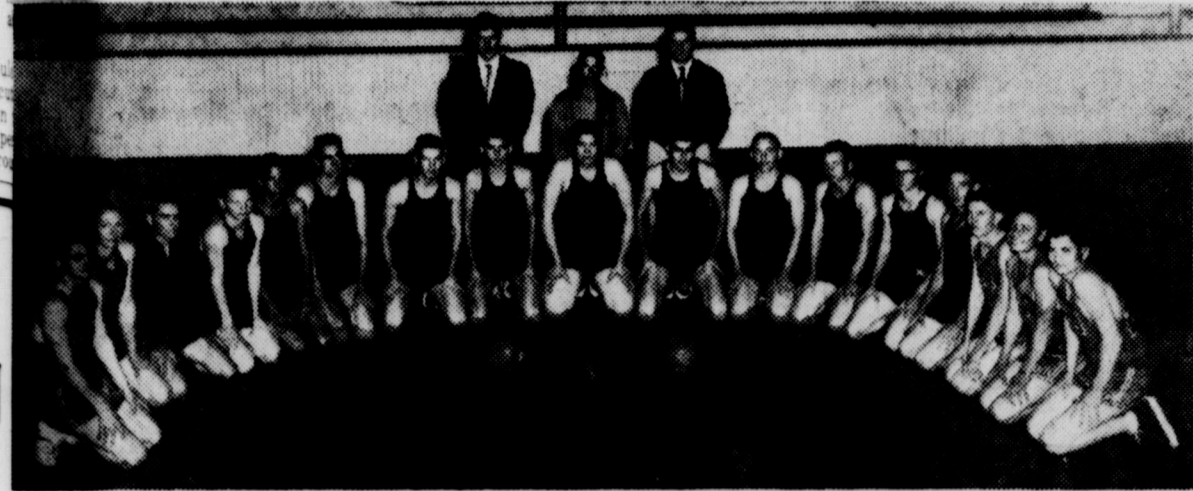

Crowell High School Basketball Team Concludes Fine Season with One Win and One Loss at Denton Tournament

The Crowell High School basketball team, coached by Thayne Amonett and Gordon Erwin, went to the finals in the regional tournament at Denton for the third time in four years last week end. The Wildcats defeated Troup, 56-55, Saturday morning to give them the championship of five districts. They lost to Plano 57-51 Saturday night.

The Crowell boys did not play to win in either game. They only 42 per cent of their shots in the Troup game, and 37 per cent in the final game with Plano. They had hit 57 per cent of their shots in the bi-district game with Springtown the week before. Troup had one of the best teams that Crowell has run up against this season, but their rough play forced three of their regulars out of the contest in the fourth quarter, which perhaps cost them the game.

News from the Congress

According to officials of the U. S. Geological Survey, the drought from which Texas is now suffering ranks among the eight major droughts of the last six hundred years. It has been in full swing in one part of the state or another for the last ten years, and during most of that period it has affected not only our farmers and stockmen, but the economy of the whole state. It is during periods of drought such as this that we most appreciate the importance of water conservation. The Weather Bureau reports that the average annual rainfall in Texas produces some 360,000,000 acre-feet of water within the state each year. Of this amount, only 9 per cent is direct runoff to streams, and only 1.5 per cent soaks in the ground. The remaining 89.5 per cent is consumed by plants, evaporation, or is just lost completely. How to trap, use and conserve more of this water is probably the number one question facing the state of Texas today.

There is an existence definite program now being carried out in the state by the Soil Conservation Service and the Corps of Engineers to develop methods, plans, and means for better water conservation. Both of these organizations

are very effective and efficient; however, their plans necessarily take time, and they are handicapped in many instances by lack of funds. There is undoubtedly a need for additional legislation in this field which will be considered and I hope favorably acted on during this session of Congress.

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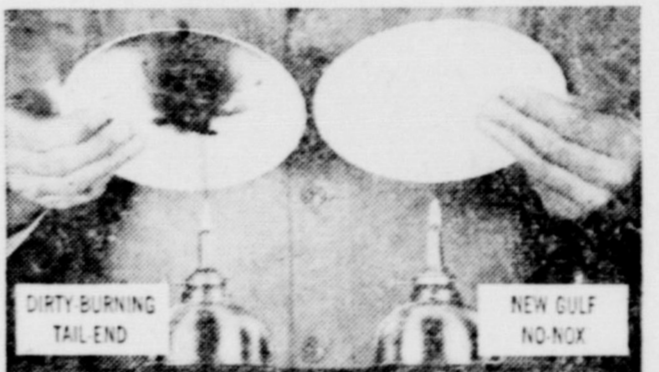

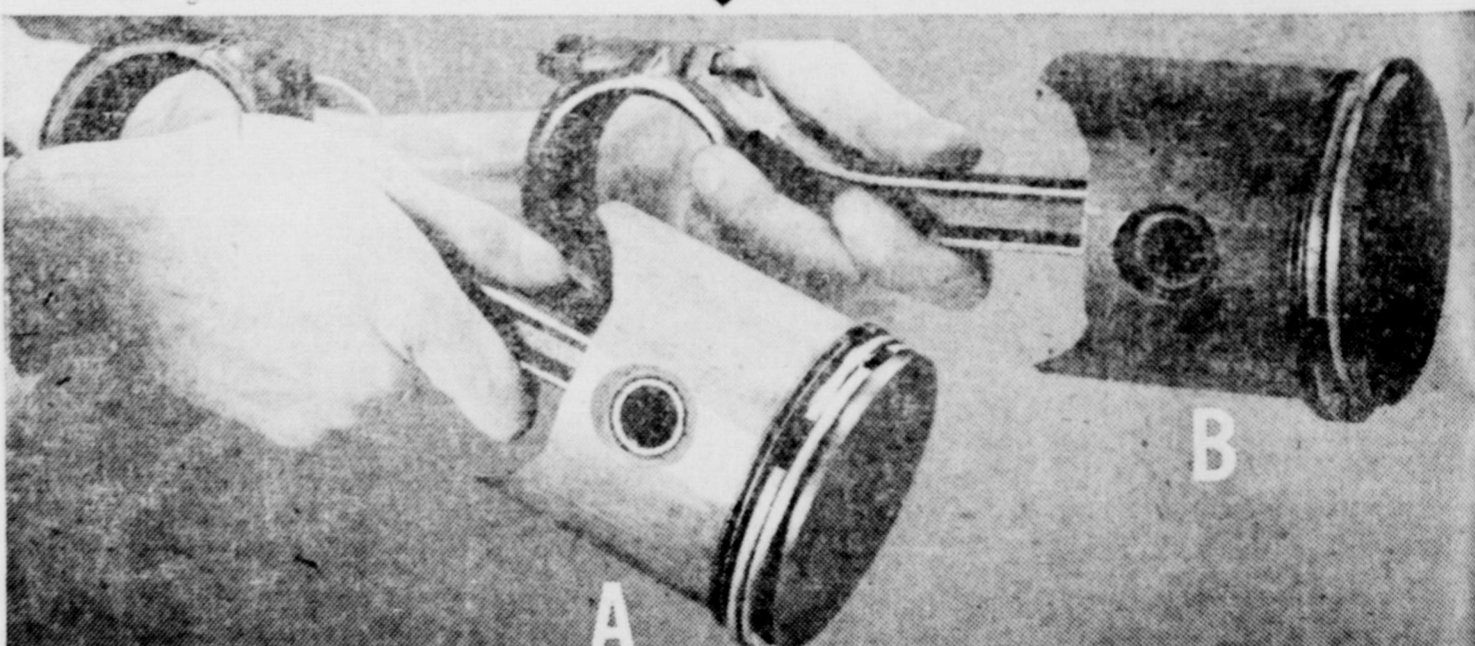

Each girl who took the test received a 24-page homemaking guide which will assist her in pursuing the career of homemaking.

The greatest source of assurance for the future of the American way of life is our Public School System, which enables our youngsters to become familiar with the magnificent history of men and events which has made our Republic the most powerful, respected and favored country the world has ever known.

The public schools provide the tools of knowledge which will equip our young men and women to become constructive and responsible citizens in this land of freedom.

We have a great responsibility to maintain and advance the ideals and standards which our people have come to expect of their public schools. We must keep pace with the growing needs of our schools by providing new classrooms, improved methods, and by encouraging loyal, able, qualified men and women to adopt teaching as a lifetime career.

Therefore I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of March 7-12, 1955 as **Public Schools Week** in Texas and urge every citizen to visit at least one public school during this period and to become personally acquainted with the programs and accomplishments of our educational system.

In official recognition whereof, I hereby affix my signature this 10th day of January, 1955.

ing a possible special session.
Theoretical date for such a session is May 11. On that date the legislators' pay for the regular session stops.

It has been suggested that Governor Shivers may have foreseen a bog-down in the regular session, and therefore has not pushed his special session program. During a special session, he would have full control of subject matter which may be introduced.

Tax Bill
Rep. Jerry Sadler of Pecosilla introduced the biggest tax bill of all.

Promising a lot of controversy, the bill would levy a one-cent per gallon processing tax on all gasoline and distillates produced in Texas. It would: Raise an estimated \$160,000,000 a year, repeal the present four-cent gas sales tax, and head off the administration's two-cent gasoline tax increase.

Sadler said its effect would be to reduce the price of gasoline to Texans three cents a gallon. Sixty per cent of the gasoline is exported, tax-free, he said.

Meantime, Rep. Charles Murphy explained he hadn't yet asked for committee hearings on the administration's two-cent gas tax bill, wanting sentiment to jell.

Some Fared Better
Passed by the House were bills outlawing sale of lewd and depraved comic books; permitting women to serve on juries; and regulating leasing for uranium and hard metals.

Amendments to the women's jury service bill narrowed considerably, the list of those who may be called to serve.

Furiously debated, the uranium bill was attacked as a "give away." Rep. Walling of Wichita Falls added two amendments. One will limit each lease to 80 acres to prevent one minor development from freezing exploration on large tracts. Another limits the primary term of leases to five years.

Interest was heightened by reports of a real uranium ore strike in Karnes County.

Rep. Maury Maverick's bill to prohibit cross filing of candidates by two political parties won a favorable report to the House.

Also favorably reported was Rep. Tom Joseph's bill to bring trust companies under the supervision of the State Banking Department.

Not Faring So Well
Stymied in a House committee was a bill to increase the filing fee of candidates for the Legislature to \$300.

Killed by a Senate committee was Sen. Crawford C. Martin's omnibus water conservation bill. It embraced nine subjects carried in the series of administration bills offered by Chairman D. B. Hardeman of the water resources committee.

Martin warned that unless the Senate reconsidered and kept his bill alive, all others would be subject to being knocked out on a constitutional point of order.

Grand Juries Take Over
Meanwhile, three Grand Juries have stepped in on the veterans' land investigations.

Travis County grand jury was quickest on the draw, with two felony indictments. Then the DeWitt Co. grand jury at Cuero fired a double barrel broadside of 195 indictments against six persons. DeWitt County Attorney Wiley Chatham started the whole land inquiry.

Travis County grand jury, with venue in every veterans' land transaction, had piles of ammunition and District Attorney Les Proctor had his thumb on the hammer.

Grand Juries in 10 other counties have had some contact with the question.

Work by the Senate investigating committee had dribbled down to a schedule of sessions only every other Thursday.

In intensive hearings each week end, the House committee approached the question of administration and operations in the Land Office and Veterans Land Board.

Attorney General Shepperd predicted there will be "hundreds of indictments," and indicated more civil suits were in prospect.

Education
UT President Logan Wilson told the legislative finance and appropriations committee the university must have more money, or face the problem of halting its growth or lowering standards.

Requested, for two years for its main establishment, was \$9,700,000. The governor's budget recommendation cut this by \$2,400,000.

University and college students were to gather in protest of a bill by Senator Otis Lock. Hearing was set for March 2. The bill would authorize a compulsory \$20 per semester student activities fee.
