FFA and 4-H Members to Vie for Quarter Horse

Some lucky FFA member or 4-H Club boy or girl in a seven-county area will receive a valuable quarter horse filly this year as a gift of the Greenbelt Quarter Horse Breeders Association. The registered yearling show filly will be given away in conjunction with the second annual association sale at 1 p. m. June 23 at the Vernon livestock sale barn.

One contestant will be selected from each of the seven participating counties—Foard, Wilbarger, Childress, Hardeman and Wichita in Texas, and Jackson and Tillman Counties in Oklahoma.

Any FFA member or 4-H Club member who lives in Foard County and has at least two more years of high school remaining as of Sept. 1, 1962, is eligible to compete. To enter, it will be necessary to write a story on "Why I Would Like to Own This Filly," plus a written list of facilities you have for keeping and caring for her and her off-spring. You will also need to turn in a signed statement from your parents pledging their support in this program. The above written story, list and signed statement will have to be turned in to the V. A. instructor or County Agent not later than May 11, 1962, in order for a committee of judges to select a contestant to represent Foard County.

CITY TO DRILL TWO MORE WATER WELLS

The Crowell School Board has selected Gordon Ervin to be in charge of the Municipal Swimming Pool again this year. It will open on Friday, June 1. As usual, it will remain open 90 days, which will make the closing date on August 29.

Season tickets will go on sale on Monday, May 14. The price will remain the same: \$10 for the large pool and \$4 for the small pool. The School Board wants to urge the patrons to support this cause, as the pool has operated with a financial loss for the last few years.

The pool is being cleaned up and will be re-painted next week. It is not absolutely necessary that the pool be painted each year, but it helps to keep it more sanitary to do so. New gravel is being placed in the filtering troughs.

Added Expense Forces Increase in Water Rates

Plans have been completed for the drilling of two additional water wells for the City of Crowell. These will be drilled the first part of May, according to Mayor Henry Black. These additional wells have been made necessary because of the decline in the production of the existing wells. Other improvements include the placing of clamps on the joints of the water line because of leaks. These clamps cost about \$11.00 each. Another expenditure is a \$2,000.00 annual payment for water rights which were purchased last year.

This expenditure has made it necessary for the City to make a slight increase in the water rates. This increase will be noted on the June 1 water statement. An additional fifty cents charge per meter has been added, which will place the minimum at 4,000 gallons for \$3.00. At this rate, the citizens of Crowell will still receive a thousand more gallons on the minimum rate than do the people of Paducah. The next thousand gallons will be charged at the rate of 60 cents per thousand gallons; the next ten thousand will be charged at the rate of 50 cents per thousand and all additional water will be charged at 40 cents per thousand. This is only a ten cent increase per thousand. An additional charge of 50 cents per meter has been placed on all meters outside of the city limits, for these meters have not borne any of the expense incurred in procuring an additional water supply.

'62 Savings Bonds Sales in County Total \$51,298.00

Savings Bonds sales for the first three months of 1962 in Foard County totaled \$51,298. Of this amount, \$16,298 were purchased in March. The three-month total represents 46.6 per cent of the county goal of \$110,000.

Texas purchased \$41,512,602 E and H bonds during the first quarter of the year and March sales were \$17,031,657.

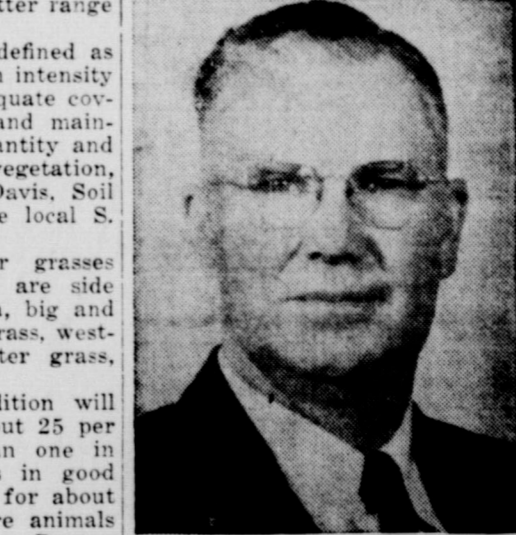
The show will be open to the public from 3 to 6 in the afternoon.



Two Minutes With the Bible

"The Most Important Hour of History"

History records many great and significant events, but none nearly so significant as the crucifixion of Christ on the cross of Calvary. Referring to the time, then still future, when this should take place, our Lord spoke again and again of "the hour," "that hour" and "My hour," and so does the sacred record.

When His enemies would have stoned Him at the Feast of Tabernacles, the record states merely: "they sought to take Him; but no man laid hands on Him, because His hour had not yet come" (John 7:30). Finally, when that dread time did arrive, we read:

"And when the hour was come, He sat down, and the twelve apostles with Him" (Luke 22:14).

"And Jesus answered them, saying, The hour is come that the Son of man should be glorified."

"Verily, verily, I say unto you, Except a grain of wheat into the ground and die, it abideth alone; but if it die, it bringeth forth much fruit" (John 12:23, 24).

"Now is My soul troubled; and what shall I say: Father save Me from this hour? But for this cause came I unto this hour" (John 12:27).

"Now before the Feast of the Passover, when Jesus knew that His hour had come . . . having loved His own which were in the world, He loved them unto the end" (John 13:1).

Finally, in His great High-priestly prayer, uttered in the very shadow of the cross, He "lifted up His eyes to heaven, and said, Father, the hour is come . . ." (John 17:1).

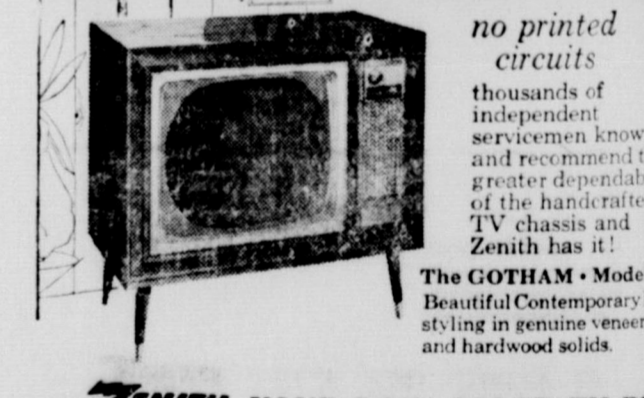

Before Texas citizens go to the polls on May 5 to vote YES or NO on pari-mutuel gambling in our state, it might be well to consider a cross-section of viewpoints expressed by responsible leaders in states that already have so-called legalized gambling at race tracks.

Former Governor Leroy Collins of Florida stated: "Gambling, legal or illegal, is insidious. It kills more business than it generates. Florida would be better off if it had no Pari-mutuel betting. Even if gambling is 'needed' to attract some customers, I say let other places have these customers. They bring more problems than prosperity."

Thomas E. Murphy, of the Hartford Courant, America's oldest newspaper, wrote after a study of pari-mutuel gambling in the neighboring state of Rhode Island, "When you get the whole story from social agencies, banks, loan companies and police officials, this is gold that does not glisten. The other side of the pari-mutuel coin is deeply engraved with personal tragedies, delinquencies, embezzlements and suicides. Yet only 76,000 out of a total of 280,000 qualified voters bother to vote on this question at all."

Vergel A. Peterson, director of the Chicago Crime Commission, says: "Gambling drains the salaries, savings and investments of a community into a business enterprise that serves no human need. Those who benefit from gambling profits are almost without exception members of the underworld who invariably control the gambling business."

Senator Alexander Wiley of Wisconsin comments: "The idea that legalized gambling will be a revenue-raiser is an illusion. Every dollar raised from such sources means five dollars spent in higher police costs, higher court costs, higher penitentiary costs, and higher relief costs."

But aren't our race track neighbors in Arkansas, New Mexico and Louisiana raking in millions of dollars that should stay in Texas? The facts hardly indicate this.

If Hot Springs gambling is creating new jobs, why did the city lose population between 1950 and 1960? If New Mexico is supporting its government on race track gambling, how did it do it on the \$37,211.00 "tax take" from the \$7,400,000.00 of race track revenue wagered in a 46-day meet in the 1959 season? If New Orleans prospers because of race track gambling, why is its growth of population and industry lagging far behind that of any major Texas city, all of which now prosper WITHOUT pari-mutuel gambling.

The true facts of gambling can be summed up in the four words of Damon Runyon: "Horse players die broke."

12,900 Hospital Beds Made Available to Texas Hospitals

Over 12,000 general hospital beds, 550 beds for mental patients, and 350 nursing home beds have been made available to ailing Texans by virtue of a financial partnership in which the state has participated since 1947.

The opening of a cerebral palsy treatment center in Houston in mid-1961 brought to nearly 200 the number of projects completed in Texas under the Hill-Burton hospital and medical facilities survey and construction program.

Established by the Hill-Burton Act of 1947, the program is a unified local-state-federal effort to provide financial assistance to areas with the greatest need for supplementary hospital and medi-

cal facilities. Guided by the 9-member State Board of Health, the program is administered in Texas by the Division of Hospital Services at the State Department of Health, under plans recommended by the State Advisory Hospital Council.

Fund grants up to 50 per cent of total construction costs for general, mental, tuberculosis and chronic disease hospitals, public health centers, diagnostic and treatment facilities, rehabilitation units, and nursing homes may be made under the program. The balance of construction costs must be provided locally.

To be eligible for Hill-Burton assistance, a facility must fulfill a community need and must be sponsored by a private nonprofit organization, or by a city, county, state or other political subdivision. Projects may consist of completely new buildings or the remodeling or enlarging of existing facilities.

Texas began its participation in the program with the construction of the Demmitt Memorial Hos-

pital in Carrizo Springs, a 250-bed hospital which opened Sept. 1949.

Since then, construction of 162 hospitals with the assistance of Hill-Burton fund grants.

In addition to these 162 projects, nine rehabilitation centers, 12 public health centers, and 12 diagnostic and treatment centers have been put into operation.

The program has also provided financial assistance toward purchase of special equipment, five laboratories and hospital improvement projects.

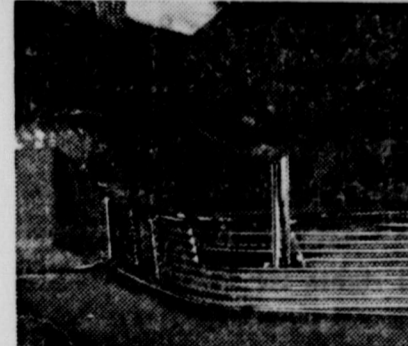

Animated picture books were a direct result of that discovery and they are said to have prompted the experiments of Thomas Edison and other scientists in recording motion on film. So the ponies should get a good share of the credit for helping to discover the motion picture industry.—Stokes.
