

Two Indians Help Start Thanksgiving Observance

Two Indians with an English account deserve much of the credit for the first Thanksgiving in America. They taught the Plymouth colonists how to make a home in the New World and helped them establish a peace that lasted for more than 50 years. The first to approach the colonists, reports World Book Encyclopedia, was Samoset, a chief of the Pemaquid Indians. He walked into the colony one day in March, 1621, and unsettled the settlers by addressing them in English. Samoset, it turned out, had earlier met some English fishermen along the coast of Maine and learned some of the language from them. Two weeks later Samoset dropped in with his friend Squanto, a well-traveled brave of the Pawtuxet tribe. Squanto had been to England twice, once after having been kidnapped and sold as a slave in Spain by an English sea captain. He had returned to America in 1619. Samoset introduced the colonists to Massasoit, chief of the Plymouth area. With Squanto acting as interpreter, the chief and the Pilgrims concluded a treaty of friendship that lasted until Massasoit died in 1661. Meanwhile Squanto went to live with the colonists, teaching them how to plant corn, pumpkins and beans and showing them where to fish. That year the Pilgrims had a bountiful harvest and Governor William Bradford declared the celebration that became the first Thanksgiving.

Social Security Change Explained

Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls Social Security district office, announced this week that the Social Security Administration now considers both the activities of an agent for a farm landlord and the activities of the landowner in deciding whether the owner's farm rental income is covered by the social security law.

In making the announcement, Mr. Tate stated that previously only the activities of the farm landlord counted in deciding whether the wage earner materially participated on his farm. Tate went on to emphasize that under this more liberal rule, many more farm owners may now be eligible for social security protection.

"As a practical matter," he said, "this means that some farm owners who were previously found ineligible for social security may now qualify." He gave for example, a farm owner who lives in town and under an arrangement with the tenant has an agent supervising the work of the tenant. The agent makes all the important decisions affecting the production of the crop. Previously, the farm owner could not receive social security credits for his share of the earnings from the farm. Now through the agent, he materially participates in the farm activities and can receive social security credits.

Mr. Tate stressed that farm landlords whose claim for benefits has been denied because the agent, rather than the owner was supervising the tenant, should get in touch with the social security office. He further added that anyone who has questions concerning his coverage under this new provision should also contact the office.

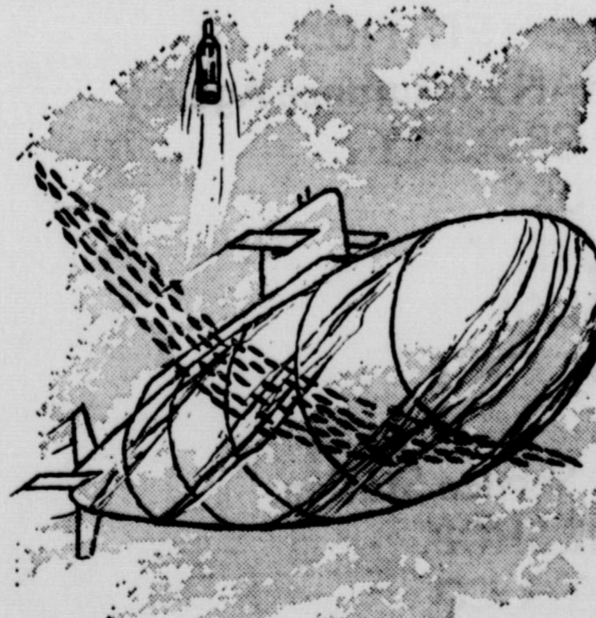

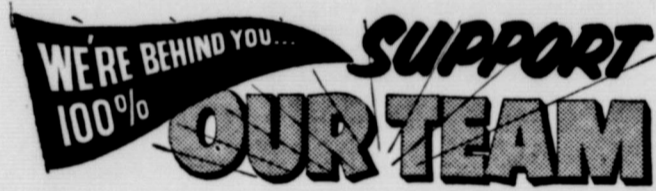
