During the business session the treasure's report was read, stating that the club had given fifteen dol lars to the knitting society.





ALLIED TROOPS HOLD

DECISIVE ASCENDANCY Washington, Oct. 7 .- Decisive ascendancy for the allies in the supreme test of battle strength now taking place on the bloody fields of Flanders is claimed by Secretary Baker in the weekly review of war operations issued tonight by the War Department.

While it may be premature to as sert that the British war machine has forced a decision over the Germans, Mr. Baker says the victories of the last fortnight, threatening the German submarine bases on the Belgian coast, are conclusive indications of the allies' superiority. With favorable weather, he thinks, these victories will be repeated and extended.

The review, which is for the week ended last night, makes no reference to the American forces in France or to the great preparations for war going forward at home.

"The attention of the world," says, "is focused on the titanic struggle now going on in Flanders. The battle raging there is proving an engagement of wholly unprecedented scope and potentialities.

"At the beginning of the week, owing to bad weather, the Germans were able to launch counter-attacks against the positions recently gained by the British. Notwithstanding the fact that the Germans made use of smoke screens, liquid fire and brought into action an imposing array of artillery in their attack against the advanced British lines between the Tower Hamlets and Polygon Wood, as well as along the Menin road, their efforts

"It is significant, on the other hand, that while the British were sustaining the shock of German assaults successfully, they were able to bring sufficient fresh troops in order to launch another offensive action on an even !! larger scale than the preceding one, in the face of the enemy's onslaught.

"Slowly, but therefore the more irresistibly, the allied drive at the heart of the German line in the west is sweeping onward.

"It has been characteristic of the campaign in Flanders hitherto that neither beliggerent has attained what may be called a decisive success.

"The Germans have massed their greatest war strength along this bat-

To attack them at their strongest point of resistance is sound strategy. "The defeats inflicted upon them during the last fortnight are conclusive indications of allied superiorty. In the light of past experience, it may be premature to assert that the British have succeeded in forcing a decision, but it may be stated with emphahas such vigor, such energy and con-

certed speed of action been displayed. "The full value of these operations become untenable to the enemy.

"Two immediate contributing factors to the ascendancy of the allies are air control and shell supply.

"The British are thus able to report that since July 31 last they have not lost a single gun, while they have captured 332 field and heavy guns and taken 51,435 prisoners. 

Floating Drydocks.

Our largest floating dock is the Dewey, at the Olongapo naval station, in the Philippine Islands. Floating drydocks are so arranged as to lift a big battle ship bodily from the water. When it is desired to dock a vessel the floating dock is sunk by admitting water to it, and the ship is floated over it. When the ship is in the proper place over the dock the water is pumped out, and it rises, lifting the ship with it. When it is desired to refloat the ship the dock is sunk again by admitting water, and the ship is hauled off. There are side walls to the dock which remain partly above water. In these are located the pumping machinery, and on them the docking gangs work. The Dewey is in three sections, of which the two small end sections lift the large central section and are themselves lifted by it.

WAR REVIEW

The British were again very active and successful during the past week. After a bombardment on a ten or twelve-mile sector which, for intensity and depth has not heretofore been exceeded on any front, the English and Australian infantry were hurled forward on a line of eight miles, and by evening of the first day had penetrated the German trench system to a depth of a mile at the apex of the wedge, and consolidated the gain. In addition to this considerable capture of ground, abuot 4,500 German prisoners were taken, and a number of high vantage points, long oppressive to the British on lower ground, definitely wrested from the enemy. This is the third, and perhaps most considerable victory the British have won on what is called the Ypres front within the last four weeks. The entente military commentators hail these operations and successes as un-

periority of the British over the Ger- ducers. Last year it caused to be mans in numbers, armament and morale. The Teuton counter-attacks are by no means as vigorous and selfconfident as formerly, largely because it does not require much experience to convince a soldier that when he is out-gunned he is out-fought. The new concrete defenses, called "pill boxes" by the British, were found as easy to demolish with artillery as the trenches were, and the willingness of the dazed defenders of the little forts to surrender is indicative of the lowered morale behind them. This is not a reflection upon German courage, but is an unavoidable, perhaps unconscious, concession on their part that levice can withstand the terriffic ef the week was comparatively quiet The Italians made some local improvements along their front, and the French withstood heavy attacks by the Crown Prince, who is still wasting men without getting anywhere.
