Brief Bits of News From Here and There

The United States imports each year 84,000,000 pounds of castor oil. Production of castor oil plants is being promoted in 32 states by the Agricultural Chemical Association.

It is believed if castor oil can be produced in this country the price would be lowered to a point where the annual production could be increased to 400,000,000 pounds.

The greatest difficulty now lies in the harvesting of the seeds from which the oil is pressed. The seed pods when they ripen burst, scattering the seed on the ground.

An effort is being made to produce a plant whose seed pods will not burst and scatter.

The average person takes fifteen breaths per minute.

A light year is the distance that light will travel in one year traveling at the rate of 186,000 miles a second.

In a light year a beam of light will travel 6,000,000,000,000 miles. The North star or pole star is nineteen light years distance from the earth.

In other words if the light of the North star should be extinguished tonight it would not be known on the earth until nineteen years later.

The temperature of an automobile tire traveling at the rate of 50 to 60 miles an hour frequently reaches 220 degrees Fahrenheit.

Last year the automobile tire industry bought 283,750,000 pounds of cotton for use in manufacturing automobile tires.

A process has now been perfected whereby rayon is used in tires instead of cotton. If the practice becomes general it will result in a great loss of outlet to the cotton farmers.

It is estimated that if every person in the United States ate one more slice of bread each day, wheat consumption would be increased 50,000,000 bushels annually.

**BLOW YOUR HORN**

## Continental Oil Co. Open Oil Deposits Under Bed of River

Ponca City, Okla., Aug. 9.—Oil deposits directly underneath the bed of the Mississippi River were successfully opened today when Continental Oil Company brought in a flow estimated at 204 barrels a day in St. James Parish near Vachele, Louisiana, through the first well ever drilled inside the river levee.

The discovery well, known as Realty Operators No. 1, is located on the eastern side of the river about 55 miles northwest of New Orleans at a point where the bottom ground or "batture" between river and levee is about 1,600 feet wide. Protection from possible flooding of the well site required the building of a separate circular levee 10,000 feet in diameter and 14 feet high, inside the main levee.

Continental officials revealed that 40 foot pilings had to be sunk in the soil to support the drilling rig and that equipment was brought over on a specially constructed plank road. Due to the nature of the project, the company took unusual precautions in maintaining secrecy during drilling and practically nothing was known about the type of formations that were encountered until today's announcement that the well had begun to produce.

Ordinarily, the test samples of soil from the drill hole are opened on the derrick floor in eight of the crew and any by-stander who may pass their opinion.

In Realty Operators No. 1, Continental took test samples every 25 feet after they reached a depth of 2,500 feet but used a locked core barrel which was taken directly from the well and pushed through an opening in the wall of the field laboratory to be opened in private by the geologists charged with checking the progress of the well.

The well was reported producing a 43.2 gravity crude through tubing perforated from 6,258 to 6,364 feet, with a tubing pressure of 2,350 pounds. The well was drilled to a total depth of 7,499 feet, but plugged back to 6,364 feet to a sand laid down in the Miocene age. The well is also producing 4,131,000 cubic feet of gas daily. The new field is known as the Hester Dome area, where Continental and Shell have about 10,000 acres under lease.

## People of Wichita Expected to Turn Down WPA Grant

Wichita Falls, Tex., Aug. 10.—(Special)—As is true in San Antonio where officials recently turned down a PWA grant for a municipal power plant, the same is expected to happen here on Aug. 29 when the city council acts upon a recommendation by a special citizens' committee recommending that no election be called on the proposal.

The committee submitted a number of reasons why it would be inadvisable for the city of Wichita Falls to build a municipal electric light plant. The committee had been asked to make the question for a Public Works Administration loan and grant of approximately \$1,750,000 for construction of a municipal light plant and water system improvements be submitted to a vote of the people.

Some of the reasons given for opposing the election are:

The federal grant is based on the showing of a bona fide offer to purchase the existing light plant which must be refused by the utility company. This offer has not been made and could not be done until a survey of the existing plant was made.

It would cost the city large sums of money to hire experts to conduct the valuation survey.

If the utility plant accepted the offer, taxpayers would have to pass a bond issue for purchase of the plant which would involve large annual payments for interest and sinking fund.

If the city accepts the present grant and purchases the plant it would force the city into debt by a million or two million dollars, would force a raise in taxes, doing away with the homestead exemption law or seeking new sources of revenue.

Repairs to and additions to the water system, which will increase the indebtedness by \$800,000, are more vital.

Present plant has a franchise here until 1951 and competition from a city plant would not be practical or produce lower rates or more revenue.

Federal grant would authorize payment of water plant revenue to pay for the light plant which would tie up city revenues from this source.

People of Wichita Falls have twice voted down like propositions.

## Health Department Warns Consumers of "Uncertified Oysters"

Austin.—"Beware of uncertified oysters," warns Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. In Texas each grocery of oysters is furnished a certificate from the State Health Department covering the oyster beds he uses, provided surveys of such areas have shown them to be free from pollution and the shucking houses are sanitary. A shipping number is granted simultaneously with the certificate, and this number must accompany all shipments of oysters to show their source.

Each operator of a shucking house where oysters are opened must have a certificate testifying that his shop has been found sanitary and his employees have been examined and found free of all communicable diseases, particularly typhoid fever. These certificates are issued annually. The Federal government co-operates with the states by exercising supervision over methods used and issues lists of certified shippers in all parts of the country where oysters are produced.

The safest oysters in Texas are the ones accompanied by a certificate from the State Health Department. The oyster has much to commend it as a food; protein of good quality, a rich source of iron and copper (important as a protective against anemia), a liberal source of iodine essential to the proper functioning of the thyroid gland and a fair amount of vitamins.

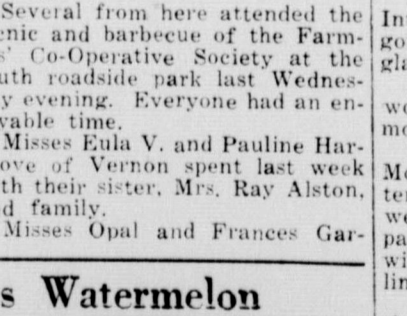

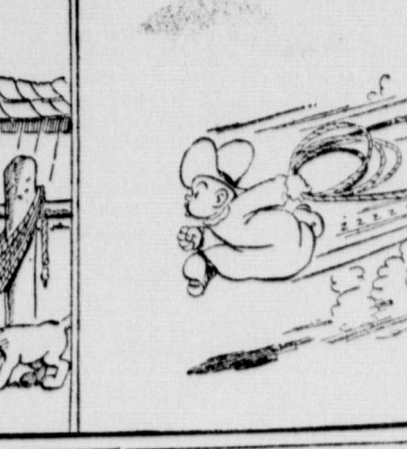

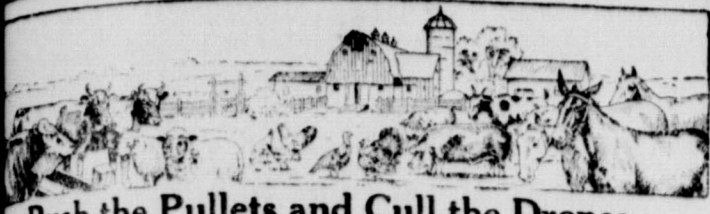

Explanations on 1938 Soil Conservation Program

1939 Wheat Program The following is a summary of how the 1939 wheat program will be handled and how it is going to work. Wheat allotments will be sent to farmers as soon as they arrive from College Station, just as they were for 1938 cotton. This allotment will be in terms of acres, and it will be final as far as the county office is concerned. Later in the year, cotton and general allotments will be sent to farmers, and also soil conserving acreages for the farm.

Every cotton farmer in Foard County will receive the marketing quota for cotton for 1939. If any complaints are to be made about the poundage and acreage, it will have to be made within 15 days after the quota is sent to the farmers. After that date, no adjustments can be made.

Wheat Loan Wheat loans can now be made in the AAA office, and if you are interested in the loans, you may come in and see if you are eligible for such loan, and also to find out how much loan can be made. Necessary forms have just arrived from the state office and loans can now be made immediately.

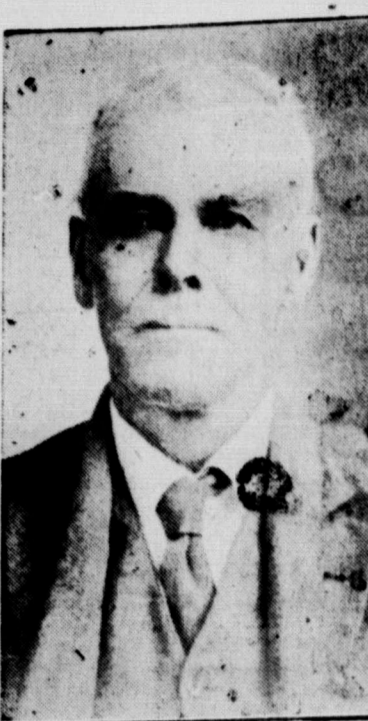
