1,700 TEACHERS

San Antonio, Jan. 1 .- Seeking to extend educational privileges to 100,000 adults in Texas, Works Progress Administration officials today had enrolled 1,700 teachers from the Texas Relief Commission program which was closed December 26.

"We intend to employ 2,500 teachers on the WPA emergency education program and are hope-ful that all sponsors will have all teacher applicants registered with the National Re-employment Service as quickly as possible," clared A. A. (Pat) Bullock, state

director of the education project. Previously operated by the Texas Relief Commission, the Texas education program gave employment to 2,000 teachers and extended educational advantages to 84,000 persons, it was estimated. Under WPA the project will be financed by grants of \$1,865,650 for general adult education and \$94,430 for nursery school proj-

In addition to the extending of free school facilities to thousands of Texans, this project is proposed for the purpose of providing work for teachers and persons compet-ent to teach who were receiving relief during May, 1935, and those certified for relief subsequent to that time and whose eligibility has not been cancelled by the Texas Relief Commission. Unemployed needy teachers who were on relief rolls at any time between May 1 and November 1 may be given jobs on the program if all available eligible relief teachers have been employed.
