Warning Issued by City Officials That Traffic Laws Will Be Enforced

Inconvenience and Danger Caused By Local Conditions

A warning signed by three city eace officers, W. O. McDaniel, marshal; P. D. Moseley, assistant mar-shal; Wesley Lovelady, nightwatch-man, and C. T. Schlagal, mayor, appears elsewhere in this issue of The News. It calls attention to the fact that parking in the center of the street, double parking and traffic violations in general have reached such a point in Crowell that human life is endangered and the convenience of the public in general is seriously hampered and that as a result of these conditions everything possible is going to be done to appre hend violators of traffic laws, regardless of who they are.

In issuing this warning the local officers state that several accidents have resulted recently from traffic violations and that serious personal injury and heavy property damage have been narrowly averted in a

number of instances.
"We are issuing this warning in the interest of you, your family and the community in general and if you are apprehended-just rememberwe have done our best to give you fair warning and will only be doing our duty in enforcing traffic laws," is a statement in one portion of the
