## Botulism Food Poison Warning Is Given by Demonstration Agent

The following comment on botulism food poisoning has been prepared by Miss Dosca Hale, home demonstration agent:

Botulism is one of the most deadly poisons known. Up until the last year or two this food poisoning was unheard of in Texas. There has unheard of in Texas. There has been cases of it in California and some of the other states.

Botulism is altogether different to ptomaine poisoning. Many have the idea that ptomaine poisoning comes from eating food that has stood in tin vessels. This is not necessarily true. One may get ptomaine from Although an unusually good sea- food that has been left in a tin ves-son has been provided for crops, sel, but it is also possible to get it from food that has been left in glass, earthenware, enamel, aluminum or other vessels. The ptomaine does not come from the vessel but is an organism that may get into food by careless methods of handling or preserving foods. It is possible to get a tin poisoning from tin vessels but this is not a common occurrence, and should not be confused wth ptomaine

Botulism is sometimes found in canned goods that have not been properly sterilized or sealed. But it is not confined to canned foods. It may be on vegetables that grow near the ground and a more often found on vegetables that have rough found on vegetables that have rough surface or fuzz on them like beans, peas, etc. The poisoning is more often found in non-starchy foods and in proteins such as meats, peas, and beans. When non-acid foods of this kind are opened they should never be tasted, even if there is no doubt as to thehir wholesomeness. All non-acid foods should be boiled in the presence of air or in an open vessel for twenty minutes. This will remove the danger if the food has a touch of botulism, or other food poisoning. One can't tell by looking at the food whether or not it has the poisoning in it.

#### PROPHETS

A man who was an officer in France told me this story, which is interesting and may be true.

He said that on November 10, 1918, a friend of his went into our headquarters and stopped beside the desk of an officer who was engaged in statistical work. The officer had been so busy with his charts and figures that he had hardly left his office for days.

The visitor said to him: "Well, I guess it's about all over."

"What do you mean?" asked the statistician.

"Why, the armistice will be declared tomorrow." "Nonsense," the statistician exclaimed. "The war is going on for another five years." Whereupon he drew out his graphs and his charts and proceeded to prove it.

Here's another story, told me by a banker.

In November, 1930, the ten leading economists of the United States held a secret conclave and took a ballot on how long the busiess depression would last.

One of them said it would be over in six months.

Four said it would last from one to three years. The other fiv esaid it would last from three to five years.

"If they are right, the outlook is pretty gloomy, isn't it?"

I said it certainly was. "There is just one joker in the story as I told it," he added. "That meeting was not held in November, 1930. It was held in November, 1920. And that depression came to a close, as we now know, in August, 1921."

Looking back over history, we can see that prophecy has always been a dangerous business. But as between the optimistic prophets and the pessimistic the balance is in favor of the optimists.

Old Mother Shipton, in the early 1500's, prophesied that "iron upon the sea would float as easily as a wooden boat." She foretold the airplane, the submarine, and the telephone. She was suspected then of being erazy, but she does not look so crazy now.

John Law, of Mississippi Bubble fame, sold shares in his vast concessions on this continent. Speculation ran them up to wild prices, and the ensuing panic ruined thousands. But those concessions represented the richest part of the United Sattes. Even at their highest prices they would be cheap today.

I do not intend to join the ill-fated company of prophets. I memely record my general agreement with the late P. T. Barnum,







Especially are we grateful to the advertisers, for they have made the existence of this publication possible. Without their loyal support, there could be no local newspaper.


To our subscribers—our correspondents—and to all who have aided and encouraged us in any manner-we are at a loss to express to you our true appreciation.
