school administrative office.

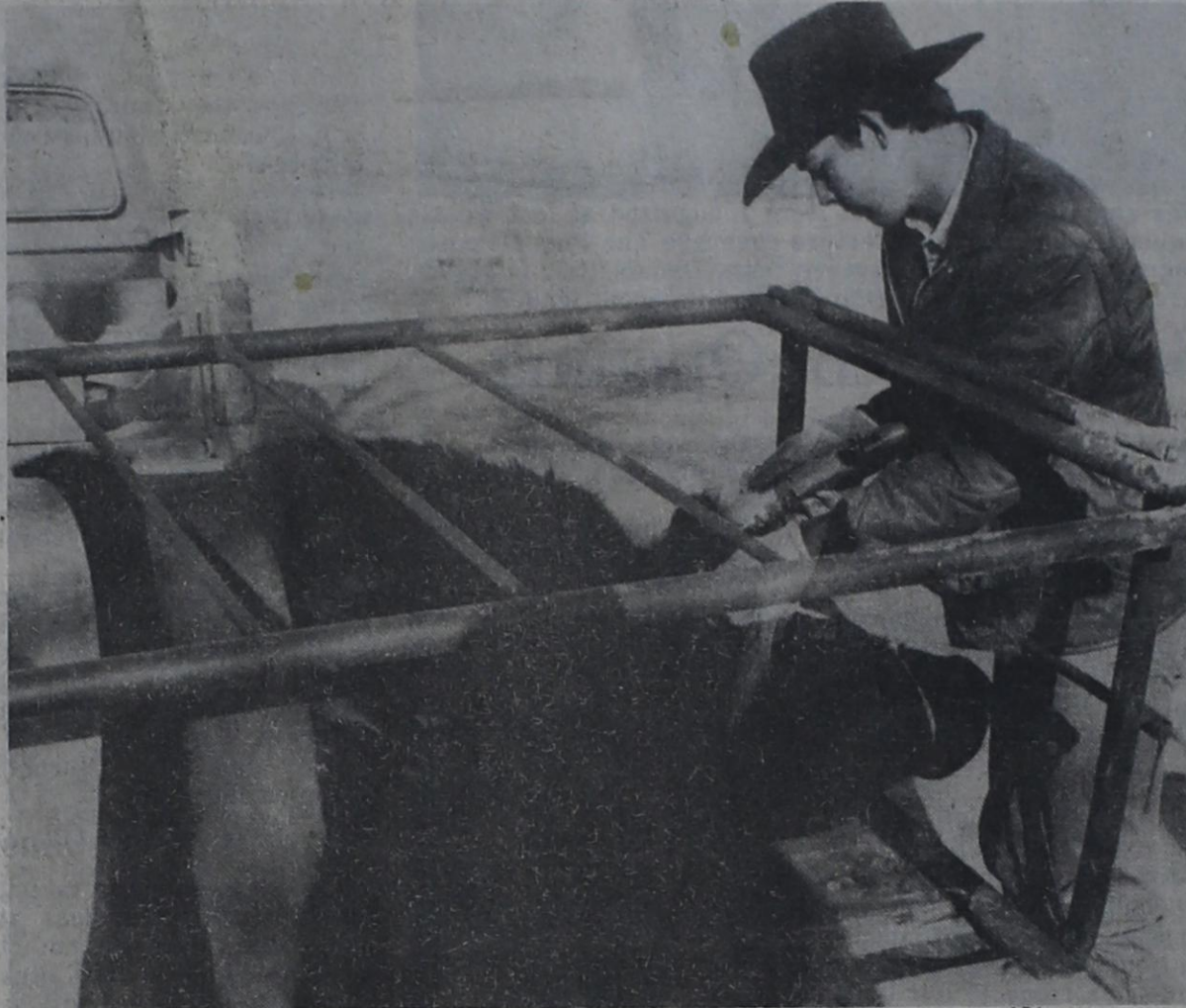
At the meeting last week, the board heard a report from architect Dwayne McQueen concerning renovation of the football stadium.

Garza County Family Histories Needed for Book

A history of the Grassburr Community along with that of the Post Art Guild have been received already for the new 1985 Garza County History.

Meanwhile, dozens of families in Garza County, are already in the process of writing their histories for the book and several have been received from out of state. There is no charge for biographical-historical articles up to 500 words in length.

Those desiring to send in family biographies may do so by mailing them to Garza County History, 604 West

Main, Post, Texas 79356. Anyone desiring to serve on the committee may also volunteer.

During the next few weeks local community meetings will be set up to assure that all areas of the county are included in the history. One such meeting was held recently in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Barney Jones at which some twenty people were in attendance and much enthusiasm was evidenced.

Your story will be more interesting told in your own words but if you prefer you may tell it to an interviewer on tape and it will be typed

up for the book.

Of primary importance is the family life and experience in Garza County, but earlier family origins may be included as well as any experiences lived in other places. An example of an opening paragraph follows:

"The Smith family came from Germany in 1820. Samuel Smith, born in 1796, came to New Jersey and later settled in Indiana in 1836, near Decatur, where he died in 1856. He married Elizabeth Jones of Monmouth in 1837. They had three sons: John, George and James; two daughters, Jane and Elizabeth. This family descended from George, born July 6, 1834, and died Nov. 19, 1910."

Following this opening paragraph each generation of George's family would be included with their marriages, children, their jobs, moves, accomplishments, and interesting experiences. If John or James, Jane, or Elizabeth's descendants live in or have lived in the county, they would write separate stories about their line. Each of these stories may be up to 500 words with a small charge for anything over that amount.

New families in the area are urged to participate, since their history will be important to the community as years go by, and their grandchildren will be just as pleased to find their roots in years to come.

So — get your family names, dates and places

together now, and write an interesting account of your local experiences — what you remember from businesses, church activities, changes, work, civic experiences, the army, etc. Then, as the time approaches for sending in your history, you will be ready.

The system, which will cost \$78.00 for initial charges, will mean that the worker can be contacted, and a more immediate response made, whether that person is in Garza County, Lynn County, or even Lubbock.

The Department of Hu-

man Resources has agreed to fund the monthly cost of the system, but the local board is soliciting funds to pay the initial \$78.00 fees.

Letter to the Editor

The Post Economic Development Corporation which we organized in September to acquire and manage the Postex Mill and other Burlington Industries property in Garza County is a non-profit charitable, scientific and educational or-

ganization.

Some fifty individuals subscribed and donated \$500 or more each to become charter members of PEDC.

Following the incorporation and obtaining the Internal Revenue Service approval in September, the PEDC has acquired about five million dollars worth of property, including the vacant cotton mill, 23 residences and some miscellaneous machinery and equipment.

The Close City Extension Homemaker's Club met Tuesday, January 22, to study the effects of stress. Those attending, Oreta Bevers, Virginia Custer, Inez Ritchie, Maxine Lewis, Jewell White, Verna Roberts, Cleo Sappington, Hooter Terry, and Faye Payton learned there are five basic categories of stress symptoms. These categories include:

Physical — headaches, fatigue, insomnia, reoccurring colds, weight change and skin rash.

Emotional — crying spells, depression, mood "swings", anxiety, frustration.

Spiritual — martyrdom, unforgiving, loss of direction, emptiness.

Mental — forgetfulness, boredom, dull senses, negative attitude, poor concentration, and low productivity.

Relational — isolation, loneliness, nagging, fewer contacts with friends, resentments, intolerance of others.

To overcome stress, there are a variety of techniques one may use including: say "no" more often, take time for yourself, take time to schedule "fun" times with

Speaking of stress! It's time to organize your financial information for your annual income tax report to the IRA! Two items of interest concerning new tax law changes:

Qualifying for Long-Term Capital Gains

Changes in the tax law mean you can now sell an investment after holding it just six months and still qualify for the low, long-term capital gains tax. Before July 1984, you had to keep your stock at least a year before you could benefit from the long-term capital gains tax. Speculators will gain the most from this tax change.

Tax Laws on Home Computers

Tax laws regarding home computers have tightened up. Any computer you buy must now be used more than half the time for business use in order for you to take a tax deduction. Deductions can be made if the computer is used in your own business or if an employer requires you to have a computer to do your job. Managing personal investments won't qualify as business use. The new rules apply to computers put into service after June 18, 1984.

Time for a Financial Contingency Day

January is a good month to hold a "financial contingency day." On that day, you review all household financial matters, update needed information and set goals for the coming year. The main reason for doing this is to provide the financial information that would be needed if a family death, accident, or crisis situation occurred during the coming year.

Use this check-list in planning the agenda items for your contingency day meeting:

1. Review and revise net worth statement.
2. Establish financial goals for the coming year.
3. Revise the household budget to reflect new financial goals and or changes in

4. Check wills to see that they are up to date. This means reviewing how assets and property should be handled in case of a family member's death.

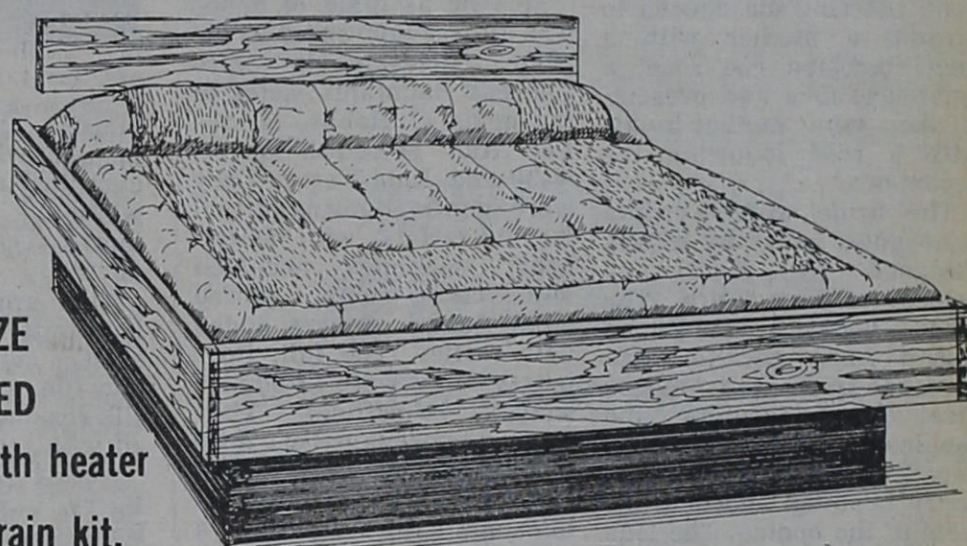
5. Prepare or review a letter of last instruction. This letter informs survivors of matters needing immediate attention. It should also describe what funeral plans have been made.

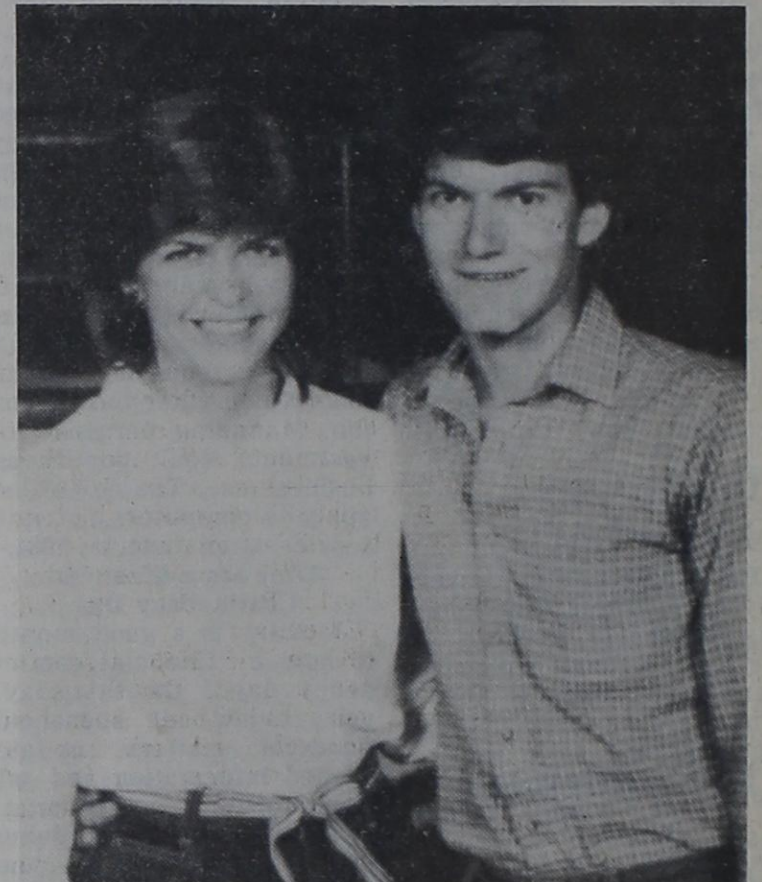

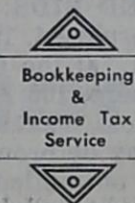

First century Palestinian farming consisted of rather basic steps. The rocky and often hilly fields lined the roads which the Master teacher walked and taught. With such a convenient open classroom Jesus illustrated the Kingdom of God through parable.

Their simplified agriculture allowed the casting of seed upon the ground prior to plowing. Seed often was scattered intentionally but unknowingly on less than ideal places. Limestone laid thinly concealed by the topsoil. After sowing the surface was then tilled in that early custom. Germination of the hand thrown seed would soon follow.

From this common malady of choice seed cast without gain comes the lesson Christ taught the Twelve. The Word of God presents the Kingdom message as seed thrown upon the different soils. The response

of the audience to God's Word is diverse. A great harvest is emphasized in the parable. Yet all seed does not yield such a gain.

That which falls on the thin soil springs up immediately. Soon that heard with joy has withered. Trials and persecution soon overtake that without depth. Lives can be so shallow in the life-giving Word that no deep roots sustain even during daily temptations. It cannot withstand the heat.

Like those who respond with great emotion to things new and of passing fancy, their interests soon go elsewhere. The emotion of the moment is not channeled to the staying power of daily devotion. Such ones turn away as impulsive hearts. Evidence of genuine faith is not seen in endurance and fruitfulness. There is failure to be "grounded and rooted" as Christ dwells within the individual.

The hearer has thwarted that which is eternal of the Word of God.
