Now serving in Place 2 is Don Payne and John Boren is in Place 3. Place 1 is an open position as the result of Dr. Charles McCook's resignation last year.



"We are really pleased that Kent will be our guest speaker," Chamber of Commerce president Bryan Williams III comments.

Some fifty individuals subscribed and donated \$500 or more each to become charter members of PEDC.

Following the incorporation and obtaining the Internal Revenue Service approval in September; the PEDC has acquired about five million dollars worth of property, including the vacant cotton mill, 23 residences and some miscellaneous machinery equipment.

The Board of Directors of PEDC has made it their first priority the business of obtaining suitable industrial tenants that will provide employment in the commun-

Numerous contacts have been made with real estate firms and organizations familiar with the industrial real estate market.

We have engaged George Puckett and Industrial Equities of Austin to provide us with professional service in the marketing and negotiations to obtain desired tenants. Discussions are going on with potential tenants.

Meanwhile, costs of maintenance, upkeep, insurance, management of the residential rental property and utilities continue to require funds.

Although we receive some residential rental income, this does not cover our current on-going costs.

We need more than the \$25,000 raised with our first round of subscriptions to continue our efforts well into 1985.

Although we have a valuable asset into which we expect to locate an economically productive tenant our current cash position does not permit the most aggressive marketing expenditures.

We are interested in obtaining at least fifty more shareholders of the PEDC.

This would provide a wider participation in the Post community effort at economic development and provide a sounder cash

position from which to operate. Contributions made to

PEDC are tax deductible. If you would like to make a contribution to be credited to your 1984 income tax we would urge you to make out your check now payable to

the Post Economic Develop-Corporation. Payments will be accepted at the Post Chamber of Commerce office or at the First National Bank of Post.



Mental — forgetfulness, boredom, dull senses, negative attitude, poor concentration, and low productivity.

Relational — isolation, loneliness, nagging, fewer contacts with friends, resentments, intolerance of others.

To overcome stress, there are a variety of techniques one may use including: say "no" more often, take time for yourself, take time to schedule "fun" times with

Speaking of stress! It's time to organize your financial information for your annual income tax report to the IRA! Two items of interest concerning new tax law changes:

Qualifying for Long-Term Capital Gains

Changes in the tax law mean you can now sell an investment after holding it just six months and still qualify for the low, long-term capital gains tax. Before July 1984, you had to keep your stock at least a year before you could benefit from the long-term capital gains tax. Speculators will gain the most from this tax change.

Tax Laws on Home Computers

Tax laws regarding home computers have tightened up. Any computer you buy must now be used more than half the time for business use in order for you to take a tax deduction. Deductions can be made if the computer is used in your own business or if an employer requires you to have a computer to do your job. Managing personal investments won't qualify as business use. The new rules apply to computers put into service after June 18, 1984.




