Chamber Banquet Friday Features Steak...

Community Center. Hance, who resigned his congressional seat to run in the Democratic primary for the U.S. Senate last year, is expected to enter the political arena next year in either a state-wide office or perhaps take another shot at the senate race. In addition to the featured

Senior Citizens Worried

Senior citizens in Post are nervous these days...mainly due to recent reports of house break-ins and attempted burglaries of homes occupied by the elderly.

Mrs Estelle Keene is the most recent victim, having scared off a would-be burglar twice in the past few weeks.

"He almost got through the second time," Mrs Keene reports.

The burglar broke the pad lock and hooks off both front doors of her house at 209 S. Ave. I.

The same home was broken into a few days before George's Drive In was burglarized last week.

Mrs Keene said she entered the back door during that attempted break-in, scaring off the would-be robber.

"The second time I had been out in the Senior Citizen van," Mrs Keene adds, "and I guess he saw us coming down the street before he had a chance to get through the busted door."

"It seems to me us older folks need some better protection from these hoodlums," Mrs Keene complains.

The break-in attempts at her house were both in mid-afternoon.

"This used to be the sort of town that you could go out for a while and leave your door unlocked," Mrs Keene laments, "but not any more...you better keep those doors locked all the time and good."

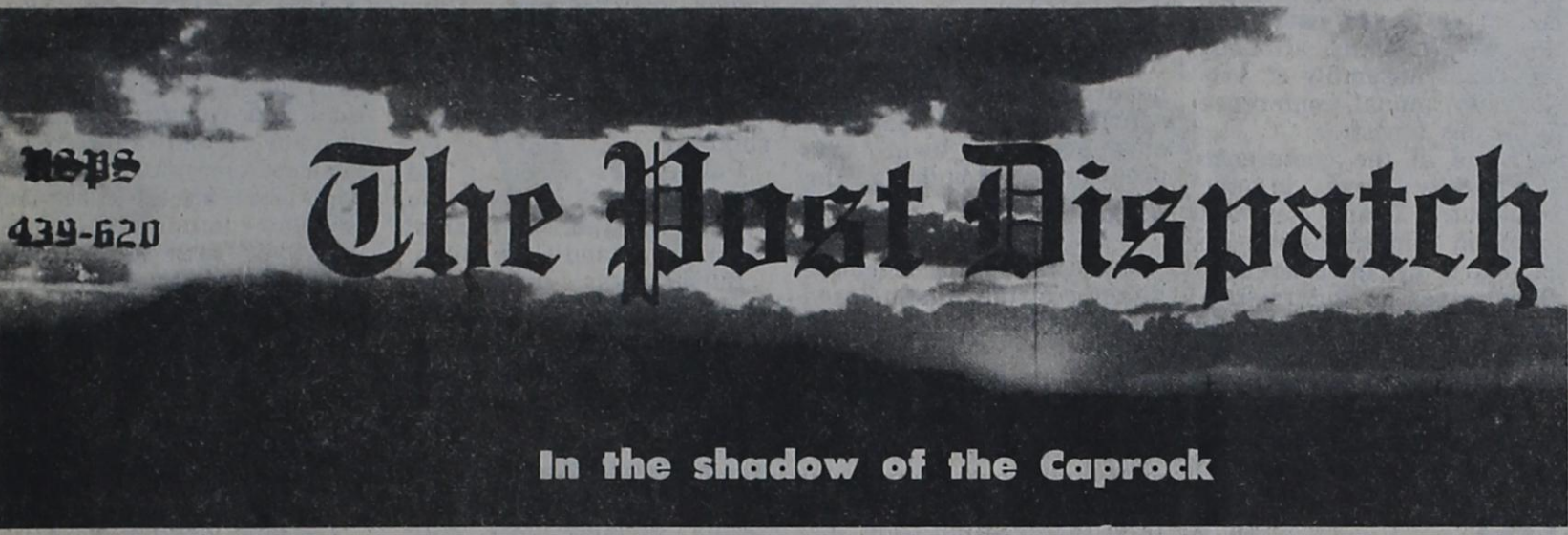
Damon's Restaurant was reportedly broken into the night of February 11.

Buyers Pay Record Amounts for Animals in Saturday's Sale

The 1985 Garza County Junior Livestock Show and Sale broke all premium sale records in the 19 years of helping Garza County 4-H'ers and FFA members.

Sixty-one exhibitors sold 88 animals through the premium sale for \$48,700 plus \$4,482 in add-ons, \$820 prize money paid for a total of \$54,002.

The grand champion steer shown by Brandon Bird also broke all previous individual sale records with a whopping bid of \$4,250 from Poly Pipe of Gainesville, Tx.

Other big winners were Mike Johnson showing the

reserve champion steer, Randy Lewis showed his crossbred hog to the grand champion honors with Krisha Mason's Duroc winning the reserve championship.

Grand champion of the lamb show was Brad Byrd's heavy weight medium wool with the reserve champion being shown by Derick Dunn.

The grand champion gelding was shown by Jana Middleton with Mike Bland winning the reserve champion.

The grand champion mare was shown by Lance Bland with the reserve champion

being shown by Keitha White.

Grand champion heifer was owned and shown by Jana Middleton with Clay Cowdrey exhibiting his heifer to the reserve championship.

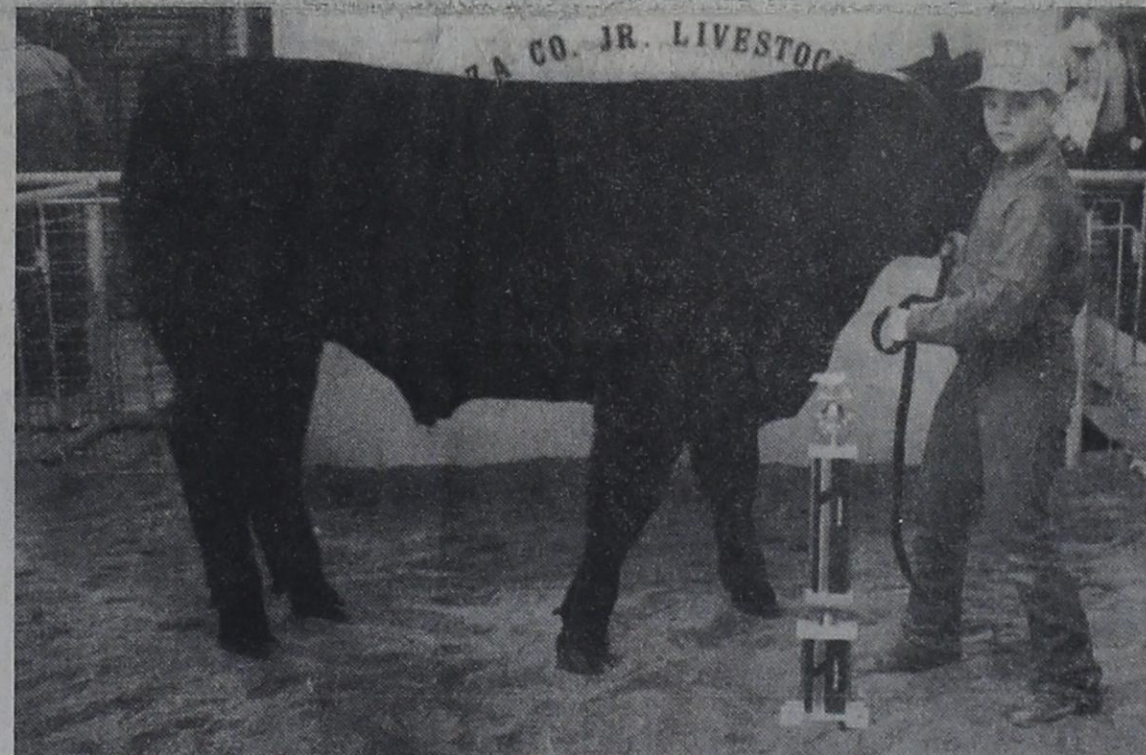
Randy Johnston had the grand and reserve champion pen of rabbits and the grand champion pen of market broilers was owned by Mark Pennell.

The top four animals of each division including the grand and reserve champions went into the sale with 32 hogs, 32 lambs and 24 steers making the premium sale.

The annual event began on Wednesday afternoon with weigh-in of 224 animals by 105 exhibitors.

This included 83 lambs, three pens of rabbits, one

Insurance Bid Procedures Questioned

After a detailed discussion concerning procedures for insurance bids, the Post City Council voted last Friday to accept the amended bid of Bryan Williams and Son Insurance for vehicle coverage.

With a guaranteed dividend of \$1,513, the awarded bid was \$188 lower than the bid of Post Insurance.

The bids had been originally opened at the Feb. 4 city council meeting, with Post Insurance apparently submitting the lowest bid.

The council decided at the February 4 meeting to postpone a decision on the policy until the city manager had time to review the coverages and make a recommendation as to which would be best for the city.

During the review, city manager Bill Pool discovered that seven vehicles on the original bid proposal were already included in the multi-peril policy which had been awarded in September 1984 to Bryan Williams and Son.

With this information, Post Insurance and Bryan Williams and Son were asked to submit revised bids with the seven vehicles removed from the proposed policy.

The special called meeting Friday brought out questions about the bid procedures as council member Weaver McKamie pointed out that "the figures have changed since yesterday, I don't like the way this has been handled."

"It seems to me that when we get bids, if the agency which the council wants to get the bid isn't low, then we postpone and change things so they can get the bid," McKamie added.

"Last summer we took bids on the buildings, and when Tom Power and Post Insurance submitted bids, the council found some problems with the property listings and we were told then that we had to re-advertise the bids with the correct information," she continued.

"Isn't this the same situation we have here?"

Council member Jack Ault questioned, "I'm not sure we can even accept these bids," referring to the change in the bid proposal.

Mayor Giles McCrary called city attorney Harvey

Morton for an opinion and then told council that since both insurance companies were given the opportunity to change their bids, it was okay for the council to take the amended bids.

Glenda Shobe, Post Insurance owner, also expressed

her frustration with the bid procedures.

"Why were we given incorrect information in the first place?" she asked.

"We bid on a list of property, did a lot of work to get the bids in on time,

and then later discovered that some equipment was already covered on another policy," she added.

"And these amended bids weren't even sealed," Shobe continued, "I just object to the way this whole thing has been handled."

Mayor McCrary offered the council's apology for the confusion on the bidding and promised that bid procedures would be corrected in the future.

Council member Larry Mills echoed the mayor's comments, saying all the agencies are due an apology and asked why proper procedures and notification hadn't been followed as a routine matter.

Council member Lewis Holly said, "it's just downright unprofessional."

Voting for the bid award were Maxine Earl, Ault and Mills. McKamie was opposed and Lewis Holly abstained.

In other action at the called meeting, the council discussed delinquent taxes and authorized the city secretary to notify delinquent taxpayers that their names will be published in a future issue of the newspaper.

Joe Williams was named as election judge for the April 6 election, with Tricia Cockrell serving as assistant election judge.

Bran Adds Dietary Fiber to Spaghetti

Bran muffins, breads and cereals are well-known as foods that add fiber to the diet.

Now spaghetti made with 10 percent bran can be added to that list.

Spaghetti containing bran has more than three times as much dietary fiber and higher mineral content than regular spaghetti.

Spaghetti with bran also passes the taste test with many consumers.

Research conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) found that tasters who prefer whole wheat bread to white bread usually liked bran spaghetti better than spaghetti without bran.

Pastas, such as spaghetti, are low in sodium, fat and simple carbohydrates and contain a high level of complex carbohydrates.

The 10 percent bran spaghetti also contains much higher levels of protein, iron, calcium, manganese, phosphorous and zinc than spaghetti without bran.

Bran spaghetti may not replace the traditional pasta, but it does offer another selection of products for people seeking a way to increase the level of fiber in their diets.

Agricultural financing and national farm policy will share the spotlight here Feb. 19 at the annual meeting of the South Plains Development Program. U. S. Rep. Charles Stenholm, D-Tex., a leading spokesman for agriculture in Congress, will be the

keynote speaker.

The theme of this year's educational conference for area producers will be "Planning for Profit," said Billy C. Gunter, district director for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In addition to farm policy and financing, it will provide economic outlook predictions for area crops, agronomic considerations for improving profitability, and the views of an

agricultural economist and a farmer on the keys to farm survival.

The program will begin at 9:30 a. m. at the Koko Palace, 50th Street at Avenue Q in Lubbock. A registration fee of \$7.25 will include lunch. The conference will close at 3 p. m.

The current turmoil in financing agriculture, both nationally and across the South Plains, will be addressed by Dr. Dean Hughes of Texas Tech University. He is director of the Thornton Agricultural Finance Institute in Tech's department of agricultural economics.

The outlook for the area's agriculture will be presented by Dr. Carl Anderson, Extension agricultural economist and cotton marketing specialist, from College Station. The changing structure of agriculture in a

changing policy environment will be explored by Dr. Ed Smith, Extension economist and grain marketing specialist, College Station.

Dr. James R. Supak, Extension agronomist and cotton specialist at Lubbock, will discuss critical agronomic considerations which area producers will face this year.

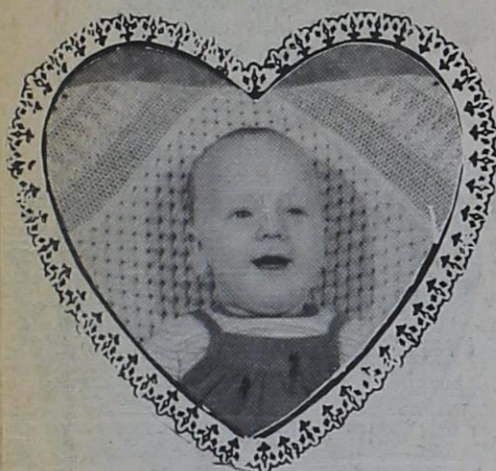

The program will be moderated by Dr. Milo Shult of College Station, associate director of the state Extension Service and Gunter.

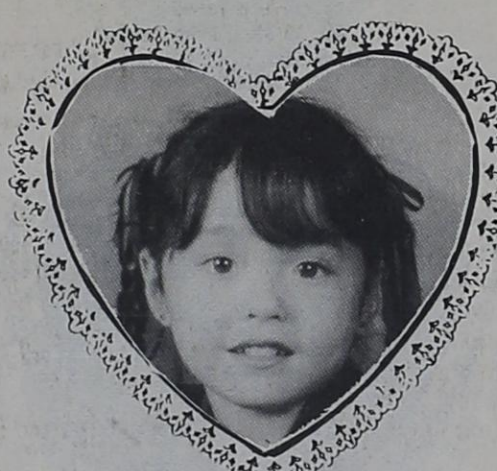

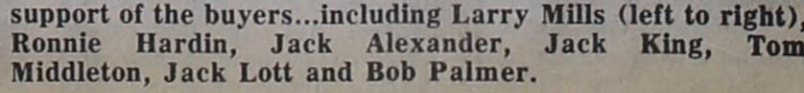
