One Files for Council

Three elections will be held in Post April 6...city, hospital and school.

As of Tuesday morning Charles Wallace was the only candidate to file for a position on the city council.

The terms to expire this year are Mayor Giles McCrary, council members Larry Mills and Maxine Earl.

No candidates have filed for the hospital board, with three incumbents' terms due to expire: Jack Alexander, Zoe Kirkpatrick and David Nichols.

Post ISD board of trustees candidates are Tom Drake and Deljuan Wilson for the vacated Place One position which Dr. Charles McCook had held until his resignation from the board last summer;

Incumbent John Boren and challenger Jerry Osborn in Place Three and incumbent Don Payne has filed for Place Two.

Deadline for candidates to file in all three elections is March 6.

Fire Destroys Belongings, Home Gutted

A fire last week completely destroyed a home at 310 East 10th St., leaving its occupant Ricky Mendieta with no belongings.

"I barely got out of the window...just a few burns and scratches," he reports.

Post Volunteer Firemen responded to the call at 2:15 a. m. Wednesday, Feb. 20 to find the house totally involved.

It took approximately one and one-half hours to extinguish the flames.

Mendieta was not seriously injured and he was the only person in the house.

"I lost everything in the fire," Mendieta says.

Firemen suspect the cause of the fire to be possible smoking in bed.

PEDC Rejects Bids, Rents Houses

Post Economic Development Corp. (PEDC) directors voted last week to reject all 13 bids offered on purchasing three PEDC owned houses.

Bids were submitted by nine individuals, with bids falling between 64 percent to 50 percent below the appraised market values.

One house was bid at \$2,000, and directors agreed that the property could be rented at \$200 a month and produce enough revenue in a year to offset the offered buying price.

Other bids included \$15,265 and \$14,400.

All three houses will be rented by PEDC.

The contract for sale of the house at 201 N. Ave S was discussed, with a closing date set for March 15.

The net return to PEDC after closing costs and repairs is expected to be \$96,000.

A general discussion was held by the directors on

various interests expressed for leasing of space at the Postex Plant building.

Although no firm arrangements with tenants has been set, several firms have made inquiries about the building.

Rudy Mueller, a graduate student at Texas Tech University, reported on the possibility of bringing new European investments to Post and outlined his experiences in Germany, consulting in the U.S. and his position currently as a graduate student.

PEDC chairman Jack King invited Mueller to provide PEDC a paper on how he could be helpful with industrial development.

Consultant George Puckett reported that the interest of Continental Industries of Elkhart, Indiana was not dead and a proposal was being developed on how they might use the plant.

King also reported on a recent interest expressed by

Cal-Maine for locating a feed mill in Post to prepare corn and milo for their egg production plant in the county.

Director Lewis Earl reported on the status of an effort to acquire the Santa Fe depot for public use and for historic preservation and

noted the relationship of this to Cal-Maine's need for a street dedicated for an entrance to the proposed plant location.

Attending the meeting were King, Giles Dalby, Charles Adams, Patty Kirkpatrick, Earl and Puckett.

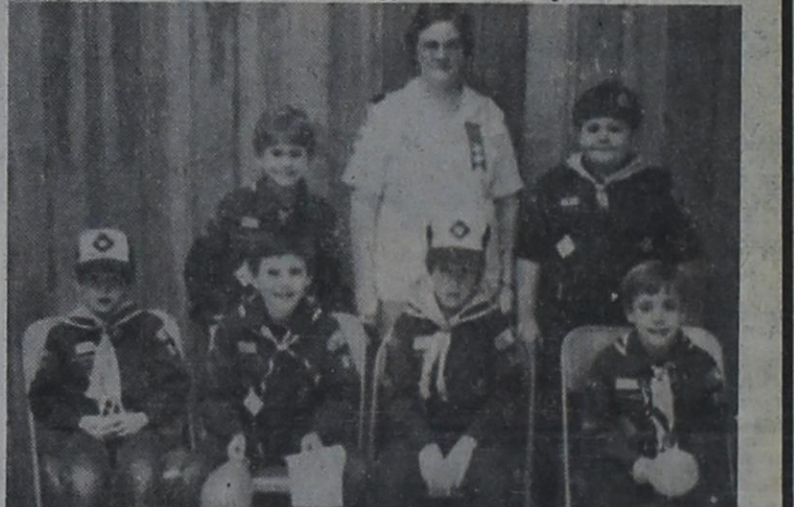
