

12 Candidates File for Five Offices

County Democratic chairman Dick Tanner reports that as of Tuesday 12 candidates have filed for five county offices in the May primary.

Preston Poole has filed for county attorney and Ruth Reno as tax assessor-collector, both are incumbents.

In the sheriff's contest, Donney Walker, Tommy Duncan and Mike Harper have pitched their names into the ring.

The precinct one county commissioner's race has incumbent T. D. (Buck) Craft opposed by Jimmy Holleman, Elton Lee and Keith Adams.

Precinct three commissioner Mike Cisneros is opposed by Tommy Young and Cecil Foster Sr.

Foster has been serving as constable of the precinct and by state law automatically

vacated that position upon filing as a candidate for commissioner.

The constable position has two years left on the term and will now be open for candidates to file.

Tanner reminded interested candidates that Feb. 6 at 6 p. m. is the deadline for filing and that independent candidates must also file by that date, but they register with the county judge and clerk.

Council, Commissioners Share Ideas

City council members and county commissioners met in a joint session Monday evening to discuss mutual concerns.

County Judge Giles Dalby and commissioners Mike Cisneros and Herb Walls joined Mayor McCrary and council members Maxine Earl, Jim Jackson, Jack Alexander, Bill Pool and A. C. Cash in the regular quarterly session.

The two local governing bodies agreed to share information on budget overruns and to implement new guidelines for disbursing funds for jointly operated committees.

An agreement was also reached on appointing new members to joint boards, with the city making appointments in even-numbered years and the county on odd-numbered years.

City manager Rebecca King advised the group of anticipated cost overruns on the airport repair project, citing the engineering

Elderly Get Tax Help

A taxpayer aged 65 or older may take advantage of a special type of property tax relief—deferred payment of delinquent taxes on his homestead—by filing a sworn affidavit at the Garza County Appraisal District office.

According to Jean Westfall, chief appraiser of the district, after the "over-65 tax deferral" affidavit has been properly filed, taxing units may not press or initiate delinquent tax suits on the homestead involved as long as the elderly taxpayer owns and resides at that property.

If a lawsuit has already been initiated to collect delinquent taxes on the homestead, an affidavit asserting age and ownership of the property must be filed with the court in which the suit is pending, Westfall said.

Westfall said that forms for the deferral are available from the Garza Appraisal District office. The form should be completed and signed by the applicant and his signature witnessed by a notary public or other official authorized to take oaths, she added.

For the elderly homeowner considering application for tax deferral, Westfall stressed that it allows postponing payment, but that a lien remains on the property for delinquent taxes, penalties and interest. "Those amounts continue to accrue during the deferral period," she said. "Once the applicant no longer qualifies for deferral—that is, if he no longer owns or resides at the homestead—all those accrued amounts become due and payable. Taxing units at that time may sue and foreclose on the accrued delinquencies, penalties and interest."

The over-65 taxpayer may pay, or fail to pay, any taxes due on the homestead without altering the protection of the deferral, Westfall said.

studies of the "hump" in the middle of the runway as the main problem.

Mayor McCrary presented a proposal on behalf of the city council that the current airport board be dissolved and in its place a new board made up of elected officials from the county and city be appointed.

"The airport board has for all practical purposes not been functioning as a board for years," the Mayor emphasized, "and the council feels that since these two government bodies do most of the work, we should have more control over the activities."

The mayor cited the fact that a surface contract lease has not been negotiated since the 1960s, and many regular administrative functions which should be done by the board have not been accomplished.

Judge Dalby told the group that the proposal would be discussed at the next commissioner's court meeting.

After agreeing to share budget information and budget planning, the joint meeting adjourned.

The city council meeting that followed tackled the lease agreement with A. D. Kitchens for a 79 acre area on the cap.

Kitchens had been sub-leasing from N. R. King, and payments for 1981, '82 and '83 had not been made to the city.

The council agreed to accept Kitchens' bid of \$800 in advance for the 1984 lease, and a monthly payment of \$50 or more on the past due lease amount of \$1,095.

Jack Alexander cast a dissenting vote, citing that he believed the lease should be advertised for bids.

The new proposed zoning ordinance was presented to the council, but a first reading

was postponed. Five members for a planning and zoning commission will be named at the next meeting.

Community Center board member, Lewis Earl presented recommendations for changes of community center fees, which was approved by the council.

The council reappointed Everett Windham to serve on the White River Municipal Water District.

8th grade girls whip Lockney 31-10

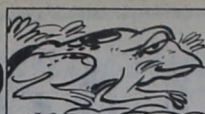
The eighth grade girls, under coach Lu Allen had an easy time of it in Lockney over their eighth graders 31 to 10.

Tips To Help You

Q. How do I decide if it's worth the money to reupholster a piece of furniture?

A. It's usually worth it if you start with a good piece of used furniture with a sound frame of a hardwood, such as oak. If you like the old piece and can't find anything similar, you'll also find it worthwhile. 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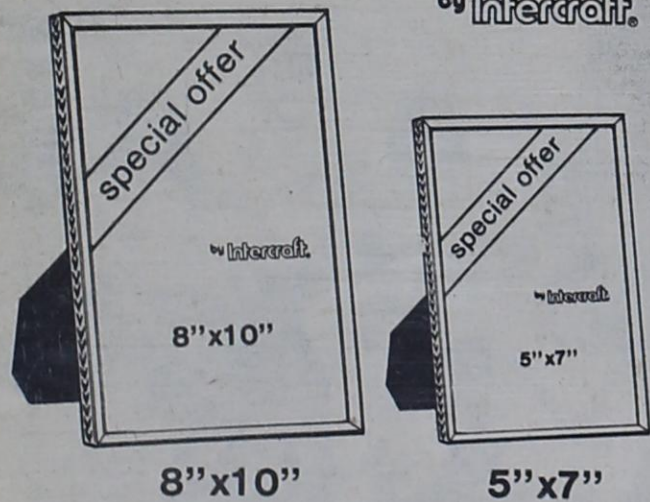


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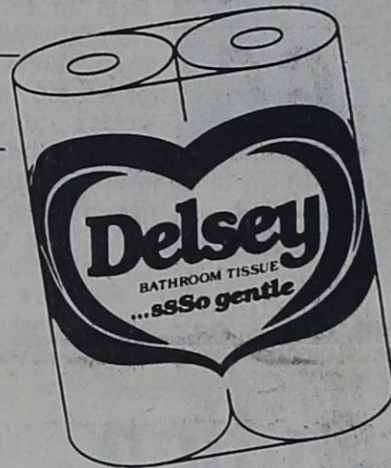
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
