

Street Paving Gets Council Okay

A street improvement project, including the paving of several streets, will get underway this spring in Post as a result of city council action Monday evening.

The project, which is estimated to cost \$256,000, had been scheduled in this year's budget and reflects the council's plan for a long-range improvement of city streets.

The be paved are Avenues I, N, P and O and a portion of 7th St. Those streets were chosen after engineering studies determined the highest priorities for water drainage and traffic use.

Property owners will be assessed curb and gutter costs only, at the rate of \$5.90 per foot, to be paid in three installments over a

two year period.

A public hearing on the project will be held Thursday, March 22 at 7:30 p.m. in the First National Bank Community Room.

The council also opened bids on the water main replacement and the extension sewer line projects.

Holloway Bros. Construction Inc. won the low bid of \$18,166 for the water main and Plains Utility's \$26,739.47 bid was chosen for the sewer extension.

Property owners on the sewer extension east on Hwy 380 will pay for the work, although the city is coordinating the project.

Petersburg city manager Jesse J. Nave submitted a high bid of \$1,501.39 for the used

street sweeper and was awarded the sale.

The council appointed John Valdez to the Planning and Zoning Commission. He joins other members Patty Kirkpatrick, Robert Cox, David Newby, James O. Mitchell and Ray Bagby.

The commission is currently studying proposed zoning ordinances and will meet in the near future to begin organizing and establishing zoning requirements.

Council members attending the meeting Monday were Mayor Giles McCrary, Jim Jackson, Jack Alexander, A.C. Cash and Maxine Earl.

They will meet again March 14 to open bids on the paving and street improvement project.

A rumor about Levi Straus buying Burlington's Postex Plant has circulated around town the past few weeks, so we called North Carolina to find out.

"I wish it were true," Burlington's real estate official Marvin Baugh told us, "but no one has contacted us, although we surely would like for Levi Straus to be interested."

Unfortunately, the rumor is just that - wishful thinking.

Baugh went on to tell us that as of today, there are no active negotiations.

"We have just recently sent out another advertising mailing, and your utility company has included the plant in a major industry publication advertisement," Baugh continued.

As for the continuing rumor about American Cotton Growers in Littlefield, Baugh says it has been more than a year since any discussion has been held with them.

"We just don't have any good news about selling the plant at this time," Burlington's official added.

Mrs. Babb has served as substitute teacher for the junior and senior high bands since the death of band director, Steve Ladd and choir director, Dianna Ladd on February 19.

School administrators continue to interview candidates for the permanent position of band director.

At Texas Tech, he is teaching a Brass Pedagogy class for Music Education majors, arranges for marching and pep bands, assists with drill instruction for the marching band and assists with the Symphonic Band.

Hawkins was band director at James W. Robinson Secondary School in Fairfax County, Va. 1980-81 and his marching band appeared in the movie "First Monday in October" with Walter Matthau and Jill Clayburgh.

I would like to take this opportunity to announce that I am a candidate for re-election for the office of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1.

First, I want to thank each one of you for the support given to me in the 1982 elections and for the past 13½ months while in office. 'The Way Things Were' on Display

When Austin resident Tom Prather retired in 1978 from his position as Executive Director of the Texas Congress of PTAs, he took to the two-lane highways of Central Texas in the company of his favorite cameras. His scheme at the outset was to photograph the process of historical preservation, showing how individuals, groups, or entire communities had managed to save and restore buildings and sites that had played an important role in local history. But the farther Prather traveled, the more strongly he felt drawn to the

commonplace and apparently insignificant. "I would go out to photograph a building on the historic register," he admits somewhat ruefully, "and spend the entire day at a homestead across the road. I'd see an old stone barn or an abandoned farmhouse, just like dozens of others that used to dot the countryside, but now the only one left."

I felt that if I didn't pay attention to it, no one else would either, and it would just vanish and be forgotten.

What Prather had accumulated by the end of his travels was

a seemingly random collection of pictures featuring all sorts of man-made structures, some ramshackle, some restored; some of the historic register, others so unimportant that no one could remember who had lived there, or when. They were all important to Prather, however, because each represented a chapter in the story of how settlers had lived in Texas from the 1860s until the coming of World War II.

Now an exhibition that highlights the story of Texas settlers opened for public viewing on March 5 through March 25 at the Garza County Historical Museum and Post Public Library. A special selection of Prather's photographs with additional images by Arlington photographer, Jeffery Altwies, has been organized by the Texas Humanities Resource Center of the University of Texas at Arlington Library into a photographic essay on the lifeways of early Texans as reflected in their buildings. The creation of this traveling exhibition and its presentation in Post have been made possible by grants from the Texas Committee for

the Humanities. "The Way Things Were" consists of forty photographs from Central and North Texas, poignant illustrations of the hard facts of pioneering life on farms and in small towns. The exhibit highlights the settlers' accommodations to reality, their dreams of a better tomorrow, the ambitious ventures and the losing gambles of a people who lived too close to the soil. Featured in the pictures are log houses, stone barns, one-room schools, brush arbor, general stores, failed banks and a selection of the Court houses that 19th century Texans built as monuments to a lawful and orderly society.

"The Way Things Were" will be on display at the Garza County Historical Museum and Post Public Library for three weeks, from March 5 to March 25. Viewing hours are Monday through Friday. Special group visits may be arranged by calling Pee Wee Pierce at the Library — 495-2766. Admission is free.

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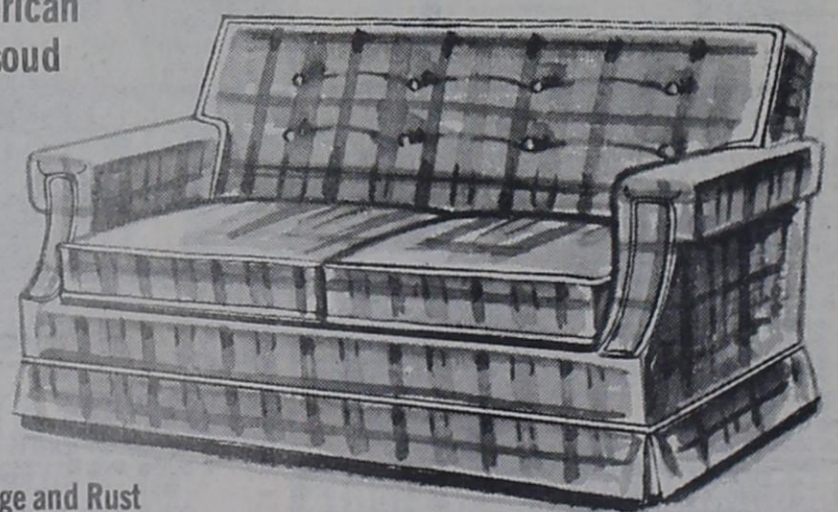

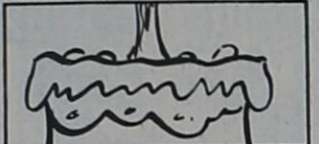

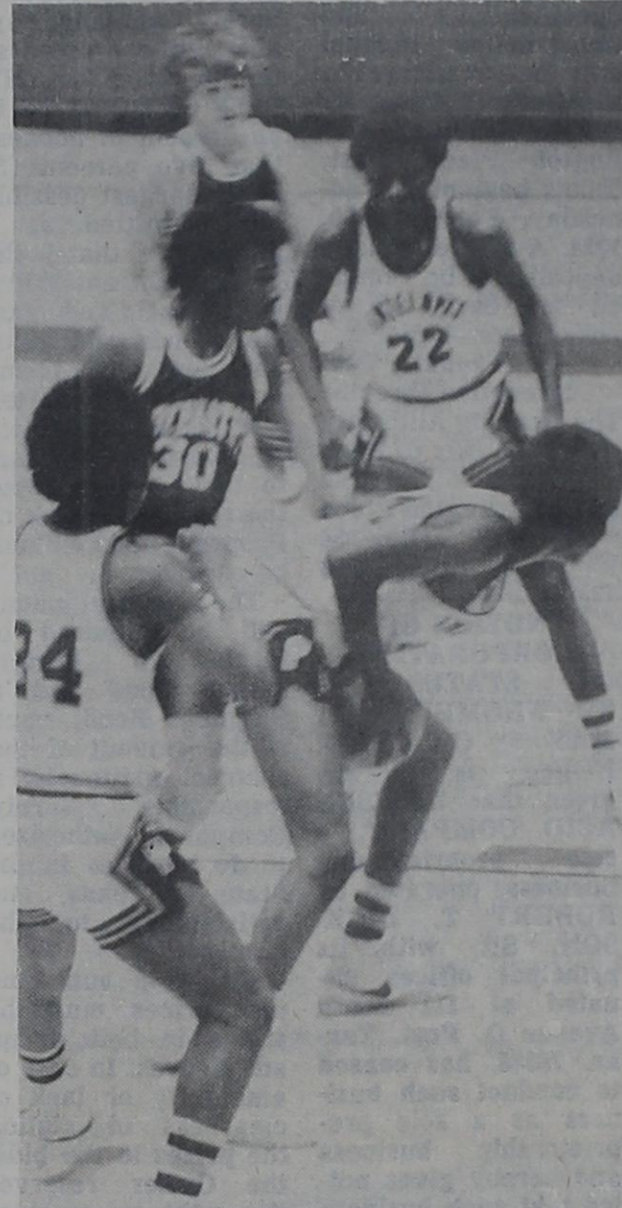
Mansion Sells
