The Way I See It...

Last week I began a series of editorial comments which will focus on various government functions and community improvements I believe need public attention.

These articles are designed to spark citizen interest and awareness on critical issues facing the future of our city.

This week I address the Post Independent School District Board of Trustees:

Not very many school districts are fortunate to have a \$1.6 million reserve, plus another \$2 million or so in certificates of deposit.

I commend you for your outstanding stewardship of taxpayers' dollars. Your school system functions in an excellent business-like manner with sound financial management.

I offer my sincere praise to you for supporting superintendent Bill Shiver, who is responsible for your strong financial position. I think Bill Shiver is one of the very best school administrators in Texas.

No indebtedness and money in the bank, that's good management.

Before I offer my ideas about ways to improve and things I believe need to be done to look toward the

future, let me emphasize that I am impressed with our overall school system.

I see little or no evidence of racial discrimination. In fact, it is my observation that, even though our community still has pockets of individual racism, our school teachers and administrators set good examples of equality.

The teachers you employ are dedicated, concerned and professional educators who care about our children and their education.

Your academic program it appears to me is above average and offers more than the basics required by state law.

And there is no doubt that you have set the pace for leadership in athletics, particularly with the outstanding coaching staff.

So, with all this praise, where do I go next?

First, a similar approach that you read last week in my open letter to the city council:

At most school board meetings, it'll be just you and I, your superintendent and principals.

The people who voted you into office will rarely attend the meetings to see and hear you wrestle with problems and potential solutions. (Continued on P.9)

Citizens Ask Questions About Paving

A group of 22 Post residents attended a public hearing last Thursday evening concerning this year's city street paving project.

Property owners on affected streets asked about payment schedules for their portion of the curb and gutters, along with a few questions about individual problems.

City council members were also quizzed by property owners whose streets are not on the paving list this year, asking when their streets would be paved.

"I have been trying for the past eight years to get our street paved," Rusty Dean, 216 W. 11th, commented, "and I'd like to know when we will be on the list."

Mayor Giles McCrary explained that selection of streets to be paved was done by the engineers, looking at the priorities of drainage and traffic.

"I cannot say which streets will be next," he answered, "that's a decision the engineers will have to make," the Mayor added.

McCrary reminded property owners that the city council hopes to continue the long-range paving project so

that each year more streets are paved and citizens can look to the day when all city streets will be paved.

The cost to property owners will be \$5.50 per linear foot for the curb and gutter only, the city is paying the remainder. Property owners will be allowed to make three installments on their portion of the project.

The paving project will cost \$229,622.95 and is ex-

Job Training Office Opens

Velma Burkham, manager of the Lubbock Texas Employment Commission, has announced the opening of a Job Training Partnership Act Office in Post.

Walter Didway, a Post resident for the past 20 years and a former Postex Plant manager is the representative in the newly established office.

The new job training program has been established for disadvantaged youth and adults ages 16 and older who meet income requirements.

The new office is located in the Garza County Multi-Service Building on South Highway 84.

Burkham stated, "the purpose of the act is to establish programs to prepare youth and unskilled adults for entry into the labor force and to afford job training to the economically disadvantaged individual and other individuals facing serious barriers to unemployment who are in special need of such training to

obtain productive employment."

The youth program will include full and part-time work with youth being able to work up to 20 hours a week during the school year and full time would include 40 hours during the summer. The Texas Employment Commission would pay all costs, salary, social security, withholding and workman's compensation for the first 250 hours.

The adult program, both part and full time, seeks to place eligible participants in on-the-job training with private industry employers with TEC reimbursing the employer up to 50 percent of the training cost. There would be no cost to the employer for the services.

Garza County is included in the City of Lubbock, Lubbock County service delivery area for JTPA.

The local office will be open Monday through Friday from 8 a. m. until noon and from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m. or more information may be had by calling 495-3941.

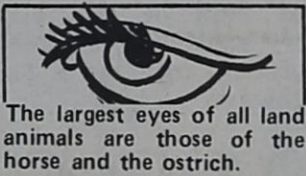

West Texas Chamber of Commerce's 66th annual convention was held last weekend at the Green Oak Inn in Fort Worth. Economic development and the attraction of new industry to West Texas plus restructuring the Texas Education system responsive to the Perot report were the major themes of concern according to Lewis Earl, Post Chamber of Commerce manager who attended the meetings on Friday and Saturday.

Earl reports that Harden Wiedaniam, director, governor's office of economic development and Kent Yates, general counsel, Texas Economic Development Commissioner addressed the conference, providing information on efforts of the state government to stimulate growth of industry in the state. There are hopes that some of the efforts of these state agencies may be helpful to Post when industrial prospects are identified, according to the Chamber manager.

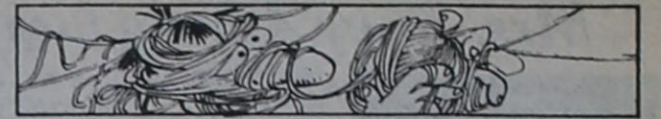

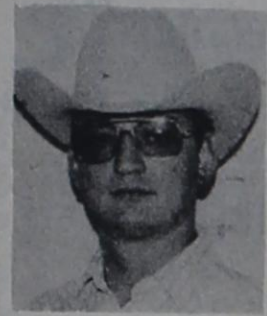

Degrees for December and April graduates will officially be

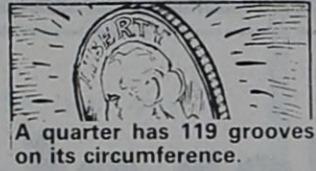
conferred upon those persons during Saturday's ceremonies.

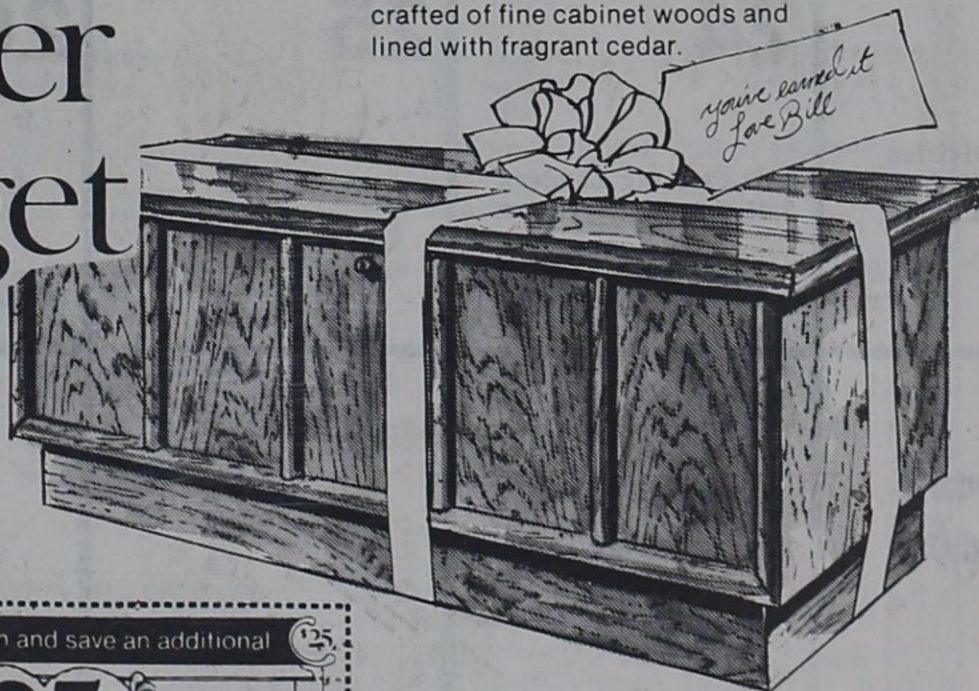

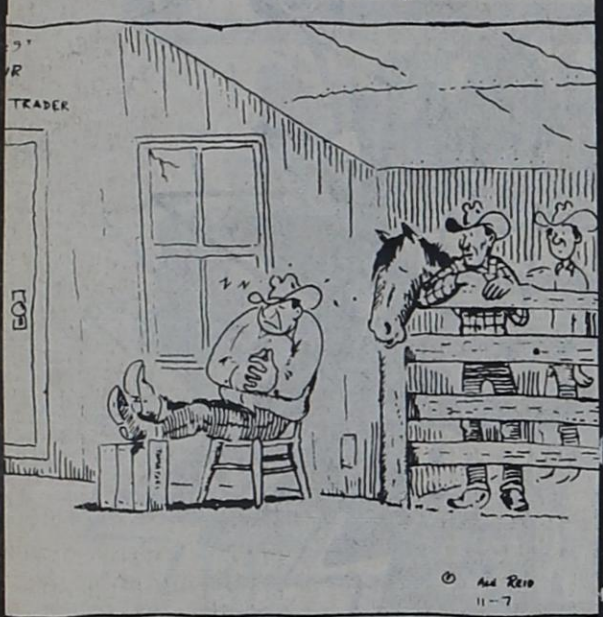

The Way I See It...

(Continued from P.1)

They will only attend when you have made an unpopular decision which affects a group of people on a specific issue.

Such as the phonics case that came up last year.

Otherwise, your actions will be scrutinized through rumor, hearsay...and what I report in the Dispatch about the meetings.

It is my responsibility to quietly observe your meetings and accurately report your actions so that all those who won't bother to come and hear for themselves will have some idea of what's going on.

And sometimes what you do at the school board meetings is difficult to condense into a news story brief enough to retain the readers' attention.

Yours is a complicated job. It is also, in my opinion, the one which creates more criticism than any local elected office.

Every school taxpayer, parent or bystander has a favorite pet peeve, and expect you to listen and take action.

I commend you for your willingness to serve in this "thankless" job.

And even though you can be proud of your school system, you and I know there is room for improvement and here's some suggestions of what I'd like to see accomplished:

1. Dream a little...be visionaries...consider the future with positive attitudes...dare to think about what our school system can be.
2. Consider your impact on the future growth of Post...potential industrial prospects want to see a modern, progressive school system when selecting an industrial site.

3. Look for ways to invest the excess money now in the bank...there's nothing wrong with having a little extra, but "rolling over" certificates of deposit and collecting interest "in case of bad times" is short-sighted. That money can be used now to make physical improvements which will be needed in the future but much of it is needed today.
4. Plan for growth, instead of fearing decline. Doomsday talk and "woe is me, we're running out of money" concept is the kind of attitude that spells disaster.

5. Trust the people to help you make decisions. Ask them what they want you to do with their tax dollars. The idea of a bond issue or referendum for wide-spread physical improvements is a good way to do that.
6. Please, spend some of that excess money to bring our schools into the modern world with refrigerated air conditioning. The argument that "we didn't have it when I was in school" is just not acceptable...some of us didn't have in-door toilets either. And, if you decide to air condition, take the plunge and use the most efficient and long-term method with refrigerated air conditioning. Evaporative coolers may save in the short-term, but long-range they are inadequate. Your teachers and students deserve to work and study in an environment as comfortable as your home or office. If you think this is not a serious problem, I urge you to sit in an un-air conditioned classroom next week for a full school day.

7. Give your superintendent the direction and funding to establish a "Gifted Student" program. We have a number of above average students who need this special help.
8. Support the request to hire an assistant band director on a full-time basis. This is one of my personal goals, which I also share with hundreds of band student parents. There are such convincing arguments in favor of this idea that I am surprised you haven't already taken action on correcting the over-load on the next band director.
8. Build a new gymnasium...so that all the people who want to watch basketball can get into the gym.
10. Build a new vocational education facility. Even if the state eliminates funding, the program needs your support for its importance to this community and future growth.
11. Provide adequate facilities for the hundreds of students in athletics. The crowded conditions in the dressing rooms is embarrassing and just down-right unnecessary.

And here's a dream I overheard at coffee one day last week:

"How about building a really nice stadium right up against the caprock...just under it...and make it a showcase for the outstanding football program we have? And we could even host regional and area play-off games for other schools..."

Sound impossible? Dream the impossible...dare to believe in a bright and prosperous future...who knows, your attitude and confidence in our future might make it happen!

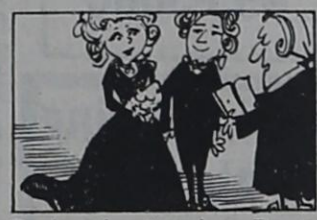

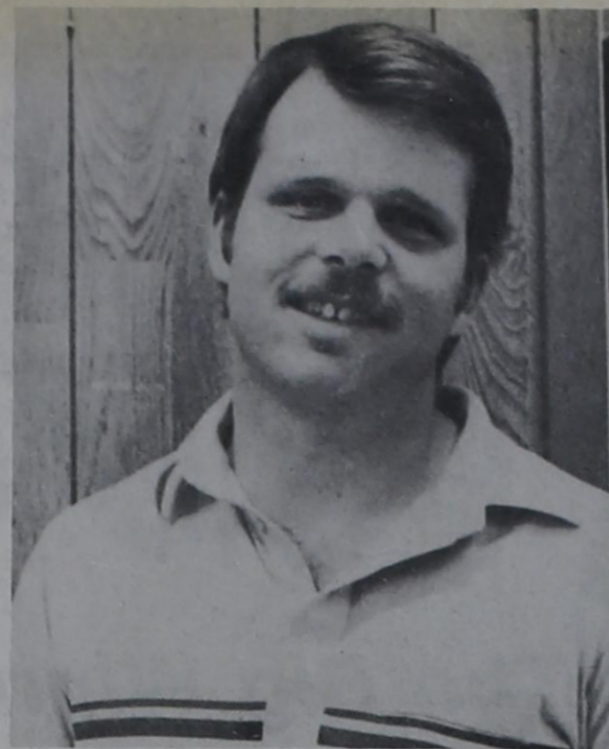
Those who endeavor to do so, deserve our praise and support. We are dependent upon their high calling of bringing produce in concord with God's created order.

RESPONSIBLE CONSUMERS SAVE MONEY AND TROUBLE

Some people think that National Consumer's Week, April 23-29, is a good excuse to go out and buy something! But it's actually designed to draw attention to our rights and responsibilities as consumers.

By fulfilling consumer responsibilities you can also protect your rights. Here are some things you can do before and after making a purchase that take care of these responsibilities and can save you trouble and money later on.

Before making a purchase, analyze what you need and what features are important to you. Compare Brands. Use word-of-mouth recommendations and formal product comparison reports. Check with your local library for magazines and other publications containing consumer information.

Then compare stores. Look for a store with a good reputation and take advantage of sales. Don't forget to check for any additional charges, such as delivery and service costs. Also compare warranties, read terms of contracts carefully, and check the return or exchange policy.

After your purchase follow proper use and care instructions for products. Read and understand the warranty provisions. If trouble develops, report the problem as soon as possible. Do not try to fix the product yourself since this may void the warranty.

Keep a record of efforts to have your problem remedied. This record should include names of people you speak to, times, dates and other relevant information.

You can find out where and how to get your problem resolved.

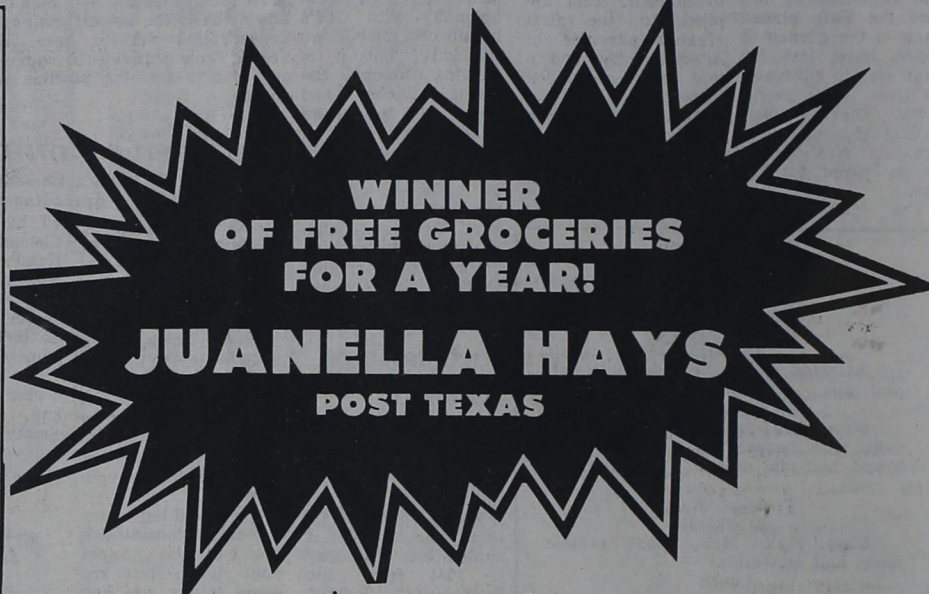
