Amarillo Pathologist to Perform Autopsies

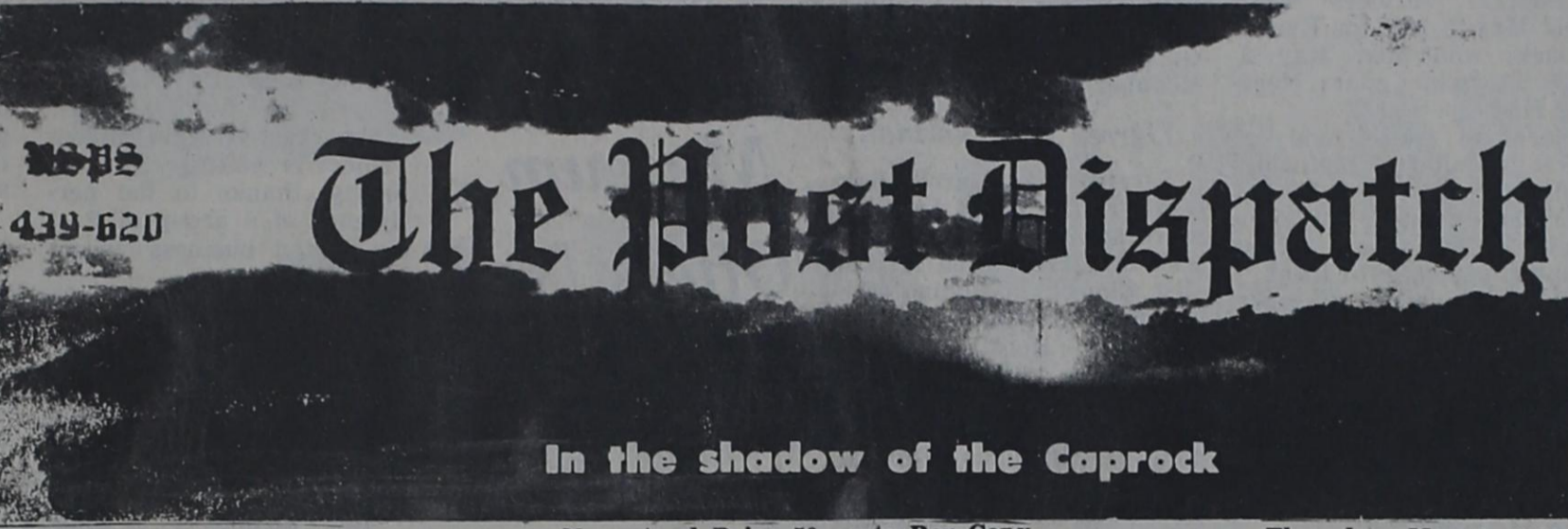
The Garza County Commissioners' Court last week approved a contract with Dr. Ralph Erdman of Amarillo for pathology services.

The contract provides a \$50 per month fee and \$500 for each autopsy performed, which includes travel, testimony and other expenses.

The commissioners also approved the only bid submitted for auditing county finances by Steve Sawyers. The bid was for \$7,500 per year.

Dr. Harry Tubbs was appointed as the county health officer. Dr. Tubbs offered to provide his services at no cost, but commissioners voted to pay the normal \$50 per month fee.

June 7 Date Set

Clerk Run-Off Election

Sonny Gossett and Orabeth White will be on a June 7 ballot in a run-off election for the Democratic party nomination for County-District Clerk, following last Saturday's primary election.

With 1,032 votes cast in the Democratic party primary, Gossett pulled 383 votes, White got 190.

Others in the contested

race included Anne Mathis Leake with 183 votes, followed by Leon Davis with 166 and Joy Orr with 103.

That was the only locally contested position on the ballot.

Voters here also chose Mark White on the governor's slot with 269 votes, followed by Andrew Briscoe III with 203.

Incumbent Lt Governor

Bill Hobby got 516 votes to 280 for challenger David Young.

The state representative race sent challenger Danny J. Hunter back to the drawing boards with 266 votes to incumbent Steven Carriker's 515.

A total of 110 absentee ballots were cast.

In the second primary election June 7, absentee

voting begins May 28 and closes June 3.

Those registered voters eligible to vote in the June 7 second primary are the voters who cast ballots in the Democratic first primary as well as those who did not vote in either primary.

Those who cast votes in the Republican primary may not vote in the second Democratic primary.

Council Hears from Citizens on Deeds

A refreshingly shorter than normal Post City Council meeting Monday night was highlighted by two separate citizen requests on property matters.

Jim Schooler, who recently purchased property on West 7th Street, asked the council to clarify the status of extending Avenue P through the hospital property.

Schooler said that the lending institution for his mortgage needed a statement concerning the issue.

He said that after extensive research on deeds, he could not find a written record of a long-term agreement about keeping the street closed as long as the hospital used the land.

The hospital property was deeded by the previous owner with the understanding that Avenue P would not be extended as long as the hospital uses the land.

Schooler says that if the street were to be extended, improvements on his property made through the past several years, would encroach on the right-of-way.

Mayor Giles McCrary and city attorney Harvey Morton explained that the

city does not have the authority to close a street which is dedicated to the public, but also emphasized that there are no plans to open the street, especially as long as the hospital is using the land.

Morton suggested that Schooler have his attorney prepare a letter for the council which could state the current council's position, but emphasized that it would not be binding on future councils.

The other citizen request was a return visit by Nick Vukad, who told the council that he had the signatures of 35 of the 40 property owners in Westgate Terrace, requesting that the deed restriction be revoked.

Morton explained that the council could not revoke deed restrictions, only owners through petition to the court of jurisdiction could change deed restrictions.

Vukad's appearance was a follow-up to last month's request, when he brought to the council's attention that his carport addition was denied due to the deed restriction.

"Others have violated the deed restriction and not-

ing was done about it," Vukad said, "and I want to know why I was singled out."

He later said that a neighbor had "squealed on me" and the city code enforcement officer sent a letter instructing Vukad to cease building the carport structure.

Mayor McCrary told Vukad that the council could not force previously constructed violations to be removed.

Morton told Vukad that he could prepare a proper petition and get a change in the deed restriction, then a building permit could be issued.

In other action, a public hearing was held on the grant to the Texas Department of Community Affairs for a street and drainage improvement project.

Lewis Earl reminded the council that approval from the regional committee will be difficult, primarily because the tax rate in Post is so low, compared to other participating cities.

Mayor McCrary reported to the council about the planning grant application in Austin Monday, "and I
