Rebate Check Off \$3,000

The annual payment to date to the City of Post for the one percent sales tax from the state comptroller is 17.66 percent over the same period last year at \$81,897.02.

The latest check for \$21,966.02 is down from the same time last year from \$24,974.84.

The rebate reflects taxable sales made through March and reported April 20.

Slaton's check for the same period was \$24,103.96, up from last year's \$23,342.60 an annual to date payment of \$85,886.05, a 4.99 percent increase.

Tahoka reported a rebate of \$7,246.58, down from last year's \$9,579.46 and a decrease for the year-to-date of 7.93 percent on a total of \$27,097.54.

"budding" television stars, don't you think?

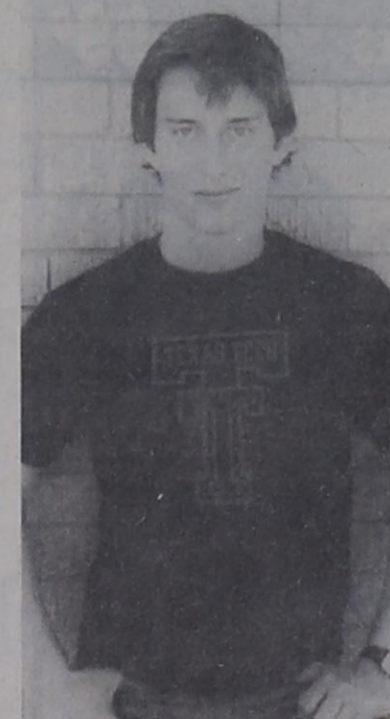
Weldon Reed and his band will be one of the highlights of the evening.

Lake Planning Trip Set for August

The Garza County Lake Planning Committee, appointed by the Garza County Commissioners' Court last month, has set a tentative agenda for a community-wide fact finding trip to Granbury in August.

Committee chairman Wesley W. Burnett, along with committee members Voda Gradine, Jan Crawford, Curtis Hudman, Ronnie Gradine and Audra Loyd, visited Granbury last

Friday, meeting with Hood County officials.

Among the topics for the fact-finding trip in August will be workshops for county, city, school and hospital officials, retailers, chamber of commerce and commercial land development.

The task of the planning committee was set by the Garza County commissioners with instructions to arrange an "eye-ball-to-eye-ball" conversation and sharing of information with Hood County counterparts.

The development of Lake Granbury and the resulting growth in Hood County is considered to be similar in many respects to the anticipated growth in Garza County as the Post and Justiceburg lakes are completed.

The Lake Granbury Area Chamber of Commerce hosted the planning session, which provided the Garza County planning group detailed information from which to set an agenda.

The August information sharing trip is open to anyone interested in attending, details as to cost and date will be announced next week.

"We are extremely pleased with the cooperation and generosity of our friends in Granbury who helped us develop this important fact finding experience," Burnett says, "and we feel certain that those who attend in August will find it a valuable and productive exchange."

The committee will present a formal report to the Garza County Commissioners Court at its regular meeting next Tuesday morning.

I saw a fascinating article in a Dallas Morning News issue last week... where U.S. District Judge William Wayne Justice questions the value of compulsory attendance for our public schools.

I wish we had the space to print the entire article, because the Judge's comments echo my sentiments and support my previous editorial comments about quality of education.

Judge Justice is the man who recently presided over the deplorable prison conditions in Texas and issued the historical directive for improving prison conditions.

He says compulsory attendance laws produce "great chaos and bitterness."

He was addressing a conference sponsored by the Texas Coalition for Juvenile Justice.

"It seems to me, and several studies appear to

validate this conclusion, that many youth regard our public high schools as nothing less than a kind of prison," the Judge is quoted in the DMN.

"The effect is that they react in much the same manner as actual prisoners in a prison setting. That is, they tend to be disruptive and violent, with the consequences that the learning environment is intolerably strained and disarranged," the Judge adds.

He also said many young people eventually would realize the value of a free public school education if they were allowed to work instead of attending school.

Hallelujah! A man with common sense.

Do you think our legislators will listen to this man of wisdom?

Fat chance...he'll get as much attention as our professional educators and teachers got when HB72 was dreamed up in some closet.

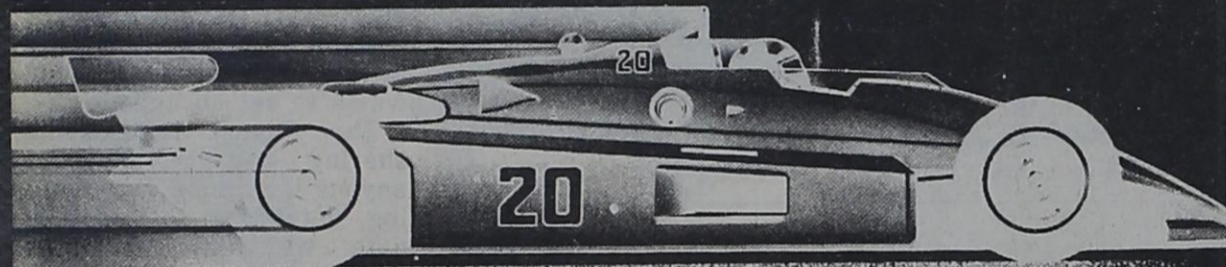

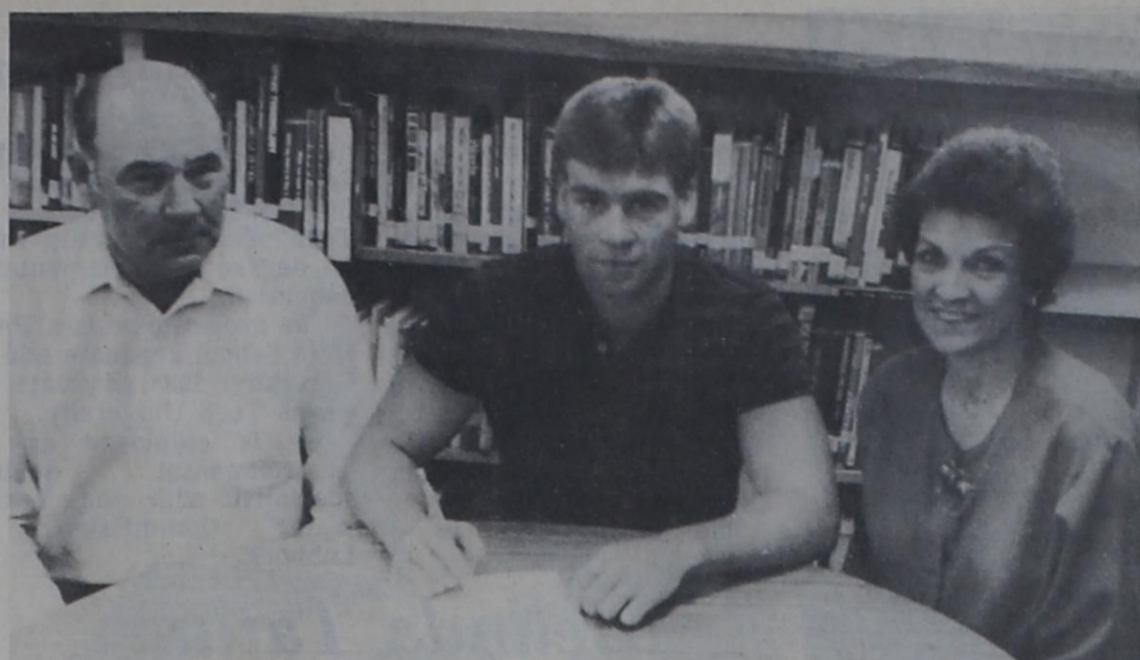

Highway Repairs Listed

The State Highways and Public Transportation Commission today approved a \$1.3 million contract with Caprock Highway Construction Co. of Lubbock to resurface 74 miles of highway in six area counties.

The longest single section of highway to be resurfaced in the project is U.S. 180 in Gaines County from just east of Seminole east to the Dawson County Line, a distance of 25.8 miles.

Other highways included in the resurfacing project include:

- A 16.3 mile section of U.S. 84 in northeast Lynn County and northwest Garza County.

- A 9.3 mile section of U.S. 84 in north Bailey

County.

- A 7.8 mile section of U.S. 84 in northeast Hockley County.

- And a 14.8 mile section of S.H. 137 in south Dawson County.

The resurfacing work, which should begin in July, is vital to protect taxpayer's investment in area highways, according to local highway officials.

It's the second area highway resurfacing contract approved by the commission this year.

In January the commission awarded a \$3.4 million contract to resurface 190 miles of highway in the highway department's 17-county Lubbock District. That work is expected to begin later this summer.

APHIDS ON OAK TREES

Several areas of the State have reported aphids infesting oak trees.

These infestations seem to vary from slight to heavy, depending on the stage of tree growth, location, tree species and weather conditions.

Most of the infestation appears to be located on the older leaves.

However, if all conditions remain the same, the newer, emerging leaves can and will be susceptible.

Management of this problem requires frequent observations of infested trees to determine if and when insecticide applications may be necessary.

Problem: It is not common to find early season aphid infestations on trees.

This is especially true when there is a long spring season with intermittent periods of cool weather.

Aphid populations begin to develop in the cooler weather, and if unchecked, will continue well into early summer.

Ordinarily, parasites and predators usually hold aphid populations in check, however, these beneficial insects do not develop fast enough in cooler spring temperatures to be of any aid in reducing infestations.

Insecticide applications generally will aid in reducing aphids.

In many instances, however, applications are not necessary; several applications must be made; or treating large numbers of trees may not be economically feasible.

Also, insecticides will reduce development of beneficial insects.

Many aphid species excrete a sticky substance known as "honey dew".

This secretion falls onto leaves, twigs, other parts of the tree and adjacent plants.

It stimulates the growth of a black, sooty mold.

This mold not only mars the appearance of plants but may restrict photosynthesis.

The real problem comes about when honeydew becomes a nuisance on automobiles, lawn furniture, patios, sidewalks, and other outdoor objects.

Solution: Careful observation and consideration of all factors involved leads to successful aphid management.

The following guidelines may be helpful when deciding whether or not to spray:

Continue close, frequent inspections when:

1. the preponderance of old leaves are still on the tree.

2. trees are large and well established.

3. there are no signs of water stress.

4. trees are in a good state of nutrition.

5. there are signs of aphid parasites-predators.

Spray with approved insecticides or wash plants with a strong stream of water when:

1. trees are small or newly established.

2. there are obvious signs of water stress.

3. trees are nutritionally unthrifty.

4. there is a greater proportion of new leaves showing infestation and a wrinkled, distorted appearance.

5. there are no signs of parasites-predators.

6. honeydew secretions are unacceptable.

Since beneficial insects play such an important role in natural aphid control, try washing aphids away with a strong stream of water.

Use the water during early morning or late afternoon to avoid sun scald of trees or adjacent plants.

Strong, forceful streams of water will reduce fresh deposits of honeydew in trees.

The addition of mild soaps or insecticidal soaps will remove some aphids and deposits of honeydew on tree leaves and other outdoor objects.

If insecticide applications are determined to be necessary use products containing diazinon, dimethoate, acephate, malathion or oxydemeton-methyl.

Refer to the partial listing of pesticide products for use on turf and ornamentals, B-1373, House and Landscape Pests, for more information on the choice of insecticide products.

The manufacturer generally includes precautions on the label when phytotoxicity is a danger.

To avoid unnecessary damage, apply the insecticide only to plants specified on the label.

Mix according to directions and apply the recommended dosage.

Treatment of large trees or groups of trees is difficult for homeowners.

Most homeowners do not have the large-volume, high-pressure spray equipment necessary to effectively apply insecticides to trees.

Without adequate application equipment, homeowners should secure the services of a local pest control operator or landscape maintenance firm.

'86 Farm Conservation Program Outlined

Texas 1986 farm programs-Conservation Reserve Program and Acreage Conservation Reserve-are not only similar in name, but provide Texas landowners excellent opportunities to improve wildlife habitat.

Both programs are intended to reduce overproduction of agricultural commodities and protect the nation's soil resource.

The Conservation Reserve Program pays land-

owners to establish highly erodible, marginally productive cropland to permanent vegetation for at least 10 years.

Perennial vegetation is required for soil protection in this program.

Plantings of grasses, legumes, forbs, shrubs, or trees can improve habitat for many wildlife species in Texas.

The Acreage Conservation Reserve, or set aside acreage, pays farmers to

reduce their acreages of selected agricultural commodities-feed grains, rice, cotton, and wheat in Texas.

Acreages taken out of production must be protected from soil erosion, but annual vegetation is permitted in his program.

Annual wildlife food plots may be planted on set aside acres.

Permanent vegetation alone rarely provides the habitat needs of wildlife.

Annual food plots near permanent vegetation may support less mobile forms of wildlife throughout the year.

Highly mobile species, such as wintering waterfowl and dove, will benefit more from annual food plots than areas of permanent vegetation.

The Conservation Reserve Program and Acreage Conservation Reserve can be used in combination to improve wildlife habitat,

particularly where habitat is deficient in food and cover for the desired wildlife species.

The Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization Service (ASCS) administers both programs for USDA.

Soil Conservation Service (SCS) personnel will assist landowners develop conservation plans that will meet program requirements and provide habitat for wildlife.

The SCS office is located at 210 West Main, the ASCS office address is P.O. Drawer 39.

Oil Drilling Report

Dallas independent operator Bert Fields Jr. is preparing to make hole for a 3,000-ft developmental well in Garza County's Post Field, 10 miles northeast of Post.

The venture will be known as the No. 6 I.N. McRary "H". It is in a 160-acre drilling unit in the GH&H Survey and is aimed at production in the Glorieta Formation.

Pumping 42 barrels of 36-gravity oil per day on an open choke, the No. 11 J.C. Dorward "C" has been brought on line in Garza County's Dorward Field, about five miles southeast of Justiceburg.

Exxon Corp is the operator. Exxon took the hole to total depth of 2,623 feet and perforated the San Andres-San Angelo Formation for production at 1,987 to 2,579 feet into the wellbore. In addition to oil, the well made 90 barrels of waste water daily.

Three Oaks Corp. has abandoned an undrilled location in the Post Field, five miles northeast of Justiceburg. Carrying permit for 3,000-ft TD, the well had been designated as the No. 5 Robison.

Commercial oil shows have been reported at a Garza County wildcat seven miles northwest of Post. It is the No. 1 Justice, bottomed at a depth of 8,885 feet by the operator, Marshall and Winston Inc. Possible production intervals have been perforated between 8,758 and 8,827 feet into the hole.

The operator is completing a tank battery at the location.

An ill-fated developmental well has been written off as a dry hole in Garza County's Swenson-Barron Field about 15 miles east of Post. Designated as the No. 1 J.F. Barron, the well bottomed at total

One popular 4-H project is Breads.

Korren Payton of the Close City 4-H Club has literally become a "Breads Expert".

She is well known for her cinnamon rolls.

Here is her favorite recipe:

Best Ever Cinnamon Rolls
 by Korren Ann Payton
 2½ cups lukewarm water
 (105 to 115 degrees)

2 pkg Rapid Rise yeast
 1 box yellow cake mix
 1 cup all-purpose flour
 3 eggs
 One-third cup oil
 1 teaspoon salt
 5¼ cups flour
 Cinnamon
 Sugar
 Pecans

Dissolve yeast in water.

Using large mixer mixing bowl and dough hooks, place yeast and water, cake mix, oil, 1 cup flour, and salt in bowl. Beat until well mixed then add slowly 5¼ cups flour. Knead by hand about 5 minutes.

Place in large greased bowl. (I use a lg. Tupperware bowl and cover) and cover. Let rise until double in size (rising time depends on weather, temperature in house, etc.) Divide dough into 2 or 3 parts and roll thin, ½" to ¾" and spread with softened oleo (or butter), sugar and cinnamon. Roll as for jelly roll, cut about 1" to 1½" pieces and place rolls on greased cookie sheet, let rise until double in size. Bake in 350 degree oven 20 to 30 minutes and then ice with powdered sugar.

These rolls are worth the effort involved in making them!

Lack of Communication About Money Causes Family Problems

One of the major causes of family problems is failure to communicate about family finances.

Couples who didn't bother to discuss family finances when times were good find themselves at odds when the situation changes.

For example, a person may tolerate a free-spending spouse until one of them becomes unemployed.

Then it's easy to blame the spouse for spending instead of saving and emotions can build until the problem affects their basic relationship.

Another type of problem occurs when one spouse—usually the husband—assumes all the financial responsibility in an effort to protect the other.

This may work fine until something happens, such as the death of the husband or a major change in their financial situation.

In a financial crisis, the wife usually knows something is wrong because she sees overdue notices in the mail or is asked to sign legal documents.

Yet, her husband may still refuse to discuss the situation so she won't have to worry.

Unfortunately, not knowing can be more worrisome than the facts.

How a family handles its finances on a daily basis may be a private matter for one of the partners, but in a community property state like Texas, half of the assets acquired during marriage belong to each spouse.

Couples need to at least discuss their basic finances so that both spouses have a good idea of their current situation.

Both partners should be capable of performing most any financial function necessary to survive if the other partner dies.

How people react to a financial emergency can also add to family problems.

Some people react as though they are completely destitute even though they may have unemployment benefits or savings to tide them over.

Others may actually spend money on things for "show" so that no one really knows how difficult their financial situation may be.

Either reaction can add strains to a marriage.

Unemployment and other financial problems are tough for any couple but developing good communication habits before problems arise can help ease the strain when circumstances change.

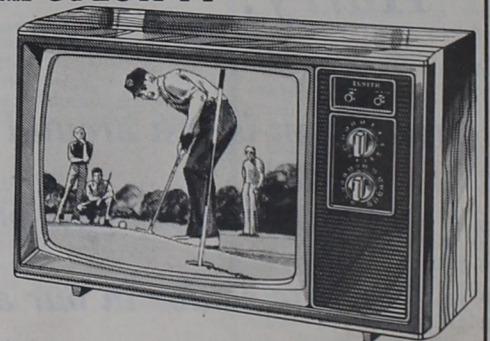
