Commissioners Tackle 86-87 Budget

The Garza County Commissioners' Court is considering the 1986-87 fiscal year budget, working with an uncertified tax appraisal evaluation of \$568,528,504.

County Treasurer Voda Gradine told the court last Friday that the preliminary budget is based on 95 percent collection, with the same tax rate of 16.2 cents per \$100 evaluation.

Expecting lower fees on vehicle registration, the budget is still being studied and trimming of expenses as well as adjustments in the tax rate have not been decided.

The commissioners heard from Mrs Ruby Kirkpatrick and Pee Wee Pierce, representing the Historical Commission and discussed the continuing need for support from the county for the museum.

"Since we started opening on Sunday afternoons in April," Mrs Pierce commented, "we've had 200 visitors and on July 4 we had over 100."

She also said many of the visitors are from out of state, a total of 46 since January 1.

Mrs Kirkpatrick listed

improvements at the museum and plans for continued changes to make the museum more attractive and interesting.

"This will help our town with tourism," she added.

Former MHMR counselor Sharla Wells introduced Scott Augustine, who is now serving the county at the MHMR center. Mrs Wells will be teaching school with the Post ISD this year.

Post Stampede Rodeo Adds 3 New Events

Sales Tax

Rebate Check Down 36%

The sales tax rebate check to Post for the sales in May took a nosedive, dropping 36 percent from the same period last year.

The check was \$7,405.48, compared to \$11,522.90 the same period in 1985.

The decrease, according to sources at the state comptroller's office, are general across the board, in both retail and oil field related services.

The year-to-date for Post is a 6.69 percent increase over last year.

Slaton showed a slight increase at \$12,035.11 up from 1985's \$11,360.82 for an annual increase of 4.32 percent.

Tahoka reported a check of \$3,602.76, up from last year's \$3,053.95 for a year-to-date decrease of 5.99 percent.

Main Water Line from White River Breaks

Last Wednesday a small warning was issued to the people of Post when a section of the main water-line from White River sprung a leak about 13 miles east of the city.

Although water curtailment lasted only one day, the break in the 25 year old line is a serious reminder that Post is completely dependent on the water line from White River.

When that water line breaks, as it will continue to do so considering the age of the pipe, there is no back up system here.

The storage tanks, when full, holds 860,000 gallons and under normal use that is about two days worth of water.

After that, the city has arranged with local oil field water hauling companies to bring water from Lubbock.

Fortunately, the most recent break was on the side of the line, and the welding patch was completed by late Wednesday.

The break was spotted Tuesday morning when a drop in pressure was noticed at the Post meter, and at the same time an increase in water flow was registered at White River.

Then White River crews drove along the Crosbyton highway, trying to find a big puddle of water...this particular break was partially hidden from the highway by a mound of dirt.

Practically no residential users in Post noticed any change in water service because of the break, although oil field users were curtailed.

The break in the main water line from White River is a warning of future problems.

City Takes Low Bid on Park

A bid of \$14,315.40 from Murray and Givens Construction Co. of Lubbock was approved by the Post City Council last Friday for the hike-bike path at the park.

The funds for the project are part of the Texas Parks Department grant to Post for improvements.

The city and county are matching the state grant.

The only other bidder on the project was Commercial Concrete Construction Co. of Lubbock at \$17,894.25.

During the meeting, the council heard from a citizen committee and merchants concerning the proposed sidewalk sale ordinance.

The committee, headed by Patty Kirkpatrick, presented proposed changes to the ordinance. The changes were suggested by an earlier meeting among mer-

chants.

The sidewalk sale ordinance, as agreed to at Friday's council meeting, will allow for three separate single days during a month for individual merchants to conduct sidewalk sales without requiring a permit.

Any sidewalk sale that included two or more

consecutive days will require a permit.

The ordinance will be on the agenda for the next regular council meeting.

Only Five Cities will be Named to 1986 Texas Main Street

Post is competing this year to be one of five cities selected to participate in the 1986 Texas Main Street Project. The Texas Main Street Project of the Texas Historical Commission is charged with assisting small cities in revitalizing their central business districts and preserving their important historic buildings. The goal of the project is to encourage economic development within the context of historic preservation by using sound management and private sector techniques.

The Main Street concept was developed by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, and when the trust established a National Main Street Center in 1980, Texas was among six states selected to participate in the downtown development program. Eagle Pass, Hillsboro, Navasota, Plainview, and Seguin were the first cities selected in 1981 to establish a Main Street Project, and in 1982 Gainesville, Georgetown, Kingsville, McKinney, and Marshall were added. The 1983 cities were Brenham, Harlingen, Lufkin, Stamford, and Waxahachie. Belton, Brownwood, Ennis, Goliad and Paris were designated for participation in 1984.

The 1985 Texas Main Street cities are Corsicana, Cuero, Lampasas, Mineral Wells and Sweetwater. The goal of the Texas Historical Commission is to select five new cities each year of the 1980s, reaching a total of 50 towns by 1990.

The Texas Main Street Project is assisted by 12 other state agencies in providing guidance and expertise to each Main Street city for a three-year period. In addition to aid from these state entities and the National Main Street Center, many corporations and foundations are contributing funds and technical assistance to the Texas Main Street cities.

The staff of the Texas Main Street Project, with input from leaders in both the public and private sectors in each Main Street town, makes an evaluation of each town's needs, obstacles, and potential for downtown revitalization. Then, a number of highly skilled professionals from various fields are recruited to participate in a three-day evaluation of the town's problems; these professionals recommend short and long-term solutions that are feasible for small communities. The members of this resource team donate their valuable time, and their travel

expenses are provided by a grant from the Economic Development Administration to the Texas Main Street Project.

Texas has many beautiful, often overlooked small towns, each of which is attempting to survive and thrive on its own strengths and resources. Small town economic studies and development plans abound, but such costly reports often are not implemented. Inspired by the Main Street Concept, Post's business, political and civic leaders will be able to use sound private sector management techniques and hire a full time resident Main Street Project Manager who will coordinate and promote recommendations provided by the Main Street Project as well as revitalization decisions reached by the community itself.

The task of downtown revitalization is too large for one person or one group in Post to accomplish. To recapture the beauty, charm and vitality of Post's historic downtown and to rebuild a flourishing marketplace in the heart of the city is a challenge that requires the efforts of all citizens. The job is big, but the potential embodied in downtown Post and in other Texas small towns makes the effort well worthwhile.

Post Notes

by Wes Burnett

Last week's main water line break between Post and White River sets the stage for serious problems in the future if we don't begin plans now for a back-up water supply system.

The pipe that brings water to Post was installed 25 years ago, and the break last week was the result of rust from the inside.

That's a condition that is going to continue...this time it was fairly easy to repair...future breaks might not be so simple.

With the water rates here so cheap, we have cheated ourselves over the years of providing any security on water sources.

Sure, as long as there are no problems between here and White River, why bother with the rates?

But, let this city go without water for more than a couple days, and we'll be in serious economic trouble...not to mention the inconvenience at home.

We cater heavily on the traveling public here, and much of our economy is based on serving the travelers...without water how will we survive?

How about our friends in the oil field...times are rough enough without having to shut down water flooding every time there is a break...

It is time for us to face the facts...we have to get our water rates to a level that will provide for continuing maintenance of our distribution as well as for a secure back-up water supply.

Sending contract water haulers to Lubbock is no answer.

What we need is a water rate schedule that will put our money back into investing into our future.

All other participating White River cities have back-up systems and their water rates are high enough to maintain these systems.

Let's look at some examples of water rates:

Post, \$4 for first 5,000 gallons;
 Crosbyton, \$8 for first 3,000 gallons;
 Ralls, \$6 for first 3,000 gallons;
 Spur, \$9.50 for first 3,000 gallons;
 Idalou, \$4 for first 3,000 gallons;
 Lubbock, \$5.46 for first 1,000 gallons;
 Levelland, \$5 for first 1,000 gallons;
 Tulia, \$11 for first 3,000 gallons;
 Snyder, \$4 for first 2,000 gallons;
 Littlefield, \$5.75 for first 2,000 gallons;
 Plainview, \$8.25 for first 3,000 gallons;
 Slaton, \$5.50 for first 2,000 gallons.

All of these cities also charge much higher rates for water users over the minimums.

It is a statement about investing in the most precious commodity in West Texas...water.

The rates we charge for water is so low that it is really wasteful. Not only do we encourage heavy use of water, but we also do not provide any security for the future.

I believe the Post City Council is faced with a tough decision but one that can not be put aside any longer...raise the water rates to a point where not only does the system pay for itself, but allows for maintenance of the distribution, repairs, replacement of old lines and provides for a back up water supply system.

I call on the citizens to support this important task...instead of griping about paying a few bucks

more a month for water, recognize the emergency situation we are in and give our council members encouragement to plan for the future.

And when you demand services of your city...or its merchants to donate for your favorite cause...remember that your dollar spent here makes it possible.

As the Haskell, Texas newspaper recently commented, "next time you go to the big mall to save a buck or two, ask the mall merchant to kick in \$25 for your favorite community

project..." chances are you would never ask, and you certainly wouldn't get a good response.

No local merchant objects to helping support community projects...but their ability to support these valuable endeavors is directly related to their income.

Spend it at home, please.

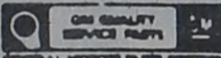

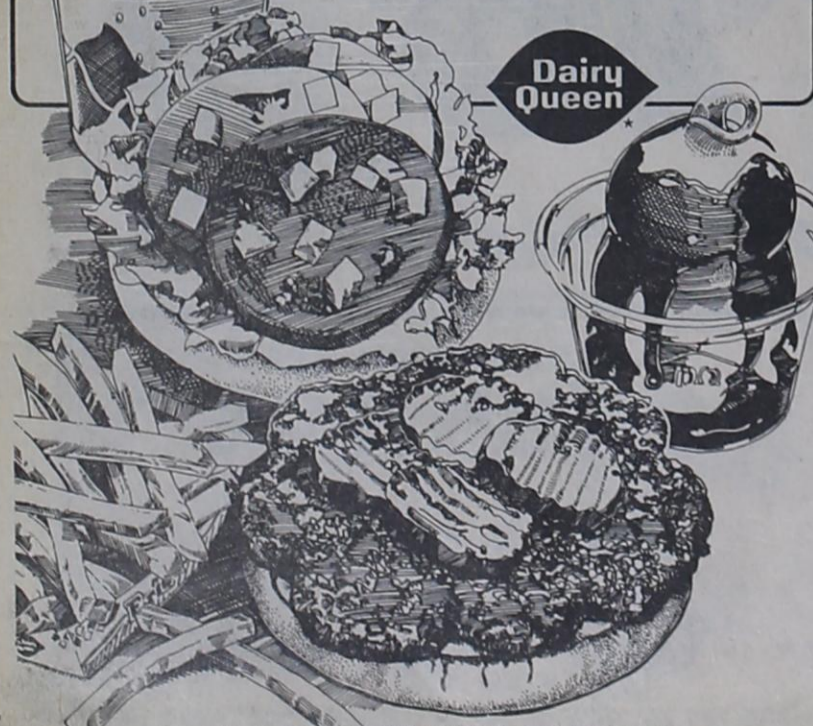

Congress headquarters will be the Marriott at the Capitol Hotel.

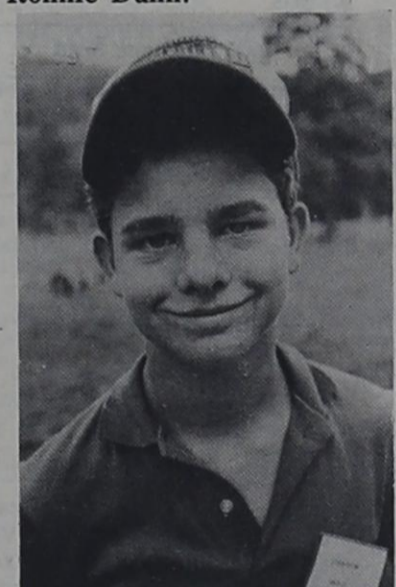

West Texas Petroleum has abandoned an undrilled location in the Storie Field, Garza County, 10 miles northwest of Post.

The well had been designated at the No. 2 S.C. Storie.

It had carried permit for 9,185-ft. maximum hole.

Pumping 30 barrels of oil per day along with 200 barrels of salt water, the No. 7 Exxon Fee "P" has been brought on line in the Dorward Field, Garza County, about three miles southeast of Justiceburg.

The well probed to a 2,510-ft bottom and was perforated to produce from the San Andres Formation at 1,872 to 2,054 feet into the hole.

Garza County's H&L Field saw a new producer come on line when the No. 2 Montgomery Post was completed by Co-Co Oil about seven miles northeast of Post.

It pumped at the rate of 30 barrels of 38-gravity crude per day plus about 170 barrels of waste water and a small volume of casinghead gas.

Co-Co took the hole to a 3,556-ft. bottom.

It will produce from a perforated interval in the Gorieta Formation, 3,339 to 3,474 feet into the hole.

An undrilled location has been abandoned in Garza County's Post Field, about 14 miles southeast of the Post townsite.

The well is designated as the No. 39 Connell Estate "B", with Rocker A Well Service Co. as the operator. The well had carried permit for 2,750-ft. maximum drilling depth.

Deeper pay has been achieved in a re-entry operation at the No. 3 C.R. Scott in Garza County's PHD Field about seven miles northwest of Post.

Threeway Drilling has replaced D&D Oil Co. as the operator.

The well now produces at the rate of 83 barrels of oil daily plus 45 barrels of salt water. It is a combined open hole and perforated producer with a new production interval in the San Andres Formation at 3,402 to 3,721 feet into the wellbore.

Originally completed in 1953, the well produced at the rate of 144 BOPD from San Andres perforations at 3,520 to 3,549 feet.

A bid for shallower pay has paid off for Conoco at a location in Garza County's Huntley Field, five miles northwest of Post. The well in question was the No. 13 South Huntley Unit, which produced at the rate of eight barrels of oil daily when first completed in 1976.

The No. 1 PLK "24-A" has been brought on line after a successful re-entry in the Teas Field, Garza County, eight miles southwest of Post.

It had been branded as a dry hole when originally completed in April of 1985.

The well now shows ability to pump 30 barrels of 40-gravity crude per day along with 30,000 CF casinghead gas and 412 barrels of waste water.

With Indian Wells Oil as the original operator, the well was bottomed at an original depth of 8,650 feet. The new operator, Patterson Petroleum, has completed the well to produce from the Pennsylvania Formation at 8,046 to 8,058 feet into the wellbore.
